## MR. DAGGETT HEARD FROM.

Rev. J. B. Daggett, one of the heroes of the notorious patriotic potato scandal, has broken what he is pleased to call his silence and has written a letter to the press in which he attempts to answer some statements recently given to the public by Mr. J. C. Manzer, Canadian Trade Commissioner in Cuba. The reverend gentleman's letter is a weak and foolish production and makes the worst of what is generally conceded to be a very bad case. He does not attempt to reply to the damaging statements of Mr. Manzer, but dodges behind the pulpit from which safe vantage ground he tells the Cuban official that he would like nothing better than to have a few rounds with him, and boastfully declares that he could "finish" him in twenty minutes.


The letter written by Mr. Manzer, it might be explained, was in reply to certain statements made by Rev. Mr. Daggett under oath before Commissioner McQueen. Here is a sample extract from the letter:

"You intimated that you came to Cuba the second time, which was nearly a year after the potatoes were sold (you were here the second time in January, 1916) to investigate the matter as to whether the condition of the potatoes was as represented. Why not admit candidly that you came to Cuba to pay Mr. Waite the amount of his bill and also to try and get from the consignees who received these damaged potatoes a false statement showing that the potatoes were sold at a much higher price than was actually received? When you failed to get these statements, you went home and accused me of making up evidence, these false statements made up in New York and all other his letter produced."

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My enemies that they are free to go. But if circumstances shape themselves to retire from my presence and enter the lists with me, I will soon learn I too will be able to take care of myself in public and "thrice is he armed who quarrel just." Nothing can make me more than the private meeting certain individuals face upon the public platform, an intelligent, fair-minded New Brunswick audience before us. I am satisfied to rest my case with honest men and women among whom I have lived and with whom I have done business. As for Mr. Manzer, who, by the way, occupies his present position in a large measure by my influence and friendship, all I ask would be to meet him before an audience of my fellow citizens for just 20 minutes; that would be sufficient for his finish."

Nobody connected with the present provincial government is likely to tremble over the possibility of Mr. Daggett re-entering politics and going after his enemies; but if they were actuated solely by a desire to serve the party and not the state, they could not wish for anything better to happen. Were Mr. Daggett to decide to "come back" the men who would be called upon to do the worrying would be those whom the Legislature by resolution declared to be guilty of conduct "highly reprehensible and calculated to lower the standard of public life in this province." These men, both in public and private do not hesitate to say that the patriotic potato scandal was due to the blundering incapacity of the then Secretary of Agriculture, to wit, the Rev. J. B. Daggett. It is safe to say that if these men have any influence with the Marysville

pastor he will remain out of politics for the rest of his natural life, and if he has any regard for their feelings he will stop writing letters to the press.

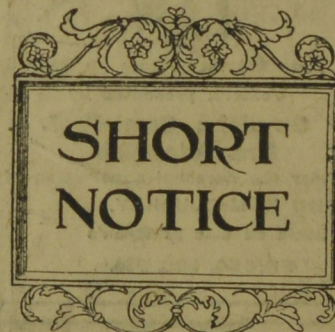
