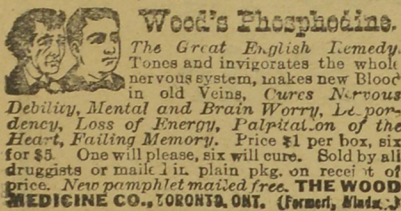

### TABLE OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

4 teaspoons of a liquid equal 1 table-  
spoon.  
4 tablespoons of a liquid equal ½ gill  
or ¼ cup.  
½ cup equals 1 gill.  
2 gills equal one cup.  
2 cups equal 1 pint.  
2 pints (4 cups) equal 1 quart.  
4 cups of flour equal 1 pound, or 1  
quart.  
2 cups of butter, solid, equals 1 lb.  
½ cup of butter, solid, equals ¼ lb.  
or 4 ounces.  
2 cups of granulated sugar equal 1 lb.  
2½ cups of powdered sugar equal 1 lb.  
1 pint of milk or water equals 1 lb.  
1 pint of chopped meat equals 1 lb.  
10 eggs, shelled, equal 1 pound.  
4 tablespoons of flour equal 1 ounce.  
8 eggs with shells equal 1 pound.  
2 tablespoons of butter equal 1 ounce.  
2 tablespoons of granulated sugar  
equal 1 ounce.  
4 tablespoons of butter equal 2 ounces  
or ¼ cup.  
4 tablespoons of coffee equal 1 ounce.  
1 tablespoon of liquid equals a half-

### TIME FOR BAKING.

Beans—8 to 10 hours.  
Beef—Sirloin, rare, per lb., 8 to 10  
minutes; well done, per lb., 12 to 15  
minutes; rolled rib or rump, per lb.,  
12 to 15 minutes; long or short fillet,  
20 to 30 minutes.  
Bread—Medium loaf, 40 to 60 min  
Cake—Plain, 20 to 40 minutes.  
Biscuit—10 to 20 minutes.  
Sponge Cake—45 to 60 minutes.  
Chickens—3 to 4 lbs weight, 1 to  
one and a half hours.  
Cookies—10 to 15 minutes.  
Custards—15 to 20 minutes.  
Duck (tame)—40 to 60 minutes.  
Fish—6 to 8 lbs., 1 hour.  
Gingerbread—20 to 30 minutes.  
Graham Gems—30 minutes.  
Lamb—Well done, per lb., 15 min.  
Mutton—Rare, per lb., 10 minutes,  
well done, per lb., 15 minutes.  
Pie crust—30 to 40 minutes.  
Pork—Well done, per lb., 30 min.  
Potatoes—30 to 45 minutes.  
Pudding—Bread, rice and tapioca,  
1 hour; plum, 2 to 3 hours.  
Rolls—10 to 15 minutes.  
Turkey—70 lbs., 3 hours.  
Veal—Well done, per lb., 20 minutes

### BRIEF BUT USEFUL RECIPES.

Restore Gilt Frames.—Rub with a  
sponge moistened with turpentine.  
Drive Away Anns.—A little quick  
lime placed in the infested places.  
Remove Tar from Cloth.—Rub it  
well with turpentine till every trace  
is removed.  
Make Leather Waterproof.—Satur-  
ate it with castor oil; to stop shoes  
squaking, drive a peg into the middle  
of the sole.  
Clean the Hair.—Wash well with a  
mixture of soft water, 1 pint; sal soda  
1 ounce; cream tartar ¼ ounce.  
Egg Stains on Spoons.—Rub with  
common salt.  
Clean Gloves.—Pour a little ben-  
zine into a basin and wash the gloves  
in it, rubbing and squeezing them un-  
til clean. If much soiled, they must  
be washed again through clean ben-  
zine and rinsed in a fresh supply.  
Hang in the air to dry.  
Clean Hair Brushes.—Dissolve a lit-  
tle soda in warm water and pour in a  
small amount of ammonia. Hold the  
brushes with the bristles downward  
and avoid wetting the back as far as  
possible; shake until the grease is  
removed; then rinse in cold water and  
put in the air to dry.  
Remove Mildew from Cloth.—Put a  
teaspoonful of chloride of lime into a  
quart of water, strain it twice, then  
dip the mildewed places in this weak  
solution and lay in the sun. If not ef-  
fective the first time repeat.  
How to Remove a Rusty Screw.—  
Apply a red hot iron to the head for  
applied immediately while the screw  
is hot.  
Cure Mosquito Bites.—Put ten drops  
of refined carbolic acid into an ounce  
of rose water; shake well and apply.  
(If you hold your breath while a mos-  
quito has its bill in you it cannot  
draw it until you breathe again).

