BOLSHEVIK MONEY FOR THE BIG UNION SCHEME

Correspondence is Made Public in Which the Receipt of Bolshevik Funds is Acknowledged—Money was to be Used to Advantage—Chief Strike Committee is Trying Hard to Effect a Settlement.

Winnipeg, June 20—In order that the public may be informed with regard to the evidence procured against various strike leaders when the Labor Temple was raided last Tuesday, several letters were made public late this afternoon. One of these addressed to R. B. Russell, the sender of which has not been yet disclosed, acknowledges receipt of a shipment of "Bolshevik funds."

It was explained in the letter that the funds were to be used in furthering the "one big union project." Mr. Russell replied, congratulating the writer on his efforts. Another letter tends to indicate that Bolsheviks desired to gain and partially achieve control of the Winnipeg Trade and Labor Council. It goes on to say that when full control is gained, "we will use it to our advantage."

Hinnipeg, June 20—At a late hour this afternoon Senator C. D. Robertson stated that he knew that the central strike committee was putting forth every effort to bring about a settlement of the strike.

Another Prisoner

Calgary, Alta., June 20—H. A. Pritchard prominent organizer of the one big union and one of its officials is a prisoner in the Calgary city jail waiting transportation to Winnipeg on a charge of having knowledge of a seditious conspiracy.

Pritchard was taken from the west-bound C. P. R. train in Calgary last night by Staff Sergeant Hall, of the R. N. W. M. P. who had been watching all trains on the lookout for the fugitive. The prisoner was brought before Police Magistrate Sanders, D.S. O., this morning and was briefly informed that he would be held pending the arrival of an officer from Winnipeg.

"Do you know what the charge is against you?" inquired the police magistrate of Pritchard.

"Yes, I know," replied Pritchard briefly, which was the extent of his remarks while in the dock. He was removed again to the cell and the case remanded until Monday pending the arrival of a Winnipeg officer.

Liberal Caucus Approves

Winnipeg, June 20—Unanimous approval of the provincial government's

policy opposing the sympathetic strike on principle was expressed by resolution at the caucus of Liberal members held Thursday night, it was announced today.

The question of legislation anent collective bargaining was also discussed, it is said, and it is confidently expected that legislation making this principle statutory and binding upon employers will be passed at the next session of the house.

Win Eight-Hour Day

Winnipeg, June 20—An eight-hour working day has been granted all employees of the Winnipeg Electric Railway company, it was announced today. In order that there shall be no decrease in salary for men receiving the minimum wage, an increase of six cents an hour has been granted thus bringing earnings of the men to the same figure as those prevailing for the nine and a half hour day previous to the strike. A board of arbitration held a session to consider demands of the men for seventy cents an hour and an eight-hour day, but suspended without reporting when the sympathetic strike was begun.

Insist on Demonstration

Winnipeg, June 20—The meeting of pro-strike returned soldiers planned for this evening in Market Square is to be held even "if the special police and all the military are out" was the declaration made by Comrade E. Grant, speaking at a labor meeting late this afternoon. The speaker suggested a "silent parade" which he said had proved a very effective weapon in England.

Strike Waning

Calgary, Alta., June 20—The local sympathetic strike has now dwindled to less than 1,500 men including the postal workers, Canadian Pacific Railway shopmen and metal workers. The return of building trades workers yesterday depleted the ranks of the strikers considerably. Metal trades employers are offering places for mechanics, blacksmiths and moulders at eighty cents an hour and a forty four hour week.

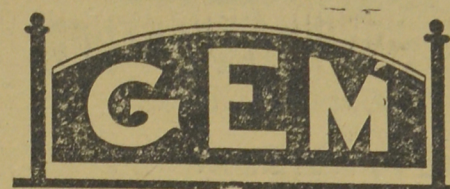
SUNDAY BAND CONCERT
