## NO SETTLEMENT YET OF THE INDUSTRIAL DISPUTE

**Labor Men in Other Western Towns are Becoming Restless and Whole West May be Tied Up—Winnipeg Newspaper Gets Out Extra Edition—A Statement by Mayor Gray—Bolshevik Element to be Stamped Out.**

Winnipeg, May 22—Open discussion of the general strike in Winnipeg by representatives of all leading forces involved, will take place at a meeting in the City Hall at 10.30 o'clock tomorrow morning. It was officially announced today that it was hoped the meeting would lead to a settlement of the industrial dispute.

Labor representatives, federal, provincial and municipal officials and Winnipeg industrial and commercial employers were not formally requested by city officials to attend, but were told that the conference will be a "get together" gathering, where the various views can be submitted and conciliation considered.

Telephone service was restored by volunteer operators this afternoon.

### Ministers Arrive

Senator Gideon Robertson, minister of labor and Arthur Meighen, minister of the interior, and also minister of justice arrived from Ottawa. They declined to comment on the situation prior to a conference with the central strike committee.

The Winnipeg Free Press published an extra edition this afternoon. Department stores made their first morning delivery since the strike began. No disturbance of note was reported. City and provincial officials declared they were convinced that the danger point in the situation was passed. Union leaders who commented upon the remark said there never had been any intention of violence.

In a statement today Mayor Gray said:

"The constituted authorities are determined to stamp out the Bolshevik or red element in Winnipeg.

"The town is open; all business may go ahead as in the past.

"No one section of the public has any right to dictate food terms to any other section of the public. This principle will be strictly adhered to by the constituted authorities."

Mayor Gray polled a heavy vote at the last municipal election.

### Resumption of Travel

Duluth, Minn., May 22—Charles Skog, divisional freight and passenger agent for the Duluth, Winnipeg and Pacific railroad, on his return today to Duluth from Winnipeg, said:

"We are advised today that baggage could be again accepted for Winnipeg which means resumption of necessary passenger travel and no further inconvenience on transcontinental trips."

### Strike in Brandon

Brandon, May 22—The mechanical round house men and the car men of the Canadian Pacific Railway walked out yesterday in sympathy with Winnipeg. It was generally known Tuesday evening that such a strike would take place.

### Port Arthur Strike

Port Arthur, May 22—The strike at the shipyards is still in progress. The company made an offer to institute the

eight-hour day with nine hours pay, August but the men unanimously voted it down. They demand the eight-hour day at once.

### Lethbridge Uneasy

Lethbridge, May 22—Arrangements are being made today by officials of the Trades and Labor Council to call a meeting of the executive Friday night to consider action in answer for a sympathetic strike vote in connection with the Winnipeg strikers.

### Saskatoon Also

Saskatoon, May 22—A mass meeting of labor unions has been called here to discuss the Winnipeg situation.

### Miners Quit

Lethbridge, May 22—Local miners to the number of 1,200 go on strike Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock as a result of a strike order sent out Wednesday by District 18 union officials. Seven mines in Lethbridge field will be deserted.

### Alberta Strike Vote

Ottawa, May 22—Information has been received at the labor department that the provincial Federation of Labor of Alberta will take a vote as to calling a general strike in sympathy with the Winnipeg strikers. If a strike is decided upon it will be effective from next Monday. As this would be purely a sympathetic strike, it is probable that should the Winnipeg trouble be adjusted no strike order will be issued, even though the vote should favor it. The department has also been informed by the director of coal operations in district 18 that all the coal miners will strike on Saturday. This is not a sympathetic strike but grows out of smaller difficulties between the operators and workers.

### Edmonton Votes Monday

Edmonton, Alta., May 22—On Sunday afternoon, Edmonton will know whether there is to be a sympathetic strike in this city. A strike vote will be taken Monday at 11 a. m.

### Calgary Voting

Calgary, May 22—Calgary labor unions affiliated with the trades and labor council today started voting on the question of going out on a general strike Monday in sympathy with the Winnipeg strikers. Labor leaders predict that local workers would vote in favor of the walkout.

About 30,000 workers will walk out if a general strike is called. The result of the strike will be announced Friday night or Saturday morning.

### Drive Not Yet Completed

The drive for funds for the civic playgrounds which was begun yesterday met with fairly good success. The canvassing has not yet been completed but is being continued today. Several fairly large subscriptions were received and it is expected by the canvassers that between \$700 and \$800 will be realized. The boys interested in playgrounds will make the balance of the collections bringing the total to \$1000.

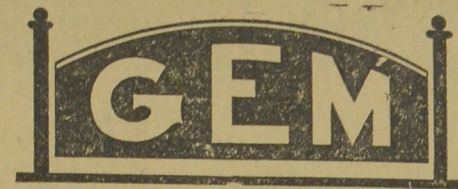
