ACADIA WON WESTERN INTERCOL. CHAMPIONSHIP, DEFEATING U. N. B. ONE TRY TO NIL AT WOLFVILLE

U. N. B. Kept Blue and Garnet on Defensive for Greater Part of Game, but Home Team Put Up Stubborn Defensive—Try Scored in Second Period, but Not Converted—U. N. B.'s Efforts Appeared to Slacken After That.

Wolfville, Nov. 11—The closest and hardest contested game that has been played in the intercollegiate football series this year took place at Wolfville this afternoon when Acadia defeated U. N. B. by three to nothing. Both teams were brimful of confidence when the play started and it was impossible to prophesy the outcome till the final whistle had blown.

The grounds were packed to capacity not only with Acadia students and U.N.B. rooters, but also with interested spectators from Wolfville. The Acadia band was out and played between the periods.

First Half

The teams lined up at 2.30. After a little preliminary practice U. N. B. started to press hard at the very outset. Within the first five minutes U. N. B. had the ball around Acadia's five yard line and a score was only prevented by the clearheadedness of Beardsley, who made an excellent kick clear. For the next few minutes the game consisted of scrim after scrim in the centre of the field after which Acadia took the initiative. Several times Acadia seemed certain to get over but U. N. B. kept them clear till

the whistle blew for half time. In this period Allan Parker, Acadia's full-back showed up to advantage by his excellent kicking. No matter how the ball was kicked over Acadia territory, Parker was always on the spot and found touch with every kick. The U. N. B. scrim had shown up well so far and succeeded in heeling out the ball. Nearly every time it was the excellent tackling and interceptions of the Acadia halves that kept the latter team on the offensive. The U. N. B. halves were showing excellent combination in passing. The end of the first period gave no hint of the result of the game and interest was at the highest pitch.

Second Period

The second period began with a great spurt on the part of U. N. B. Their scrim was perfect and their halves like a machine. The ball was almost constantly within Acadia's twenty-five yard line and it seemed time after time as if U. N. B. must score. It was here that the tackling of the Acadia halves was invaluable and the kicking of Parker at full back was superb. Crandall of Acadia's forwards was hurt near the first of this period. When Acadia proposed replacing him with a spare U. N. B. objected. The referee, however told them that they must either allow a spare to go in or take one of their own men off. The spare was allowed.

The resumption of the game after the discussion saw Acadia pushing the visitors back to the centre of the field where another scrim battle took place. At last the Acadia halves got away with a pretty piece of combination passing. The ball went to Johnson, wing half, who ran away from the U. N. B. men and scored a try. The score was located in an awkward place for a convert and was not converted. After that the visitors seemed to lose heart and Acadia kept the game in their own territory for the rest of the game.

In this period Dean Rogers, half back and captain of the Acadia team, and Dave Rogers, centre quarter, showed up very well. The referee was W. C. Ross a graduate of Dalhousie. The teams lined up as follows:

Acadia—Full back, Parker; halves, Johnson, Beardsley, Tingley, Rogers, (captain); quarters, Dave Rogers, Ayre and Fraser; forwards, Steeves, Ernest, Crandall, Atkinson, Dobson, Wigmore, Wetmore.

U.N.B.—Full back Anderson; halves McWilliams, Trimble, Cain, Hagerman quarters, McLean, Lounsbury, Burden, forwards Babbitt, Gibson, Bridges, Townsend, Squires, Saunders and Jewett.

Simms took Crandall's place in the second half.

After the game the Acadia students paraded through Wolfville streets led by the band and dragging the team in a buckboard.

In the evening an entertainment was given to the U. N. B. team. Acadia will play Dalhousie for the Maritime championship.

Eggs, 65 to 70 cents per dozen.

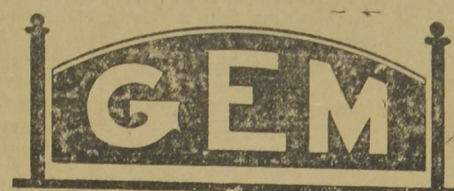
