TITLES MUST GO.

The committee of the House of Commons which has been considering the question of titles has adopted a report recommending that an address should be presented to His Majesty the King asking him to refrain from conferring any titular distinction upon British subjects resident in Canada, save such appellations as are of a professional or vocational character. No objection is taken in the report to the titles "Right Honorable" and "Honorable," and it is recommended that the awarding of decorations for military service be not discontinued. The report was as follows:

"Your committee are of the opinion and recommend that an address be presented to His Most Excellent Majesty the King in the following words:

"To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

"Most Gracious Sovereign.—We, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the House of Commons of Canada in Parliament assembled, humbly approach Your Majesty, praying that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased:

"(a) To refrain hereafter from conferring any title of honor or titular distinction upon any of your subjects domiciled or ordinarily resident in Canada, save such appellations as are of a professional or vocational character or which appertain to an office.

"(b) To provide that appropriate action be taken by legislation or otherwise to ensure the extinction on the death of a person domiciled or ordinarily resident in Canada at present in enjoyment of an hereditary title of honor or titular distinction, dignity or title as a peer of the realm, shall be accepted, enjoyed or used by such person or be recognized.

"All of which we humbly pray Your Majesty to take into your favorable and gracious consideration."

"A suggestion was made that the titles of 'right honorable' and 'honorable' be discontinued, but the suggestion did not meet with the approval of the committee.

"Your committee, however, do not recommend the discontinuance of the practice of awarding military or naval decorations, such as Victoria Cross, Military Medal, Military Cross, the Distinguished Service Cross and similar decorations to persons in military or naval services of Canada for exceptional valor and devotion to duty.

"Your committee further recommends that appropriate action be taken by legislation or otherwise to provide that hereafter no person domiciled or ordinarily resident in Canada, shall accept, enjoy or use titles of honor or titular distinction hereafter conferred by a foreign ruler of government."

The committee has apparently done its work well and its report will meet with the hearty approval of an overwhelming majority of the right-thinking people of Canada.

The Quebec Legislature has been dissolved and a new House will be chosen on June 23rd. Sir Lomer Guion has given Quebec sound and progressive government and his return to power by an overwhelming majority is a foregone conclusion. Sir Lomer is looked upon as the ablest administrator in provincial public life.

All will be pleased with the announcement that His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales will visit Canada in August and officially open the new Parliament Buildings. In all probability he will also make a tour of the country. The late King Edward VII. visited Canada and the United States in 1860. The present King has visited Canada no less than three times. His first visit was in 1889, when as commander of the warship Thrush he spent some days in Halifax. He made a tour of Canada in 1901 and was here again in 1908 to attend the Quebec tercentenary.

The announcement is made that no less than twenty-seven returned soldiers are now employed in the New

Brunswick Forestry Department. This should be of interest to certain opposition politicians who now profess a great concern about the welfare of returned men, but who when in office did nothing for them.

10 of these fires and they were extinguished before reaching any great size, and only in two cases was any serious damage done.

Road Supervisors Help

The Minister of Public Works is co-operating with the Minister of Lands and Mines in the important matter of Fire Protection. 474 Road Supervisors being instructed in case of forest fires to leave their work and employ their men fighting fire at any time. This will undoubtedly result in a considerable assistance in all parts of the Province.

The Department is sending to all schools in the Province an interesting little pamphlet on the camp fire, to be used as an object lesson for school children. This is rendered possible through the co-operation of the Education Department.

The Department issues a request to all those who go fishing or picnicking in the forest on the holidays to be careful with their camp fires and tobacco and matches. Thoughtless picnickers caused \$60,000 damage last year through their carelessness in this regard.


