DEBATE ON McQUEEN REPORT TO TAKE PLACE

Committees Will Begin Work Tuesday Morning—Notice of Motion re Potato Investigation.

The week which will begin at 8.30 p. m. Monday after the usual week-end recess of the Legislature is expected to be one of the most interesting in years. The committees will get at work on Tuesday. The Public Accounts Committee will sit for the first time on Tuesday morning and other important committees will sit later in the week.

Budget on Tuesday

On Tuesday the budget will be brought down by Provincial Secretary Treasurer Murray and an interesting debate is expected to follow.

McQueen Report

The greatest bone of contention of the session is expected to be the report of Commissioner McQueen on the Patriotic Potato Gift. This was tabled in the House last week. It is understood that Monday night a notice of motion will be given by a member of the Government concerning that important document. The members of the House who are concerned by the report will be given an opportunity of making a statement after which the House will debate the matter. It is expected that the debate will begin Thursday night.

The member concerned will withdraw prior to the debate.

Reception.

The case against three colored men for violation of the Game Act came before Police Magistrate Limerick on Thursday afternoon. The charge was withdrawn by the prosecution. G. T. Feeney appeared for the defence and P. J. Hughes for the prosecution.

Burt's Corner Band Re-organized

The Burt's Corner Band has been re-organized under the leadership of Bandmaster James White of Fredericton, who had charge of the band prior to going overseas as leader of the 12th Battalion Band, C. E. F. The band consists of sixteen pieces.

Fire This Morning

The firemen were called out this morning at three o'clock to answer a still alarm call sent in from the residence of Miss Allen, University Avenue. The fire was under the roof and a section of the roof had to be cut out to get at it. The use of the hand extinguishers was also required.

Death at Springhill

The death occurred last evening at Springhill of Pauline Beatrice Cass, child of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Cass from pneumonia following an attack of influenza. The deceased was three years of age and is survived by her parents and two brothers. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon, interment being made at the Baptist Cemetery. Rev. A. D. McLeod will conduct the service.

Game Violation Case Heard

John H. Connell and William Connell were before Magistrate Limerick yesterday afternoon charged with killing a moose at or near Brown's Flats on Sunday, March 2nd. They went on their own defence and were convicted of having moose meat in their possession during the close season and were fined \$100 each. Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon was prosecutor.

Meeting of Technical Committee

A meeting of the Technical Education Committee of the Fredericton Board of Trade was held last evening at the Board of Trade rooms on Queen Street to discuss with Mr. Fletcher Peacock the outlook for vocational training. Some proposed amendments to the present act were suggested at this session, which are to be handed in to Mr. Fred Magee, M. P. P. chairman of the Vocational Board, by the Committee. The proposed amendment will be considered by the Vocational Board on Wednesday of next week.

CAPT. ALLAN GOOD RETURNS AFTER LENGTHY SERVICE

WAS IN COMMAND OF 9TH TRENCH MORTAR BATT'Y

His Brother, Capt. Alvah Good, Has Recovered from the Effects of Airplane Accident.

Capt. Allan Good son of Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Good arrived home from overseas last evening. Capt. Good came in on the Baltic on Thursday with the 42nd Battalion and other units. He speaks of meeting his brother Capt. Alvah Good in England and states that he is totally recovered from the effects of his airplane accident.

Capt. Allan Good received a commission as lieutenant with the 140th Battalion in 1915 and went overseas with that battalion. Shortly after arriving in England the 140th Battalion was broken up and was transferred to the 60th Battalion. After spending about a month with the 60th Battalion he was transferred to the 9th Trench Mortar Battery in France. He was in command of that Battery when the Armistice was signed having been given his captaincy in France.

Capt. Alvah Good went overseas from Halifax with a draft of the Composite Battalion in which he had received his appointment as lieutenant. He was later transferred to the 28th Battalion with which he served in France. He was wounded at the Battle of the Somme and spent some time in hospital convalescing. He was then transferred to the Royal Flying Corps and started training. He received his captaincy as well as his observer's wing and had a few hours to pass in order to complete his training when he met with a painful accident. He was in hospital for considerable time unable to speak but has recovered and is out and around as before.

Forwarded to Ottawa

The bill for damages to the Exhibition property in this city due to occupation by the Militia Department during the war has been forwarded to Ottawa, Agricultural Society No. 34 which owns the property was represented by William McKay, president; W. E. Farrell, vice-president; W. S. Hooper, secretary. The Militia Department was represented by a board composed of the following officers: Major F. F. May, Major B. Smith, Capt. M. W. Burke and Lieut. H. C. Parker with Capt. G. E. Logan as legal adviser.

FOREST SERVICE CONFERENCE HERE EARLY IN APRIL

REPRESENTATIVES FROM QUEBEC AND MAINE

Many Problems to be Discussed—Busy Week Ahead of Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon.

Members of the staff of the New Brunswick Department of Lands and Mines will meet in conference in this city, Wednesday April 2nd, and the day following for the purpose of discussing problems concerned with the forests of the province. All parts of the province will be represented and it is expected that the department will be much benefited.

From Other Departments

Representatives of the Forest Services of Maine and Quebec also will be in attendance at the conference to compare notes with the members of the New Brunswick service and give the benefit of their experience.

Prosecuting Game Act Violators

Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon will have a very busy week next week prosecuting violators against the Game Act on every day. He will begin on Monday at Moncton and later will prosecute at Andover, Anderson, Campbellton and Grand Falls. Prosecutions under the Game Act have been more numerous recently than in some years previous. This is due to the fact that the activities of the game wardens have been greater than ever before. The Chief Game Warden does not believe that violations have been more numerous than usual.

To Hold Booster's Meeting

At a conference held in St. John yesterday it was decided to hold a Boosters' Meeting in St. John June 3rd and 4th for the purpose of uniting on a campaign for stimulating the tourist traffic in this province. Fredericton was represented at yesterday's conference by Ald. T. S. Wilkinson and W. Harry Allen of Penniac represented the New Brunswick Guides' Association of which he is president.

Lieut. D. R. Smith Returns

Among the returned men who arrived in the city on Wednesday was Lieut. David R. Smith, son of Capt. David Smith of St. Martins, N. B. and a brother of Mrs. A. E. Eardley of this city. Lieut. Smith enlisted with the 115th Battalion in 1915 and had gained the rank of Quartermaster Sergeant when he went overseas in 1916. He was transferred to the Canadian Railway troops and spent two years and a half in France with that unit finally being commissioned. Lieut. Smith is a graduate of the U. N. B.

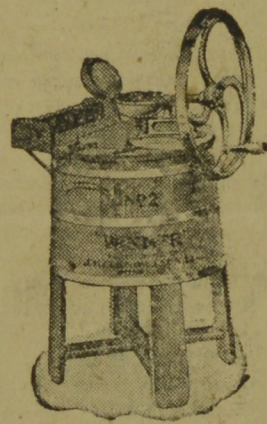

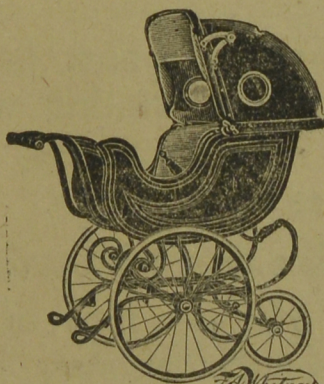
