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BIG POULTRY SHOW IS BEING HELD THIS WEEK IN CITY OF NEW YORK

Elite of the Domesticated Feather World on Exhibition at Madison Square Garden—Some Handsome Birds Being Shown and Attracting Much Attention.

Birds of beauty, birds of laying qualities and birds that produce good, substantial meat for dinner time were on display yesterday at the opening of the thirtieth annual exhibition of the New York Poultry and Pigeon Association at Madison Square Garden. All the elite of the domesticated feathered world was on hand to try for the prizes from the huge coochins down to the tiny bantams. If you were a casual observer who went in to the big arena just to pass the time you looked for the odd and picturesque; if you lived down on a farm you were on the lookout for the utility bird which was not so much on appearance but which could deliver the goods against the high cost of living.

The government had an exhibit in the case of birds that had remarkable records in the matter of laying eggs. There was a huge white Plymouth Rock, which looked a whole lot different from the ordinary barnyard fowl which had a record of depositing eighty-four eggs in her nest in ninety-two days. Right close by there was a white Wyandotte which laid 219 eggs in her pullet year, and a Rhode Island red which had a mark of 217. These cacklers were some of the best egg producers in the place.

Golden Penciled Hamburgs

The ordinary spectator, though, was far more interested in the odd looking birds that were plumed so beautifully that one could hardly believe they ever did such a plebian thing as lay an egg. Just as one goes into the Garden, on the left hand side of the huge exhibit, there are some golden penciled Hamburgs, which attracted immediate attention. These are a rather new breed in the Garden and they are quite scarce. John A. Gamewell, who

raises them as a hobby at his farm at Little Silver, N. J. had the prize winners. He said that in thirty years he had raised probably twenty-five different varieties, but this breed appealed to him most. He stated that it was their beauty which struck him first but he found that they were also good layers and that the eggs had a very distinct and pleasing flavor. They are the nearest of the domestic fowl in coloring to pheasants that there are. The hens could be well mistaken for a pheasant, but the cocks are a rich mahogany with green tail feathers pencilled as if by an artist in a golden striping. They are said to have originated in Holland in spite of the Teutonic appellation. Their flesh is dark like a pheasant and has a taste that is different from the ordinary fowl of the market.

Right next to them are the golden spangled Hamburgs and in their gorgeous coloring they remind one of some trophic bird. Another neighbor is the white crested black Polish hen. One cannot help but think of the noted Polish pianist Paderewski when he looks at these. They have the same shaped thatch of head covering that he has, only it looks like a chrysanthemum. The contrast of the snowy billow of feathers atop the black body is very striking. These are only a few picked out at random. An observer could spend a day looking around and find something every minute more interesting, perhaps than the minute before.

Helmet Pigeons Attractive

One of the chief attractions in the pigeon section is the helmet pigeons. These birds attract the service boys back from the front, for they look for all the world as if they had been handed out their "tin hats" to go into

New York, Jan. 24.—The British "Who's Who," a copy of the 1919 issue of which has just been received here, lists the commander in chief of the American Expeditionary Force in France as "General Sir John Joseph Pershing, G. C. B."

On July 17, 1918, King George V. awarded the Grand Cross of the Order of the Bath to a British subject automatically makes a knight of the recipient and gives him the right to prefix "Sir" to his name.

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All Kinds of Jobbing Repairs.
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Three heaping tablespoonfuls of macaroni baked with cheese contains as much nourishment as one-half a pound of lean roast beef.

To preserve fresh apples, use dry sand which has been heated and cooled again. Cover bottom of stone jar with sand, put in one layer of apples, having the fruit about one-half inch apart, cover with the sand, put in another layer of apples, and so on till the jar is full. The jar must be closed airtight and kept in a cool place. The sand will keep the apples dry and preserve the flavor.

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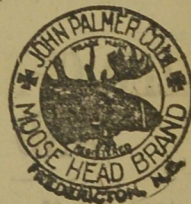
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
