

PUDDINGS WITHOUT EGGS.

Rice and Apple.

Boil one-fourth cup rice in one and one-half cups water and one-fourth teaspoon salt till water is almost absorbed, then add one-half cup of brown sugar and pour over three medim-sized apples which have been pared, quartered and cored and put in baking dish. Bake till apples are tender, for about one hour, and serve warm with cream or butter.

Rice Date Pudding.

Put one glass of rich milk into a buttered pudding dish, add two tablespoons of washed rice and the same amount of sugar. Place in a slow oven and when it becomes hot add a pinch of salt. Bake one hour, then add one-half pound of washed and chopped dates and bake until thick, stirring frequently.

Velvet Rice Pudding.

One quart of milk, two tablespoons rice, three tablespoons sugar, a little salt and nutmeg, a handful of raisins and butter the size of an egg. Put all in bean pot and bake in very slow oven five hours, stirring often until half an hour before serving. Serve hot with or without cream.

Apricot Rice Pudding.

Four cups cold boiled rice, two cups sugar, two cups dried apricots, one cup boiling water. Arrange in layers, first rice, then fruit, sugar and so on, having rice on top. Pour boiling water over the top and bake one hour, covered closely. Serve with cream or milk.

HOUSEHOLD WISDOM.

When black shoes attain a rusty appearance, rub them with an equal quantity of black ink and olive oil.

When mixing a mustard poultice use the white of egg. This will obviate all blistering and will in no wise affect the efficacy of the poultice.

A piano is quite as sensitive to any changes of temperature as an invalid. It should not be placed near the fire because the heat draws the wood and it should not be near an open window on a damp day because the wires are apt to rust.

Next time you whip cream use a teaspoonful of strained honey instead of sugar to sweeten it. It will give a delicious flavor and you can whip the cream early in the day at your leisure because it will remain firm all day.

If meat is left over in large quantities, it can be used for salads, hash or croquettes. In smaller portions it can be mixed with left-over vegetables and savory seasonings and converted into an appetizing stew or meat pie. Or it can be made into a scalloped dish with the addition of tomatoes, macaroni or rice.

When purchasing a hair mattress, select one filled with black hair. The white hair is usually a bleached variety and thereby has been deprived of its springiness and it mats more quickly than the black or even the gray hair.

When the cake of soap becomes so thin that it has reached the point of breaking, moisten it and do likewise with a full cake, then firmly press the two together and let it remain to dry for a couple of days. You will then have a solid cake of soap and no waste.

Soap and water will take the paint from woodwork. You can easily remove finger marks by rubbing them with a piece of clean flannel dipped into kerosene. Then wipe with a cloth wrung out of hot water to destroy the kerosene odor.

Ether will cleanse white satin collars beautifully. Sponging the soiled spots will leave a ring. Better results will be secured if the ether is poured into a bowl and half the collar is immersed and squeezed at a time.

Try vinegar and salt for cleaning brass or copper. Apply this hot and then thoroughly wash it off to prevent speedy tarnishing. A little oil rubbed on the metal after washing it will more effectually prevent tarnish.

The wash wringer usually wears out first at the ends where pressure is used. If you take several yards of twine and wind this evenly along the roller, being careful to wind it very close, even when the rubber is thin, you will save the expense of a new roller.

A CREAMY LOTION MADE WITH LEMONS

Prepare a quarter pint at about
the cost of a small jar of
common cold cream.

When this home-made lemon lotion is gently massaged into the face, neck, hands and arms daily, the skin naturally should become soft, clear and white, and the complexion dainty and attractive.

What girl or woman hasn't heard of lemon juice to remove complexion blemishes; to bleach the skin and to bring out the roses, the freshness and the hidden beauty? But lemon juice alone is acid, therefore irritating, and should be mixed with orchard white this way. Strain through a fine cloth the juice of two fresh lemons into a bottle containing about three ounces of orchard white, then shake well and you have a whole quarter pint of skin and complexion lotion at about the cost one usually pays for a small jar of ordinary cold cream. Be sure to strain the lemon juice so no pulp gets into the bottle. Then this lotion will remain pure and fresh for months. When applied daily to the face, neck, arms and hands it naturally should help to whiten, clear, smoothen and beautify.

Any druggist will supply three ounces of orchard white at very little cost and the grocer has the lemons. In this sweetly fragrant lemon lotion ladies can easily prepare and have inexpensive toilet aid which perfectly satisfies their natural desire for a beautiful soft skin.

BRIEF BUT USEFUL RECIPES.

Kill Insect Life.—Burn sulphur in a tightly closed room. It will kill almost all insect life and their eggs and larvae.

Make Leather Waterproof.—Saturate it with castor oil; to stop shoes squeaking, drive a peg into the middle of the sole.

Remove Tar from Cloth.—Rub it well with turpentine till every trace is removed.

Egg Stains on Spoons.—Rub with common salt.

Fruit Stains on Hands.—Wash the hands in clear water, dry slightly and while still moist strike a sulphur match and hold your hands around the flame.

Restore Gift Frames.—Rub with a sponge moistened with turpentine.

Clean Gloves.—Pour a little benzine into a basin and wash the gloves in it, rubbing and squeezing them until clean. If much soiled, they must be washed again through clean benzine and rinsed in a fresh supply. Hang in the air to dry.

Clean Hair Brushes.—Dissolve a little soda in warm water and pour in a small amount of ammonia. Hold the brushes with the bristles downward and avoid wetting the back as far as possible; shake until the grease is removed; then rinse in cold water and put in the air to dry.

Remove Stains from Linen.—Wet the part stained and lay on it some salt of wormwood; then rub without diluting it with more water.

Clean the Hair.—Wash well with a mixture of soft water, 1 pint; sal soda 1 ounce; cream tartar ¼ ounce.

Remove Mildew from Cloth.—Put a teaspoonful of chloride of lime into a quart of water, strain it twice, then dip the mildewed places in this weak solution and lay in the sun. If not effective the first time repeat.

Cure Mosquito Bites.—Put ten drops of refined carbolic acid into an ounce of rose water; shake well and apply. (If you hold your breath while a mosquito has its bill in you it cannot withdraw it until you breathe again).

How to Remove a Rusty Screw.—Apply a red hot iron to the head for a short time, the screw-driver being applied immediately while the screw is hot.
