

TWO SMALLPOX CASES REPORTED OVER WEEK-END

BOTH IN THE EASTERN PART OF THE PROVINCE

Large Delegation Left for Amherst Winter Fair—Public Meeting re Vocational Education.

The Department of Health of the Province has received reports of two cases of smallpox over the week-end one at Buctouche and one at Lewisville a suburb of Moncton. The usual precautions are being taken. Recently all reports of this nature have come from the eastern part of the province.

Meeting at St. Stephen

INVESTIGATION TO BE REPORTED OFFICIALLY

P. J. HUGHES ALSO TO APPEAR AT CHATHAM

Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson Will Produce All the Facts—Clergymen Have Been Subpoenaed.

Rev. W. D. Wilson Chief Inspector under the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 stated this morning that P. J. Hughes of this city would go to Chatham to act in a legal capacity for his department in the investigation of the incident at Chatham some weeks ago, in which Sub-Inspectors James Dickson and Merrifield in making two arrests, met with resistance and used force. The investigation will begin on the 18th Thursday next. An official report of the proceedings is to be taken, J. P. McPeake, Supreme Court stenographer, acting.

Many Witnesses Summoned

A large number of witnesses have been summoned to attend the investigation. Subpoenas were issued some time ago. Among those summoned are Rev. Mr. Bate of Chatham who made allegations that the sub-inspectors brutally beat two men arrested at the time, also Rev. Mr. Cooper of Bathurst who was present while the fight was in progress.

Information obtained at Chatham by officers of the Chief Inspector's department does not agree with that published in North Shore newspapers with regard to the trouble. The gist is that four men were originally in the party accosted by the Sub-Inspectors. Two of them disappeared. The other two submitted quietly to arrest for a time. One suddenly resisted striking Sub-Inspector Adam Dickson in the eye and knocking him down. A general melee then ensued, with the result that the two men were arrested and considerably mauled. Adam Dickson does not carry a baton and there is no information secured by the officers to show that batons were used at all in the fight.

Accepted Challenge

THREE DECREES OF DIVORCE ARE TO ISSUE

JUDGMENT GIVEN TODAY BY JUDGE CROCKET

The Crossman, Andrews and Branscombe Cases—Next Sitting of the Court on Jan. 27th.

The Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes of New Brunswick with Hon. O. S. Crockett presiding, met in adjourned session this morning and decrees of divorce were ordered to issue in three cases.

The three cases in which decrees are to issue are those of Bertha H. Andrews vs. Harry Andrews, Willie Wallace Branscombe vs. Alice Blandhe Branscombe and Arthur Bedford Crossman vs. Eva Crossman.

His Honor reviewed the evidence in each case and said that there was sufficient to support the allegation of infidelity on the part of the plaintiff in each.

The Andrews case is from St. John and the defendant served overseas. The Crossman case is from Moncton the plaintiff also serving overseas and marrying the defendant in England. The Branscombe case is from the Parish of Salisbury, Westmorland County. Court adjourned sine die. The next term begins January 27th.
