CHANCELLOR JONES
WILL VISIT ST. JOHN

Graduates, Former Students
and Public Being Approach-
ed—Business Men Re-
spond Readily.

Organization of those who will canvass Fredericton and vicinity on behalf of the University of New Brunswick Memorial Building, has been completed and the canvassers have been covering the city for some days. Dr. C. C. Jones, chancellor, stated this morning that the response to the canvassers had been ready in the majority of cases, and that all persons who are considered to be interested in the University will be approached.

Appeal in Fredericton
In Fredericton the appeal will be directed to people of all classes and particularly to the business men, because of this city being the location of the Provincial University. With a general feeling of optimism in the air and general confidence in the future of the province it is expected that the response will be generous.

Encouraging Results
Several prominent business men and firms of the city have subscribed two hundred and fifty dollars each and other pledges are but little less. The younger graduates also are responding well to the appeal from Alma Mater.

HEAVY SESSION FOR MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

REVISION OF BY-LAWS
WILL BE LARGE ITEM

Municipal Farm Project Expected to be Discussed Once More—Jury Fees to be Considered.

The semi-annual session of the Municipal Council of York County will open in the Council Chamber at the Court House at two o'clock Wednesday afternoon and the session which probably will continue until Friday afternoon, will see much important business transacted. One of the most important items of business to come before the Council will be the revision of the bylaws of the county. Mr. C. D. Richards, County Solicitor, has been at work on revision for some time and the results of his labor will be presented to the Council.

Jury Fees
It is expected also that there will be discussion on the matter of jury fees and probably action to increase the fees and mileage will be taken. Recent legislation which changed the methods of selecting juries made it optional with the municipalities to increase the mileage and fees which may be paid jurymen by the municipalities. As for some time there has been a feeling that jurymen from rural districts have not been receiving enough to pay their expenses while serving, it is probable that there will be a movement to give them better treatment.

Municipal Home
It also is expected that the Municipal Home project will be revived. When before the Council at a previous session it was voted down but legislation since was secured by which a portion of the county may establish its Municipal Home. It is expected that there will be another effort to make it a full municipal undertaking.

G. W. V. A. Tag Results

He was the object of some well directed remarks and was told to tell his troubles elsewhere.

INDUSTRIAL UNREST TOUCHED UPON BY DEAN

ISLINGTON LODGE
AT THE CATHEDRAL

Present Conditions a Menace—Religious Guidance Necessary Under These Conditions.

Islington Lodge, S. O. E. B. S., attended Divine service last evening at Christchurch Cathedral it being a custom of the lodge to attend service annually. Between twenty and thirty of the lodge members attended gathering in the vestry of the Cathedral in a body. Very Rev. Dean Neales occupied the pulpit delivering a splendid patriotic sermon to those assembled.

Patriotic Sermon
The service was a patriotic one very fitting to the day, following as it did the signing of the Peace Treaty. Dean Neales dealt in detail with the special lessons to the British Empire that the Day had brought making mention of Dominion Day and the Peace after four and a half years' war.

Conditions of Unrest
He dwelt at length upon the present condition of affairs throughout the British Empire in general and specially throughout Canada describing the prevailing feeling of unrest and the unsettled labor conditions which were a menace to the country. He pointed out the necessary changes which would bring about Peace, Goodwill and Prosperity in place of the present conditions and mentioned some of the reactionary influences of the day which could be credited to the reconstruction period. The wonderful work to be done and the energy necessary for its performance he stated would be found by all in the true and Holy Worship of One who has guided the nation so many times through the shoals and breakers to safe harbors.

Roads are Good
A Fredericton man who returned recently from an auto trip to Woodstock declared that the roads on the Western side of the river are the best he ever saw them at this season. He spoke in terms of highest praise of the work being done by Supervisor Alfred King in Kingsclear, John F. Allen in Dumfries and Hazen Grant who has charge of the road from Woodstock to Meductic. "Those men he said are up to date practical road builders and I would like to see some arrangement made by which they could be loaned to some other parish where the work is done less scientifically."
