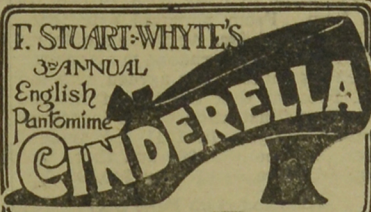

MANY IMPORTANT BILLS PASSED IN THE HOUSE

rate suggested was altogether too
high.

MR. BAXTER said that the propos-
ed rate would not apply to every class
of freight.

HON. MR. VENIOT said that the
Dominion Government had a regular
schedule which was sent out to all of-
ficials and embodied a fixed rate of
top wharfage.

MR. LEGER (West.) said that the
rate of wharfage charged in Mon-
ton was only five cents a ton. He
thought the rate in St. John should be
fixed and made as low as possible.

MR. CAMPBELL said he was as-
tonished that the Bill had encounter-
ed such strong opposition. He felt
sure that the Commissioners would
not charge one cent more than was
necessary.

HON. MR. VENIOT proposed an
amendment that the maximum rate
of wharfage be fixed at thirty cents
per ton.

MR. POTTS said that it was not
proposed to inflict punishment on those
going to St. John with cargoes of
freight. He thought the Bill as presen-
ted to the House should pass.

MR. BAXTER said that he had been
confering with Commissioner Bullock
who had informed him that cargoes of
grain and lumber will be excepted un-
der the provisions of the act. The Com-
missioner thought the Bill should be
either adopted as presented or defeat-
ed.

HON. MR. VENIOT said that with
the assurance that lumber would not
be included he felt disposed to with-
draw his amendment. He recognized
that St. John was the winter port of
Canada and that the people had ex-
pended a large amount in the con-
struction of wharves, yet it must be
remembered that people outside of
St. John had rights. When a Moncton
Bill came before the Municipality
Committee hon. members from St.
John had objected to that City being
given certain rights to taxation which
were enjoyed by St. John.

MR. TILLEY said that they had not
opposed the Moncton Bill but had
favored dividing the tax with the Town
of Shediac.

HON. MR. VENIOT said that the
Moncton Bill had been killed in Com-
mittee. The point he wished to make
was that St. John objected to inter-
ference with its Legislation yet its
representatives had interfered in the
Bill from the City of Moncton.

HON. MR. FOSTER moved that the
Committee report progress.

MR. SWEENEY said that in view of
the information furnished by the hon.

member from St. John County, and
the assurance that lumber would not
be affected he did not feel disposed to
further oppose the Bill.

HON. MR. VENIOT said that he
was willing to withdraw his amend-
ment but to do so it would have to
have the unanimous consent of the
House.

HON. MR. FOSTER said that Com-
missioners of the City of St. John were
in the City and as some hon. members
might wish to confer with them in
regard to the Bill he thought progress
would be reported.

The motion that progress be report-
ed was adopted.

The House again went into Com-
mittee with Mr. Sweeney in the Chair
and agreed with amendments to a
Bill authorizing the Town Council of
the Town of Campbellton to assess in
aid of the Hotel Dieu Hospital, to a
bill relating to Elections in the Town
of Campbellton, and to a bill further
relating to the Town of Campbellton.
The bills were reported.
Adjourned at 11:32 P. M.

NEW BRUNSWICK WILL HAVE A SANCTUARY FOR GAME

Important Bill Introduced by the Minister of Lands and Mines

—Large Tract of Land to be Set Apart in the Interior of

the Province—York County Matters Discussed by Mr. J. A.

Young—A Plebiscite to be Taken on Prohibition.

The Legislature got through with a
lot of work yesterday and it now seems
certain that prorogation will take
place before Good Friday. The re-
maining items of supply were voted
in the afternoon and the remainder
of the day was devoted to private and
government bills.

Hon. Mr. Veniot told Mr. Young he
had arranged for a ferry service at
Manzer's Siding to enable children to
attend school on the opposite side of
the river, and he promised to deal
with a similar situation at Cross
Creek.

At the evening session a bill was
passed to provide for the establish-
ment of a game sanctuary in the cen-
tre of the province.
A bill to amend the Game Act was
introduced by Hon. Mr. Smith.

Hon. Mr. Byrne introduced a bill to
amend the Intoxicating Liquor Act.
It provides for the taking over by the
government of the wholesale liquor
business and also for the holding of a
plebiscite on the question of prohibi-
tion. Following is the official report:

Assembly Chamber,
April 11, 1919.

The House met at three o'clock.
MR. BURCHILL presented the re-
port of the Committee on Standing
Rules.

MR. LeBLANC presented the re-
port of the Committee on Municipal-
ities.

MR. SMITH (Carleton) for Mr. Sut-
ton, gave notice of inquiry for Wed-
nesday next as to the cost of repair-
ing the road damaged by a washout
in the parish of Brighton, Carleton
County.

MR. MAGEE rose to a question of
privilege. He said that during the
discussion on the Vocational bill Mr.
Smith of Charlotte had asked why
members of the board were to be re-
tired in the year 1921. In his reply
to the hon. member he was reported
as saying that "blue blood" was
needed. He wished to make the correction
and say that it was not blue blood,

but new red blood, that was needed on
the board.

HON. MR. ROBINSON introduced a
bill to amend the act providing for
the early closing of shops. He explain-
ed that the principal amendment pro-
posed to change the vote of the city
or town council from three-quarters to
two-thirds. The change was being
made in compliance with the request
of a delegation.

HON. MR. TWEEEDDALE introduced
a bill to amend an act relating to Agri-
cultural Society No. 41, in the County
of Carleton. He said the bill would
give the society authority to dispose
of certain property.

HON. MR. TWEEEDDALE introduced
a bill to incorporate the New Brun-
swick Fruit Growers' Association. He
explained that the organization had
