## AN AGREEMENT TO SUPPLY THE GERMANS WITH FOOD

Four Hundred Thousand Tons of Wheat and Other Supplies Will be Needed by the Huns Before August—Scarcity of Food Will Compel the Huns to Accept the New Armistice Terms—Sir Arthur Currie Now in Paris.

Paris, Feb. 14—There has been a tentative agreement between the Allies and German representatives as to furnishing food to Germany, but this arrangement is dependent upon the acceptance by the Germans of the armistice terms to be submitted. Germany wants immediately thirty thousand tons of pork stuffs and a quarter of a million cases of condensed milk. Following there will be a second order for two hundred tons of pork products. In addition Germany will require between March and August four hundred thousand tons of wheat, with large quantities of other grains, maize and forage. Germany's urgent food requirements are an inducement which will compel her peaceful acceptance of the new terms to be submitted. Canada has a direct commercial interest in the impending settlement because there is an understanding that twenty per cent of the meat products shipped to Germany from the reserves in Great Britain are to be Canadian. Thus the expected submission by Germany as to the conditions will

mean the shipment in a couple of months of the bacon surplus which has accumulated in Canada.

Sir Arthur at Paris

Sir Arthur Currie was petitioned by representatives of the soldiers to appoint to the Canadian body in attendance at the peace gathering some person specially concerned with their interest, and in reply the promise was given that an appointment satisfactory to them would be made. The choice of Sir Arthur Currie was the fulfillment of this plan, but his duties as commander of the Canadian forces in the field had prevented his attendance in Paris until yesterday.

Sir Arthur, accompanied by Colonel Ralston, commanding officer of the 8th Battalion, a Nova Scotia officer, who has distinguished himself in the war, attended Thursday's meeting of the conference and gave a report of the progress of demobilization, which is proceeding according to plan, with the prospect that there will be a speeding up of the time table originally fixed.

## AN HISTORIC SPEECH DELIVERED YESTERDAY BY THE PRESIDENT

Paris, Feb. 14—President Wilson's speech at the peace conference at the reading of the draft of the league of nations follows:

"Mr. Chairman,—I have the honor to assume it a very great privilege of reporting in the name of the commission constituted by this conference on the formulation of a plan of the league of nations. I am happy to say that it is an unanimous report from the representatives of fourteen nations—the United States, Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan, Belgium, Brazil, China, Czechoslovakia, Greece, Poland, Portugal, Roumania and Serbia.

"I think it will be serviceable and interesting if I, with your permission read the document as the only report we have to make." President Wilson then read the draft.

When he reached Article XV. and had read through the second paragraph the president paused and said:

"I pause to point out that a misconception might arise in connection with one of the sentences I have just read—"if any party shall refuse to comply the council shall propose measures necessary to give effect to the recommendations."

"A case in point, purely a hypothetical case is this; suppose there is in the possession of a particular power a piece of territory or some other substantial thing in dispute to which it is claimed that it is not entitled. Suppose that the matter is submitted to the legislative council for recommendation as to the settlement of the dispute, diplomacy having failed, and suppose that the decision is in favor of the party which claims the subject matter of dispute, as against the party

which has the subject matter in dispute.

"Then if the party in possession of the subject matter in dispute merely sits still and does nothing, it has accepted the decision of the council, in the sense that it makes no resistance but something must be done to see that it surrenders the subject matter in dispute.

"In such case, the only case contemplated it is provided that the executive council may then consider what steps are necessary to oblige the party against whom judgment has been given to comply with the decisions of the council."

After reading Article XIX, President Wilson also stopped and said:

"Let me say that before embodied in this document this was the subject matter of a very careful discussion by representatives of the five greater powers and that their unanimous conclusion is the matter embodied in this article."

### No Difference in Motive

After having read the entire document President Wilson continued as follows:

"It gives me pleasure to add to this formal reading of the result of our labors that the character of the discussion which occurred at the sittings of the commission was not only of the most constructive but of the most encouraging sort. It was obvious through out our discussions that, although there were subjects upon which there were individual differences of judgment, with regard to the method by which our objects should be obtained there was practically at no point any serious differences of opinion or motive as to the objects which we were seeking.
