WINNIPEG UNDER MARTIAL LAW SINCE SATURDAY

Riot Act Read After One Man Had Been Killed in a Street Row and Twenty Injured—Several Returned Soldiers Shot—Armored Cars and Machine Guns are Mounted Ready for Immediate Service—The Situation Looks Serious.

Winnipeg, Man., June 21—Winnipeg went under martial law at 3 o'clock this afternoon when the riot act was read, but not before one man had been killed and several others wounded by revolver shots fired in their defence by mounted troops.

Mike Sokolowski, 552 Henry avenue registered alien, was shot right through the heart, as it is claimed, he was crossing from one side of William avenue to the other at the time the Royal Northwest Police made their charge. At the same time Robert C. Johnson, 548 Ross Avenue, returned soldier, who had served three and a half years with the 5th Canadian Infantry Battalion, was shot through the left thigh, the bullet entering the right knee. He is an old country Scotchman.

The other man injured was Jack Barret a young fellow, who was looking on claims he had no other interest than that of a spectator. He is shot through the right thigh. Both men will recover.

Twenty Casualties

On the authority of Brigadier-General H. D. B. Ketchen, general officer commanding military district number ten, there was a total of twenty casualties among the strikers, returned soldiers, sympathizers and onlookers in today's fatal riot. An unconfirmed report says that two aliens who were shot, are now in the hospital and in a precarious condition.

Of the seventeen other casualties, Robert C. Johnston, returned soldier was shot through the left thigh and right knee, but will recover. Another man is said to have been shot through the foot. The remainder may be described as walking wounded cases, being ridden down by the mounted police or bludgeoned.

Armoured Cars Ready

General Ketchen says that so far as he knows this exhausts the list. Armoured cars with machine guns and troops with fixed bayonets have been pushed into the heart of the north section and from whence any trouble from aliens might be anticipated.

It is reported that three hundred of the rioters have been rounded up and are now in the police cells.

Troops Fare Badly

The troops of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police engaged numbered only fifty-five men, and few of these escaped without wounds or contusions the worst being a broken ankle. The horses suffered in like degree, one of these being blinded by a lump of concrete.

These lumps of concrete, considerably larger and heavier than a brick were a favorite missile, being obtained from a neighboring building in process of wreckage.

Contrary to earlier impressions these mounted men were confined entirely to R. N. W. M. P. Because the first line was in scarlet and the second line in khaki, it was erroneously assumed that the latter were recruited from the Strathcona or the Forst Garry Horse. It developed that the men in khaki were R.N.W.M.P. men who had

served overseas with that mounted unit, going through all the hard fighting of last autumn. They had but just returned and had not got back into scarlet, and they were all experienced soldiers. On the other hand the men in scarlet in the front ranks included some young recruits and the man who was unhorsed and took shelter in Thompson's undertaking parlor was a young recruit who had recently joined from Ontario.

Theory As To Start

It was at first supposed that this young fellow in his scarlet uniform ran out again from the shelter back across Main street and being seized by the mob became the unwilling first cause the shooting. Evidence that appears unimpeachable, however, shows that this is not correct.

Comrade Parnell, chairman of that section of the returned soldiers which has thrown in its lot with the strikers, on seeing him unhorsed and pursued, ran across to the undertaker's and assisted by another returned soldier, conducted him safely across the street, telling the mob that this man must not be injured. It is still quite possible that his comrades had the impression that he was being hustled and beaten.

On Rowell's Order

Alderman Gray is authority for saying that the Royal Northwest Mounted Police were the only troops used in the first phase of today's riots because orders had come to the city council from Ottawa that the militia were only to be called as the last extremity. The order for the Royal Northwest Mounted Police to maintain law and order in Winnipeg came from Hon. N. W. Rowell, president of the Privy Council, to Commissioner Perry, and it is said that five hundred of this force are now in the city. But plans were completed many days ago by the military for taking complete control of the situation if they were called on by the civil authorities.

The scene on Main street this morning is likened to that of a beleaguered city. One of the widest streets on the continent, it represents a deserted expanse of asphalt, chequered here and there with moving bodies of troops and armored cars.

Longest Day of Year

Saturday last, June 21st, was the longest day of the year the period elapsing between sunset and sunrise being the longest in any one day. For a few days the sun will continue to rise earlier but will set earlier making the days shorter by a few seconds. After the lapse of some days it will be easy to observe that the period of daylight is becoming shorter.

Received Winnipeg Papers

Mr. R. H. Simonds, Secretary of the Fredericton Board of Trade is in receipt of some fifty copies of the "Winnipeg Citizen" a paper published for distribution in the different parts of the Dominion by the Citizens' Committee of One Thousand, during the big strike. The paper deals with the Winnipeg Revolutionary Strike giving the details of the same.

Band Concerts Yesterday

Two very enjoyable band concerts were played yesterday by the G. W. V. A. Band and the Fredericton Brass Band. The G. W. V. A. Band played some splendid selections to the patients of the N. B. Military Hospital from two to four o'clock, and the Fredericton Brass Band concert began at four o'clock in Wilmot Park. Large crowds attended both concerts in spite of the chilly, windy weather.

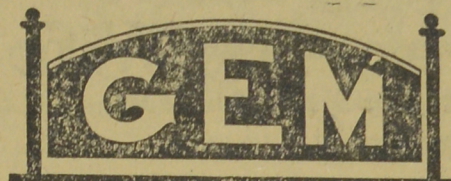
