### JUVENILE MEMBERS WILL BE ADMITTED

Ten Acres Adjoining Course to be Acquired—Officers Re-elected—Club Flourishing.

The Fredericton Golf Club held a meeting last evening at the Board of Trade Rooms with about thirty members in attendance. The election of officers took place and several resolutions were passed. The extension of the golf course was one matter of consideration.

### Two Holes to be Added

A resolution was passed to add to the golf grounds a field some ten acres in extent situated west of the present grounds. This will mean the addition of two more holes to the course. A resolution was passed to take juveniles into the club from sixteen to eighteen years with a fee of \$5 and certain restrictions were to be added concerning the hours of play. It was found by the club that there were three vacancies in the membership. Some further stock was disposed of at a good price to cover the purchase of the field for the extension of the grounds.

A motion was discussed regarding a change of bye-laws as several of the members did not think it was right to have the same members on the management committee each year. It was decided that the two candidates for the management committee who had the highest total number of votes would be eliminated from taking part in the contest the following year.

## CONFERENCE OF DEP. MNISTERS AT OTTAWA

### E. P. BRADT WILL LEAVE SATURDAY TO ATTEND

H. S. Arkold, Chief Livestock Commissioner, Will Present Policy for Developing British Trade.

Mr. E. P. Bradt, Deputy Minister of Agriculture for New Brunswick, will leave Saturday night for Ottawa where he will attend a meeting of Deputy Ministers of Agriculture from the various provinces called by Mr. H. S. Arkold, Dominion Livestock Commissioner, for the purpose of considering the course to be taken by Canada and its nine provinces to take advantage of the present state of the British market and obtain a footing for Canadian farm and dairy products.

### To Outline Policy

Mr. Arkold recently returned from England where he had been studying conditions. He has formulated a policy to be adopted in the marketing of Canadian products in the British Isles. Beef, mutton, pork and pork products, poultry, eggs, butter and cheese are the products which it is expected will be in great demand from Canada. The war has disorganized production in a number of European countries which previously supplied the British market with products of the nature named.

### Chief Competitors

The Argentine Republic has made great strides recently in the production of beef the quality having been improved to such an extent that the Argentine is generally recognized now as producing the best beef in the world. Denmark is expected to make especial efforts in raising pork. Canada must meet this competition by improving the quality of her products. The policy to be outlined by Mr. Arkold will deal with that improvement. Mr. Arkold will return to England shortly.
