with all arc lamps bought. It was pointed out that there would be a saving in coal, the price having fallen.

Ald. Baxter said that Supt. Davidson had asked for another man. The salary would be \$60 per month. Ald. Burpee said that to have two men in the plant all the time was essential for safety.

Fire Department

In the Fire Department Driver Melvin Bearisto asked for an increase in salary of \$45 per month to \$55. Chief H. C. Rutter for an increase from \$200 per year to \$300, Assistant Chief W. A. Clark for an increase from \$100 per year to \$200.

Ald. Young said he would recommend that Driver Bearisto be given the increase and the latter was voted.

Chief Finley's Salary

Under Administration of Justice there was discussion concerning the salary of Chief of Police Finley. Mayor Hanson said that under a new arrangement Chief Finley was Liquor Inspector for Fredericton, Devon and Springhill. He received \$400 from the province and \$1,100 from the city making \$1,500. He claimed he was devoting only ten per cent of his time to Inspector's duty.

Ald. Reid claimed that a fair percentage would be seventy per cent from the province and thirty per cent from the city. It took much more than ten per cent of his time to act as inspector.

Mayor Hanson and Ald. McKay presented the view of the Police Commission. Ald McKay said he did not intend to have interference from the City Council. In the past there had been constant scandal on police matters and that had been avoided recently.

The opinion was expressed that there was no criticism against Chief Finley but against Chief Inspector Wilson for not being willing to pay a larger share of the joint salary.

Ald. Reid said that a bad bargain had been struck. Mayor Hanson said it was the best under the circumstances the Chief Inspector being a hard man to do business with.

Ald. Barker explained that new heating apparatus must be installed in the County Court House which the City must pay one third. The cost would be \$5,000.

Janitor's Salary Increased

Under City Hall Department it was decided to increase Janitor James W. Biggs' salary from \$50 per month to \$60 per month beginning April 1st.

Publicity Grant Criticized

Under Contingent Department both Ald. Cooper and Ald. Burpee said that they could not see what value the city received from the grant for publicity.

Mayor Hanson said that if the grant of \$1,500 was not voted the office would close. Ald. Reid said the office should not be closed. The grant was voted.

City Opera House

In connection with revenue Mayor Hanson asked if there was any prospect of increasing the Opera House revenue.

Ald. Cooper said there must be new fire escapes and also improved facilities for hoisting scenery to the stage.

Mayor Hanson said that there should be increased revenue from the Opera House and he asked that a scheme be prepared.

LEGISLATURE IS OPPOSED TO THE DAYLIGHT SAVING PLAN

Premier was the thrice rejected of St. John City. He had been forced to go to an outside County for his seat. The Hon. Attorney General knew nothing of British Justice or he would never have allowed the Premier to bring in a verdict before the evidence had been heard. The Hon. Premier would have been better employed attending to the foundations of the welfare of the province. Supply was what the House should be considering. One of the most important Departments of public affairs was that of schools. They deserved more attention and the teachers deserved more than the niggardly salaries that they received in New Brunswick. Judging from the salaries that some of the female teachers received the salary scale must have been set by a lot of old bachelors, for no man, married or single, who ever had provided for females could be ignorant of the fact that a woman could not support herself decently upon the salaries paid. That was a matter to which he would call the attention of the Hon. Premier. Another was free school books. His belief was that the books used in the public schools should be supplied absolutely freely. The burden would not be so great that the province could not bear it. He was coming to a man whom all knew, a fighter, and all admired a fighter even if his fighting was for the wrong. He meant the Hon. Minister of Public Works. He it was who had introduced the element of discord to which he (Potts) had made reference earlier in his address. The Hon. Minister had enormous duties to perform for he must give him all that was due him. But he also had much money to send. Permanent roads had been the cry and he wished the House to understand that he (Potts) would support any policy for permanent roads if a competent man were at the head. The Hon. Minister had had a permanent road policy to present as soon as he could get into the govt. for there was a time when he was so well known that he was kept on the outside. Probably he had a right to a place in that govt. for he and one other man who was not in the govt. had done more than any others to return their party to power.

HON. MR. VENIOT—Hear! Hear! The Hon. Minister needed money to put his policy into effect and when he wanted something he was not backward in getting it. He had got that money, and if an employee of a private corporation had spent that money as he had he would have found himself in a permanent home prepared for him. Bonds for \$500,000 were voted and yet there was not one mile of permanent roads. He believed \$20,000, a mile would be fair cost for a good road for there was no such thing as a really permanent road.

MR. SMITH (Carleton)—Not that much. MR. POTTS—I said \$20,000. I mean permanent roads and not sawdust roads. HON. MR. VENIOT—Let him alone.

Continuing, the speaker said permanent roads would bring Maine and Nova Scotia very close together and he regretted to say Quebec somewhat nearer. The people had thought that they had got a something in a Minister of Public Works who could get a big bond issue and have the money from Motor Vehicle Tax set aside, but the permanent road money was used to pay for ordinary road work. Some of it paid for ditching which a man could do with a shovel. In the two years he had been in office the Minister of Public Works had had \$1,000,000. to spend.

HON. MR. VENIOT—I would like to have your figures.

MR. POTTS—I was right in what I said—\$1,000,000.

HON. MR. VENIOT—You are wrong. There was not \$1,000,000. in bonds.

MR. SMITH (Carleton)—The House should not be given an unfair impression. Did not the Hon. Minister have \$1,000,000. for permanent and ordinary work?

HON. MR. VENIOT—He did not say that. He said \$1,000,000.

MR. POTTS—The Hon. Minister should have been Attorney General. He devotes all his time to making wrong right, and right wrong.

MR. POTTS moved the adjournment of the debate, and supply was made the order of the day for Monday at 8.30 p. m.

HON. MR. FOSTER laid on the Table a draft bill concerning the New Brunswick Power Company.

The House adjourned at 5.27 p. m.
