reign of terror," said Berkman. "Anarchism means the negation of violence. Anarchists teach self-reliance, co-operation and mutual aid in opposition to existing institutions and authority."

In reply to one such exposition after Berkman's conviction in New York for opposing the draft, the United States Attorney said to the court:

"The Court should know that this man who now claims to be for universal peace and says he is against the use of violence in 1892 went into Mr. Frick's office in Pittsburgh and tried to shoot him down without giving his

victim an opportunity to defend himself. He shot him in the back as he would a dog."

"The first terrorist act in America" is the way Berkman described his attack on Mr. Frick in this book, "Prison Memoirs of an Anarchist."

Berkman's last hour of freedom in this country expired early this month in New York city while Henry Clay Frick was being buried in Pittsburgh and mourned as a public benefactor.

Emma Goldman is forty-nine years old and Berkman fifty. She was born in Kovno, Russia, and in early childhood removed with her parents to East Prussia. When fifteen years old

she came to the United States and started working in clothing factories in Rochester, N. Y. Recently asked who her relatives were, she replied: "I have children all over the United States."

Emma Goldman Once Married

In 1887 when seventeen years old she was married in Rochester to Jacob A. Kersner, who came from Russia in 1882 and was naturalized two years later. In 1909 his citizenship was revoked because he was not twenty-one when naturalized and had not been

five years in the United States. Two years later the Kersners were divorced by a rabbi according to the Jewish rites. Kersner seems then to have passed out of Emma Goldman's life entirely, for announcement in court during her final fight against deportation that he had died this year took her by surprise. It was on a claim that marriage to him made her a citizen that her legal efforts to remain in this country were based.

"They can't keep me out," she said in 1907 when there was talk of deporting her. "I don't believe they would be foolish enough to try. My father is an American citizen. I married an American citizen."

Her father came to the United States in 1886 one year after her arrival and was naturalized at Rochester when his daughter was twenty-four years old.

Emma Goldman's association with Berkman began thirty years ago in New York. Other than that he is fifty years old, and came from Russia he seems to have concealed his prior history pretty well. When he was released from the Western Penitentiary in Pennsylvania, after serving his time for shooting Mr. Frick, there were reports that he had married the Goldman woman in New Jersey but the marriage was never recorded and at their trial for obstructing the draft both testified they were single.

Represented Devil, She Boasted

"I represent the devil," said Emma Goldman at one of her meetings. "I am an apostle upholding glorious freedom, the apostle standing out against law and order and decency and morality. I am for the devil, who leads the way to the absolute yielding up to all the emotions here and now. Women are the slaves of little laws and conventions. They'll learn to break the laws some day."

Berkman and Goldman made their headquarters in New York where their magazines were published, but they were well known in every large city in the United States, and also addressed anarchist meetings in Canada, England, Australia, Holland and other countries.

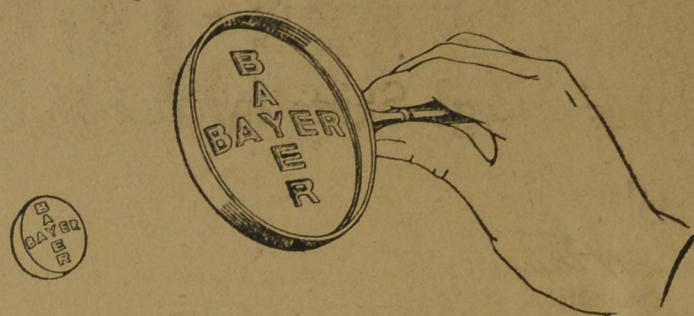

During the Christmas and New Year holiday season, the Canadian National Railways will operate a special passenger train service via the Valley Railway between St. John and Fredericton. In addition to the regular service now in effect, this passenger train will leave Fredericton (daily except Sunday) at 7.00 a. m., arriving in St. John at 10.30 a. m.

Returning the train will leave St. John at 4.30 p. m. and arrive in Fredericton at 8.00 p. m. This special service will be in effect from Monday, December 22nd, to Saturday, January 3rd, 1920 (inclusive) and will greatly accommodate the travelling public, providing also for the increased holiday travel.

