## THE PEACE TREATY WILL BE SIGNED BY CANADIANS

**Important Announcement Made in Parliament by Hon. N. W. Rowell—Status of the Self-Governing Dominions is Recognized—No Official Information to Hand as to the Date on Which the Treaty will be Signed.**

Ottawa, April 11—An announcement by Hon. N. W. Rowell president of the privy council in the commons this afternoon that Sir Robert Borden, Sir George Foster, Hon. C. J. Doherty and Hon. Arthur Sifton had been appointed plenipotentiaries to sign the peace treaty on behalf of Canada at the conclusion of the peace conference marks a new step in the development of the status of Canada and the other overseas dominions. The order-in-council which was tabled by the minister is the recognition of the status of the dominions at the peace conference. It is couched in the usual terms of orders-in-council naming plenipotentiaries on behalf of his majesty and gives the ministers named power and authority as from Jan. 1, 1919, to conclude with such plenipotentiaries as may be vested with similar "powers and authority on the part of any powers or states any treaties, conventions or agreements in connection with the said peace conference and to sign for and in the name of his majesty the king in respect of the Dominion of Canada everything as agreed upon and conclude and to transact all such other matters as may appertain thereto."

### Dominions by Themselves

The chief party to the signing of the peace agreement it is claimed is his majesty the king representing the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the overseas dominions and India. The order-in-council is a request to his majesty to issue a commission to each of the four Canadian representatives of Canada to sign the peace treaty. As the other overseas dominions are on the same footing as Canada this means that instead of the treaty being signed by one set of plenipotentiaries it will be signed by plenipotentiaries representing the United Kingdom and each of the self-governing dominions of the empire.

This is the second distinct change in the status of the self-governing dominions in respect to the signing of treaties. At first treaties were signed by the representatives of the empire and were binding on the whole empire. More recently as the status of the overseas dominions have become more fully recognized it has been provided that treaties should not apply to the dominions unless they indicate their assent thereto and procedure was outlined, whereby the dominions might indicate their assent. A comparatively recent instance was the assent given some years ago to the treaty between Great Britain and Japan.

### Soon Before the House

When the order-in-council was tabled Dr. H. P. Whidden of Brandon, asked if there was any information as to when the treaty would be ready for

ratification, and there was a possibility of setting aside a time for consideration of its terms by the house.

Sir Thomas said he had no official information as to the date on which the peace treaty would be signed. He was not aware that the date had been fixed. Yesterday an order was made for the printing of the covenant and at a later date it would be open to the house to discuss the matter, if so desired.

Mr. MacKenzie, leader of the opposition asked if the house would have an opportunity to consider the peace treaty before it was signed.

Sir Thomas White—"I should say not. The peace treaty is under consideration. When it is ready for signature I should think it would not be possible to have it discussed by the legislatures of the countries concerned. I think it would be very desirable that the peace treaty should be signed after it has been agreed upon by the five great powers as early as possible the world."

After signatures by the various plenipotentiaries Sir Thomas added, the treaty when necessary would come before the legislature for ratification.

This afternoon in the commons, the bill creating a department of public health was read a third time and goes to the senate.

The house then went into committee on a senate bill to amend the juvenile delinquents act, 1908. The bill, Mr. Meighen said, merely defined the term "Roman Catholic" as used in the act.

"Cinderella", a fanciful musical version of the famous fairy story, in pantomime form, will be the attraction at the Opera House for Good Friday, April 18th.

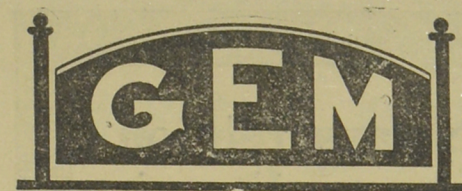

### Large Market This Morning

In spite of the wet weather a good sized market larger than the average, collected at Phoenix Square today. The prevailing prices were about the same as last week although some obstinate sellers held out for higher prices. Maple honey is becoming more plentiful in the market and this morning it sold for 50 cents a bottle and several purchasers succeeded in getting it for 45 cents. Beef and veal held the usual price, the former going for 12 to 16 cents a pound, while the latter sold for 10 to 15 cents a pound. Butter sold for 65 cents a pound and eggs called for 35 cents a dozen, finding ready purchasers in holding out for \$3.25 for a barrel of potatoes, but needless to say she didn't get it, even though potatoes were scarce in the market. Turnips sold for 90 cents a barrel while carrots brought \$1.15 a half barrel.
