

## RAILWAYS ON DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME

GOES INTO EFFECT EARLY  
ON SUNDAY MORNING

Change Improves the C. P. R. Service  
—The Early Train for St. John  
One Hour Later—On the  
C. N. R.

Mayor Hanson at last night's meeting of the City Council introduced the subject of Daylight Saving saying that he strongly favored it. The opinion of the aldermen however was decidedly against taking action in favor of a change. Both C. N. R. and the C. P. R. have adopted Daylight Saving the new time to go into effect at 2 o'clock Sunday morning, and the result no doubt will cause confusion.

**Improves C. P. R. Service**  
The changes will improve the C. P. R. train service as far as Fredericton is concerned all trains arriving one hour earlier than at present according to local time. The train for St. John leaving early in the morning will be put back one hour for convenience of St. John people living in the country and so will leave Fredericton at nominally the same hour.

**Awkward for Cotton Mill**  
The change on the C. N. R. will be awkward for the cotton mill at Marysville as many of the employees travel to work by C. N. R. It is said the mill will have to run on Daylight Saving time.

The official announcement of the C. N. R. is as follows:

Moncton, March 29th.  
C. N. R. operating one hour earlier. Important Daylight Saving change of time at 2 a. m. Sunday, March 30, 1919.

All clocks and watches used in operation of C. N. R. will at 2 a. m. Sunday, March 30th, be advanced one hour. To prevent serious confusion and inconvenience to the public the attention of all concerned is directed to the following condition resulting from the important change of time. If cities, towns, villages and other municipal bodies do not change their local time to correspond with the new railway time, all concerned should keep in mind that while the trains continue to leave the railway stations on the present schedule, such schedule will be operated one hour ahead of local time. Therefore in any municipal city where the local time is not changed to correspond with the new railway time, passengers must reach the railway station one hour earlier, than shown in the current folders or public time posters. Where the municipal time is changed to correspond with the railway time the passengers will not experience difficulty growing out of the change.

**Normal School Girls Won**  
The Provincial Normal School girls played the U. N. B. girls at the Normal School gymnasium yesterday afternoon. In spite of the fact that they had had very little practice the Normal School girls won by a score of 17 to 14. The game was a good one and was a closely played exhibition of basketball.

**City Work During Coming Year**  
The walks of the Old Protestant Burying Ground which have not been cared for in years are to be regaveled this summer, the sum of \$200 having been appropriated for the purpose. The high level wharf along Campbell street near the highway bridge which rotted away, will be replaced with riprap. The Smythe Street surface sewer will be rebuilt clear to the river.

**Dance Results in Fight**  
A dance at a house on York Street last evening resulted in a fight when several persons commenced to argue over a pair of eye-glasses. The argument led to a fight between several of the males who demonstrated their fist abilities to such an extent that one of them was ejected from the house. The Chief of Police being notified of the racket found out the cause of the argument and ordered all parties to withdraw.

**Plumbers Want Higher Wages**  
Journeyman plumbers, steamfitters and tinmiths of Fredericton have served notice upon employers in Fredericton that on and after May 1st they will charge \$4.50 per day as wages for an eight hour day, overtime including time for travelling to be rated and paid for as time and a half, all Sunday and holiday work to be rated and paid as double time. Thirteen journeymen plumbers have signed the agreement. The action of the employers is not yet announced. Heretofore journeymen received \$4 for a nine-hour.

**Will Have District Nurse**  
A district nurse of the Victorian Order of Nurses will be on duty in Fredericton and vicinity by next September. The City Council last night voted a grant of \$250 for a District Nurse, a grant of \$500 being requested by a delegation of the spokesmen of which were Very Rev. Dean Neales, Dr. B. C. Foster and ex-Ald. J. M. Lemont. The total cost of the service is estimated to be between \$1,000 and \$1,100. The nurse will be available for house to house visitations.

## FRUIT GROWERS' ANNUAL MEETING HERE NEXT WEEK

A GREAT OPPORTUNITY FOR  
THE MARITIME PROVINCES

Ontario's Position Greatly Weakened  
—Interesting Program for Wednesday Next—Experts to be Heard.

The fourteenth annual meeting of the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association will be held in Fredericton next week beginning Wednesday morning. Sessions will be held in the City Council Chamber morning, afternoon and evening of that day and if the business requires a session will be held Thursday.

The Maritime Provinces are considered to have a magnificent opportunity in apple raising during the next few years on account of the fact that the orchards in this part of Canada have been kept up to their usual standard in anticipation of an improvement in apple marketing after the war while the orchards on the farms of Ontario were allowed to deteriorate. The result is that Ontario will not be able to regain her former position in apple production for a number of years while the Maritime Provinces are practically in a position as good as ever.

The New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association heretofore met in annual session at the same time as the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association and a separate meeting was undertaken this year in order to give the fruit growers an opportunity to devote all their attention to this important branch that it deserves.

## REPORTED DISTRICT DEPOT TO BE MOVED

RUMORED THAT ST. JOHN  
WILL GET THE DEPOT

City Council Will Make a Protest  
Against the Change—No Definite Word Yet From Headquarters.

A rumor has been in circulation for some time that No. 7 District Depot, will be moved from this city to St. John in the near future. The work of the staff in this city has been materially lessened as the returned men are being given their discharges, certificates and service badges on leaving the steamships on which they return to Canada.

Should the depot be moved it is very probable that the staff engaged on the records of the N. B. Military Hospital will be given space in the Military Hospital in which to conduct their work. On being asked about the proposed change, Major B. Smith of this Depot stated that the authorities in this city could tell nothing about the change having heard nothing from district headquarters about it.

On being asked concerning the rumor Mayor Hanson stated that he had heard it and that the City Council would take steps to protest against the proposed change. The District Depot was established in this city in the fall of 1917 with Col. W. J. Osborne as commanding officer.


