

## REVOLVERS USED IN ROW AT MAUGERVILLE

### CAMP BROS. RECOVERED HORSE AFTER A FIGHT

Two Maugerville Men Named  
Shields Hired Horse and  
Abused It—Police  
Summoned.

Ald. C. C. Camp and Mr. George Camp, of this city, were in a mix-up with two Maugerville men on Saturday night over a horse of theirs which the two men had hired and were treating brutally. The men would not give up the horse in question and a message came to the Fredericton police to that effect from the Camp brothers and that they had been threatened with revolvers.

The police visited the scene and the horse was brought back.

#### Ill-Treated the Horse.

On Saturday two men named Shields from Maugerville hired a horse and carriage from the stables of Camp Brothers, in this city, stating that they wished to have it for the day.

Some time afterwards a telephone call was received from Maugerville from a friend there who inquired if Camp Brothers owned a horse of that description. On finding that it belonged to the stables the man on the wire stated that the two men were using it cruelly, driving it hard, while one of the two men rode on its back, with the other in the carriage.

#### Drew Revolvers.

The Messrs. Camp immediately left for Maugerville. The men refused to give up the horse and a lively scrap ensued, in which the four combatants were more or less knocked about, it being reported that one of the two Shields lost several of his teeth and George Camp had a finger broken.

The owners of the horse were finally driven off at the point of revolvers, according to their statement. They sent in a call for the Fredericton police, and Sergt. Jones and Patrolmen Hartt and Jones left for the scene of the fight. On arriving there the horse was found to be in possession of its owners and the other men were not in sight.

## LARGEST FRESHMAN CLASS IN HISTORY OF UNIVERSITY OF N. B. WAS ENROLLED THIS MORNING

Fifty-Seven Freshmen, Including a Large Number of Returned Soldiers, Registered Today — Seven Sophomores Also, Making a Total of Sixty-four—Five Women in the Number Dr. Spaulding, Harvard Man, Arrives to Take Chair of Modern Languages Vacated by Prof. C. E. Popplestone—Served Overseas with A. E. F.—Other New Professors.

Sixty four new students registered this morning at the University of New Brunswick which began lectures for the academic year this morning. Of that number seven are entered in the Sophomore year. Of the fifty seven Freshmen five are women, four taking the Arts course and one a Special course. The Sophomore registrants are classified as follows: Arts 3, Forestry 3, Civil Engineering 1. The Freshmen are classified as follows: Arts 12, Forestry 13, Civil Engineering 8, Electrical Engineering 11, Special 13.

A large number of the new students have served overseas. Many of those who registered today come from outside New Brunswick. The new class is the largest which has registered at the U. N. B. at any time. This is accounted for to a great extent by the fact that the war which prevented or interrupted many university courses is over.

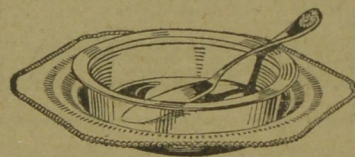
