COMMERCIAL ORGANIZATION FOR COUNTY SUGGESTED

J. M. Robinson, of St. John, Made Important Suggestion at the Victory Loan Presentation on Saturday—Honor Flags Presented to Some of the Winners—Addresses by Chairman R. W. McLellan and Others.

With the G. W. V. A. Band in attendance the presentation of Honor Flags at the City Hall drew a large crowd on Saturday afternoon. The canvassers and salesmen were out in force and a good sprinkling of the public was present for the occasion. Ex Ald. R. W. McLellan, Chairman of the York County Victory Loan Committee acted as chairman.

Address By Chairman

The meeting opened with an address of welcome by the chairman. He referred to the splendid organization which when perfected had produced such splendid results and to the great success of the campaign. The speaker stated that for some time it was feared that the County of Westmorland which had achieved such splendid results would beat York County out but that for the third time York County had upheld its reputation as the banner county of the Province. The objectives and the totals subscribed for the three campaigns in which York County had figured so nobly are:

The canvassers, the speaker stated were to be heartily congratulated for their splendid efforts in behalf of the campaign. There had been a practically free contribution of time and work. Mr. McLellan stated that he wished to explain to the public that the remuneration received by the salesmen would in no way pay them for the valuable time they had spent on the campaign.

Without exception J. M. Robinson of St. John had contributed more to the success of the campaign than any other. When things looked dark he was always optimistic and in many ways had given of his time to help the members of the staff. Mr. McLellan publicly expressed the thanks of the salesmen and canvassers to Mr. Robinson for the untiring and ceaseless work he had done.

To the Secretary, Dr. D. W. Roberts enough praise could not be given. He was always obliging, courteous, and at the hard work with which he came in touch he proved himself very efficient.

In closing the speaker referred to the great kindness His Worship Mayor Hanson had shown to the workers. When approached for several concessions he had given his office for the location of the staff and no more central or better located office for this work could be found in Fredericton. In all other respects advantageous to the success of the loan he had acquiesced with the plans of the organization. After publicly thanking His Worship the chairman publicly thanked the G. W. A. Band for rendering their excellent music.

Address by J. M. Robinson

J. M. Robinson was next introduced to the assembled salesmen and public and called upon to address them. His address in part was as follows:

"I appreciate greatly the remarks that have been made in connection with myself but you must remember that when I first took any interest in the campaign I told you that its final success would depend upon the work of the salesmen alone. York County with the three parishes of Sunbury County is not an easy job to handle as it is hard to keep in touch with the canvassers from the local office. Faithful and efficient work has always won its reward and this occasion is no exception to the general rule. I don't for a moment overlook the interest that the Chairman has shown in the work or minimize the work of Dr. Roberts, the Secretary, in the least. Dr. Roberts has proved himself the best Secretary in the Province and backed up by his staff of three young ladies he has done some wonderful work. In the short time that he and his staff have had to formulate the returns for the day they have always been accurate and correct."

"Some of you salesmen have worked three years on the Victory Loan Campaign and I wonder if you will let this occasion pass without making a stab for something better for the County of York. In Halifax and St. John the close of the Victory Loan Movements have engendered a spirit of Commercialism and Commercial Clubs have been formed. I know York County well and consider it the best in the province. There are Counties with a better soil but no Counties in the Province had better conditions or better people than this County. The population consists of

that live and go-ahead people who will get what they want if they go after it. Since the time I graduated from the U. N. B. in this city the city has increased the number of its factories and buildings. Lumber, manufacturers, railroads, water transportation, active farms and one of the best country markets in the province offer themselves for Fredericton's advancement. My advice to you is to get together and form an organization of men who can start a real live-wire interest in York County." In concluding Mr. Robinson again referred to the excellent work of the salesmen and stated that his efforts would have been nothing without their hearty co-operation.

Dr. Roberts' Address

Dr. D. W. Roberts' address in part is as follows: "I wish to thank you for the too generous remarks that you have made concerning myself. It has been a pleasure to me to hold that position in company with such splendid helpers. It has also at times been a great difficulty. Every member of the staff has earnestly tried to do his duty and the results of the campaign in which they proved themselves so active will be very far-reaching. To Mr. Robinson, to the Assistant Organizer, Mr. Ralph McFadden, to the salesmen, my own staff of workers and to the janitor of the City Hall Mr. Biggs I extend the deep thanks of the organization for all that they have done in helping us along with the work and in making us comfortable in our quarters. Mr. Roberts then gave the detailed account of the results.

A vote of thanks was moved by R. B. Wallace to be extended by Mayor Hanson to all the members of the Executive. To this fitting replies were delivered.

Presentation of Flags

Owing to the St. John office being so busily engaged at its own work the Provincial Executive did not have time to forward all the Honor Flags and consequently only one large flag and three small ones were received at the Fredericton office. Presentation of these flags were made to Fredericton, Napodogan, Douglas, and Queensbury Southampton. The flags were received as follows, for the City by John S. Scott, Clifford S. Creed, Thomas L. Wilkinson, Luke S. Morrison, George W. Brown, R. B. Wallace, C. D. Holder and A. J. Wheeler; for Napodogan by Aubrey Hetherington; for Douglas by T. W. Griffiths and Harry Smith and for Queensbury-Southampton by John Lounsbury. The presentations were made by R. W. McLellan with short addresses which were followed by fitting remarks from the salesmen who received them for their districts.

Mr. G. W. Brown on behalf of the City then presented His Worship Mayor Hanson with the flag for the City receiving the thanks of His Worship.

FUNERALS

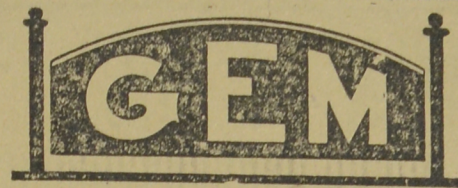
Late Mrs. Esther Parker
