

VOCATIONAL COURSES HERE FOR TEACHERS

EVENTUALLY TO USE UNIVERSITY OF N. B.

Board Will Have Offices in the O'Connor Bldg.—Inspection Today—Session Completed.

The Vocational Education Board of New Brunswick concluded its session at the Education Office this morning and upon rising went to the O'Connor Building, King Street, recently acquired by the province, and inspected the premises which will be occupied by the Board offices.

At its session last night and this morning the Board discussed the policy of the future and the steps which will be taken to encourage teachers to qualify themselves for their duties as vocational instructors.

To Use U. N. B.

The desire is that the province eventually will have a corps of teachers fully qualified all of whom will be university graduates. In this connection it is contemplated that the University of New Brunswick will be used to fit teachers for this work.

Summer School Here

A summer school for teachers will be established as soon as possible in connection with the Provincial Normal School at Fredericton. The course probably will be four weeks, teachers taking it during the summer vacation.

Arrangements also are to be made whereby the expenses of travelling and tuition will be paid for a certain number of teachers who may want to go outside the province to qualify themselves for this particular line of work.

FOUR SOLDIERS FROM THIS CITY ARRIVE HOME

ALL SAW LENGTHY SERVICE IN FRANCE

Sergt. R. McKenzie, M. M.; Gunner E. Parsons, Sergt. W. Blair and Pte. H. Slipp.

Four Fredericton soldiers returned last evening from overseas after a lengthy service. They were met at the train by the welcoming committee and by numerous friends and relatives. The four young men are Sgt. Ralph J. O. McKenzie, M. M. son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnson McKenzie; Signaller Edward Parsons, son of Sergt. and Mrs. J. H. Parsons; Gunr. Hallam Slipp and Sergt. W. Blair.

Sgt. R. J. O. McKenzie

Sergt. McKenzie enlisted and went overseas in February 1916 with the 36th Field Battery, C. F. A. He spent about five months in England and went to France with the battery in July 1916. In the latter part of hostilities he acted as signalling sergeant having charge of all signalling communications. He came through his service without a scratch and was awarded the Military Medal for repairing communications under severe fire at Vimy on March 28th, 1917. In all he saw over three years' service overseas.

Gnr. Edward Parsons

Gnr. Edward Parsons enlisted and went overseas with the 55th Battalion in 1915. He was transferred to the 36th Battery, C. F. A. and was wounded three times while on service. The first two wounds received at Vimy in 1917, were serious but he recovered after spending some time in "Blighty." He went back to duty and was slightly wounded for the third time. He saw in all three years and eight months' service overseas. Gnr. Parsons came in on the Olympic with Sergt. R. McKenzie. His father and two brothers served overseas, the brothers William and John Parsons being killed in action.

Pte. Hallam Slipp

Pte. Hallam Slipp enlisted in the 104th Battalion in 1916. He was later transferred to the 26th Battalion. He was gassed at Amiens in August and spent five months in "Blighty." He crossed on the Royal George and arrived in the city last evening. His arrival was totally unexpected by his parents.

Sergt. W. Blair

Sergt. W. Blair went overseas with the 36th Battery, C. F. A. from this city and served with that battery for over three years. He came through the many engagements without being wounded.

LEGISLATURE THE CENTRE OF INTEREST TODAY

VOTE OF CENSURE AND RESIGNATION REQUESTED

Premier Foster Will Move a Resolution—Reply of Members Concerned Will Follow Report.

The Legislature is the centre of interest this afternoon as action is to be taken with regard to the report on the investigation of the Patriotic Potato Gift, according to notice given in advance.

In view of the fact that the physicians of Hon. Wm. Currie have announced that he will be unable to attend the present session of the legislature and the fact that his friends greatly fear that he will never leave the hospital alive, it may be impossible for the government to deal with the Friel report at this time. Rule 22 of the House requires that every member against whom charges are preferred, shall be heard from his place in the House, and it would only would be in accordance with the spirit of fair play that a member be given an opportunity to speak before the House takes action.

McQueen Report

It is expected that the McQueen report on the Potato transaction will be taken up by the House and read. Rule 22 provides that any member involved in the report will have an opportunity of being heard. Under the same rule those members must retire and give the House an opportunity of discussing the matter.

Resolution by Premier

It is expected that Premier Foster will then introduce a resolution dealing with the matter and it is rumored that the resolution will take the form of a vote of censure on the members involved and it is possible that their resignation will be called for.

First in History of House

The occasion is said to be the first in the history of the House when such action has been taken. Members against whom charges were made previously either resigned or did not take their seats in the House.

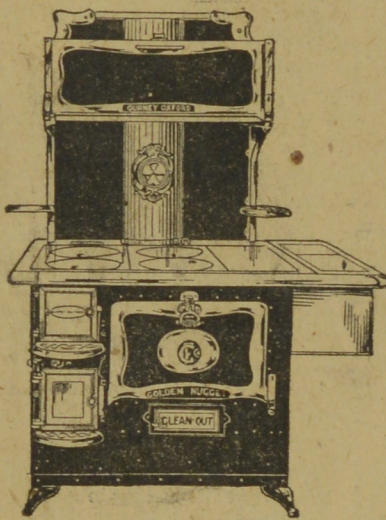