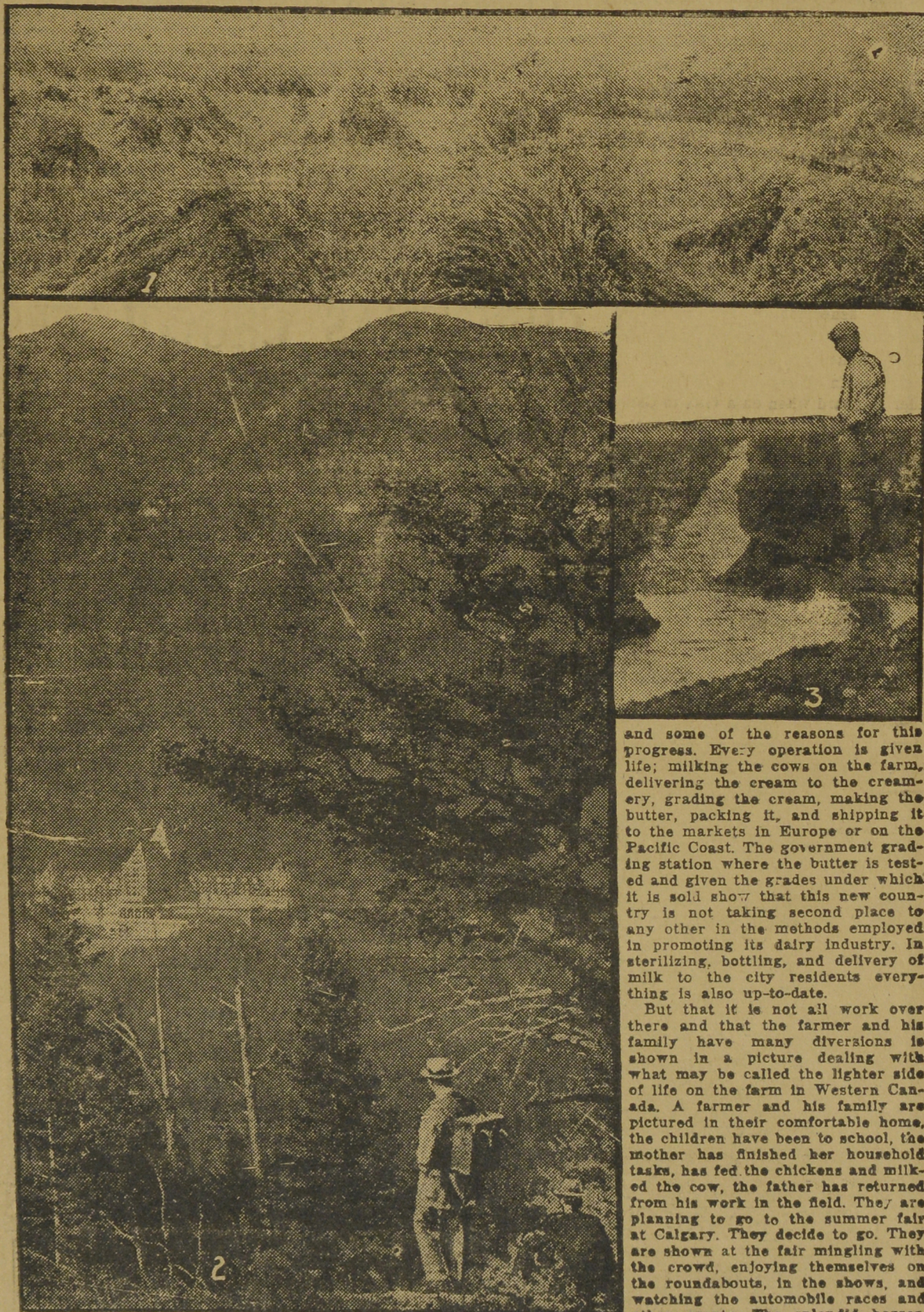

The Canadian West In "Movies"

At the present time there are being shown in various parts of the United States some pictures of actual scenes of various phases of farm life in Alberta, one of the prairie provinces of Canada. They show this country in a very different light from what many had been led to believe it to be. The films, which have been produced under the direction of the Canadian Pacific Railway, Department of Colonization and Development, deal with irrigation farming, the dairy industry, and the lighter side

of the farmer's life in Western Canada.

The film dealing with irrigation farming shows the land being prepared for irrigation, the application of water, growing crops of grain and alfalfa, harvesting, and livestock on the irrigated farm. It also shows the irrigation works, including the great Bassano Dam, the largest of its kind in the world. The idea one gathers of these structures from the picture is that they were built to last, and that those who provided the money had great confidence in the country and the undertaking.

The dairy film shows the rapid progress this industry has made in Alberta during the last few years,

and some of the reasons for this progress. Every operation is given life; milking the cows on the farm, delivering the cream to the creamery, grading the cream, making the butter, packing it, and shipping it to the markets in Europe or on the Pacific Coast. The government grading station where the butter is tested and given the grades under which it is sold show that this new country is not taking second place to any other in the methods employed in promoting its dairy industry. In sterilizing, bottling, and delivery of milk to the city residents everything is also up-to-date.

But that it is not all work over there and that the farmer and his family have many diversions is shown in a picture dealing with what may be called the lighter side of life on the farm in Western Canada. A farmer and his family are pictured in their comfortable home, the children have been to school, the mother has finished her household tasks, has fed the chickens and milked the cow, the father has returned from his work in the field. They are planning to go to the summer fair at Calgary. They decide to go. They are shown at the fair mingling with the crowd, enjoying themselves on the roundabouts, in the shows, and watching the automobile races and other events. The splendid horses, cattle, sheep and hogs on view at the exhibition are also pictured. Altogether the party spends a very enjoyable day.

Later in the season, they go for a holiday. They have not far to go. They find in the same province holiday resorts that afford an excellent change. They go to one of these places on the shores of a large inland lake. Here they enjoy themselves bathing, boating, fishing, and basking in the sunshine on the sands. Afterwards they visit Banff in the heart of the Rocky Mountains, and in connection with their visit, some magnificent mountain scenery is thrown on the screen. Evidently the life of the farmer in Western Canada is not all work and no play,
