## WISE LEGISLATION.

The bill adopted by the Legislature this week to provide farms for returned soldiers is a splendid measure and is certain to give satisfaction, not only to returned soldiers, but to the people as well. When the measure was before the House some members of the opposition tried to pick flaws in it, but found the energetic Minister of Agriculture right on the job with explanations that must have convinced them that all details of the measure had been carefully thought out. It is gratifying to note that in providing farms for returned soldiers New Brunswick is prepared to go farther than any other province of Canada.

The Federal government's plan to loan money to soldiers who intended to take up farming was originally intended to apply only to the west, but through the efforts of Premier Foster and Hon. Mr. Tweeddale, an amendment was made letting the east in on the arrangement.

Hon. Mr. Tweeddale, who piloted the bill through the committee stage, showed by the explanations he made that he had given the whole question very careful thought and attention. The Minister of Agriculture may not know as much about law as Mr. Baxter, but when it comes to a discussion of matters relating to agriculture he has nothing to learn from the ex-Attorney General. This province never had a Minister of Agriculture who has brought more sound common sense, practical knowledge and business capacity into the administration of his department than has Hon. Mr. Tweeddale.

## THE GLOBE'S VIEW.

The St. John Globe, in some further comment on the shocking disclosures made at the potato enquiry, tenders some good advice to the opposition members of the Legislature. Here is what it says:

"An opposition party decision to argue that the province lost nothing; that the money Tennant paid was his own money; that Commissioner McQueen was partisan, would be nothing more nor less than an opposition party decision to condone the facts disclosed, to shield the guilty and to lend the party name and the party strength to a whitewash. For the honor of the province whose good name was dragged through the mire, and for the individual honor of the men who were as grossly deceived as was the province itself, it is sincerely hoped nothing of that kind will be attempted, and if attempted will fail as absolutely and completely as it deserves to fail. The opposition, in and out of the House, should not permit itself to be made the tool of the men who abused the trust reposed in them as shamelessly as the Valley Railroad and Patriotic Potato evidence disclosed that trust was abused, in some instances for purely private gain. No reason exists why the clean men of the opposition party should assume responsibility for the unpatriotic, unworthy and discreditable acts of leaders who, instead of being supported, should be driven from public life.

"Theirs is the duty, the responsibility and the privilege of establishing the right of the party they represent to public confidence."

Following the report that Sir George Perley is to resign the High Commissionership in London, comes a rumor that he may be succeeded by Mr. Lloyd Harris, ex-M. P., of Brantford. Mr. Harris is a successful manufacturer and while serving as Trade Commissioner at Washington during the war, he obtained millions in war contracts for Canada. He is a live business man and should he get the London post it is safe to say that his time will not all be taken up in social activities.

The action of the Legislature in increasing the age limit of jurors from 60 to 65 years will meet with general approval. It is ridiculous to say that a man of 65 is not just as competent to serve on a jury as a youth of 21.

The great European war seems to have been the means of rolling back the dead line.

The Comte France-Amerique, an institute engaged in promoting good relations between France and the North American continent, announces the formation of a Canadian section which will make its intention more widely known in France. A Canadian commission already has been formed.

### Week-end Market

The week-end market was quite largely attended this morning both by teams and buyers. Butter showed an inclination to climb and starting with 60 cents it climbed to 65 cents a pound. Eggs remained at last week's price of 45 cents a dozen. Beef sold for 12 to 16 cents a pound and veal sold from 10 to 16 cents a pound. Potatoes were plentiful selling for \$2.50 a barrel while turnips sold for \$1 a barrel. Carrots called for \$1.25 a half barrel.

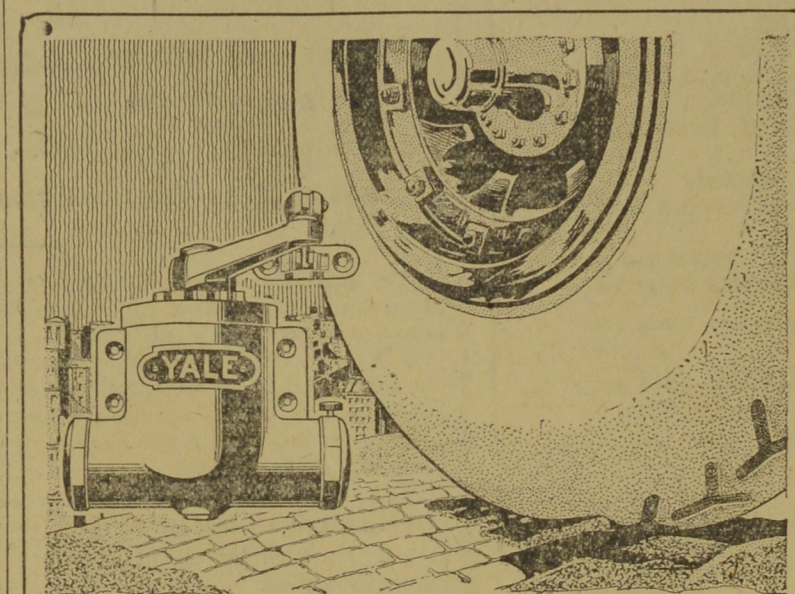

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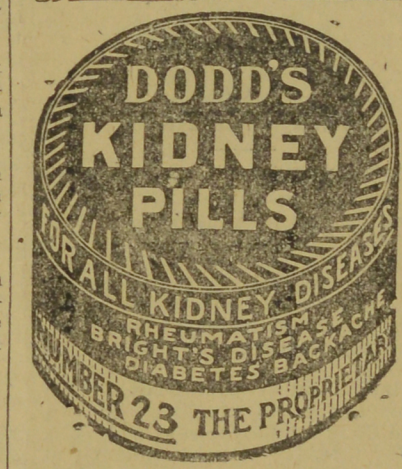

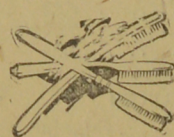