## YORK-SUNBURY LIBERALS SELECTED DELEGATES

The Gathering was Well Attended and Most Harmonious—

Messrs. R. B. Smith, P. J. Hughes and C. N. Goodspeed Se-  
lected as Delegates, with D. W. Mersereau, M. P. P., Lieut.  
Col. Osborne and ex-Warden Fawcett as Substitutes.

The convention of the Liberals of  
York-Sunbury to nominate delegates  
to attend the Dominion Liberal Con-  
vention in Ottawa in August was held  
Saturday afternoon in the Y. M. C. A.  
building, Rork Street. The proceedings  
were marked by absolute harmony  
and unanimity of opinion and every  
evidence of reunion of the party. The  
business was confined to the election  
of a secretary and a treasurer and  
the choice of delegates and substitutes  
for the Ottawa convention.

The season of the year was most  
unfavorable to a large attendance  
from the farming districts but never-  
theless there was a very representa-  
tive attendance from both counties of  
the constituency.

### Election of Officers

The chair was taken by ex-Ald. A.  
H. VanHart of Fredericton, president.  
The resignation of C. L. Sypher from  
the office of Secretary treasurer con-  
sequent to accepting an office under  
the Provincial Government, was for-  
mally accepted. J. B. Dickson was  
nominated as secretary on the motion  
of N. W. Brown seconded by Col. W.  
J. Osborne but declined on account of  
press of business which would pre-  
vent him from giving the attention to  
the duties which they deserved. He  
was pressed to reconsider his decision  
but said that he must adhere to it.  
G. T. Feeney then was elected secre-  
tary on the motion of P. J. Hughes  
seconded by N. W. Brown. J. B. Dick-  
son was elected treasurer on the mo-  
tion of D. W. Mersereau, M. P. P.,  
seconded by Col. Osborne.

### Selection of Delegates

Mr. Brown stated that there were  
funds to the credit of the organization  
also that there was a question in the  
minds of some concerning the pay-  
ment of expenses of delegates to Ot-  
tawa. The chairman said that accord-  
ing to arrangement, delegates would  
pay their own expenses.

Mr. Hughes pointed out that the se-  
lection of delegates was a matter of  
importance as the duty to be perform-  
ed by the Ottawa convention would  
be threefold,—the preparation of a  
platform, the outlining of a campaign  
and the choice of a leader. All were  
important, the selection of a leader  
particularly so. Mr. Brown as a can-  
didate in Liberal interests in the last  
election could attend the convention  
as a delegate. All Liberal premiers of  
provinces were also delegates ex of-  
ficio. In the selection of delegates it  
would be well to follow a suggestion  
of the chairman and provide for dis-  
tinct representation for Sunbury  
County. Substitutes also should be se-  
lected to fill any possible vacancies.

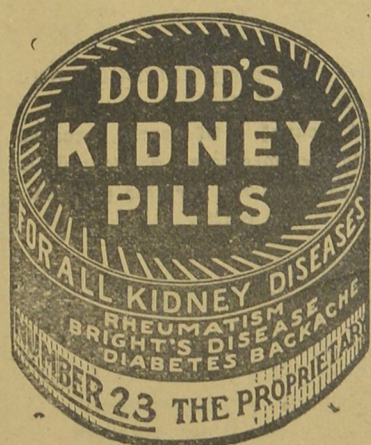
Mr. Dickson spoke along similar  
lines.  
Proceeding to the choice of dele-  
gates the convention selected P. J.  
Hughes of Fredericton, R. B. Smith  
M. P. P., of Oromocto and C. N. Good-  
speed of Penniac. In choosing substi-  
tutes the convention selected Lt. Col.  
W. J. Osborne of Fredericton substi-  
tute for Mr. Hughes, W. R. Fawcett  
of Southampton substitute for Mr.  
Goodspeed and D. W. Mersereau, M.  
P. P., of Fredericton Junction substi-  
tute for Mr. Smith.

Mr. Mersereau explained that  
twelve delegates would be selected by  
the Provincial Government and he had  
reasons to believe that his colleague  
Mr. Smith would be one of the twelve.  
In that event he as substitute would

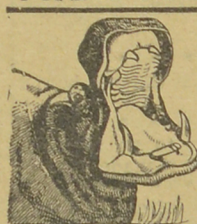

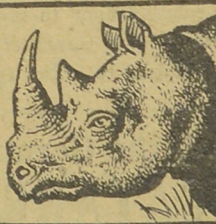
