OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

ON BUYING REMNANTS.

The Housewife of Slender Means Does Not Always Appreciate the Possibilities in Remnants.

Particularly is this so at this season when she is anxious to give her house or her flat a summer "dress." Chintzes and cretonnes are very expensive and many yards are required to dress one room.

"But don't get it all alike for one room!" cries a thrifty woman. "Take time and hunt around for just the right remnants!"

Generally speaking, remnants are short lengths, but from twelve to eighteen yards of chintz or cretonne may be considered a remnant and be marked down accordingly. Dark chintzes are in fashion now, so one can do very well on buying light chintzes. It is a point worth remembering.

After many weary days of search one woman found an eighteen yard piece of imported light yellow cretonne with great bunches of yellow and green flowers. It happened to be just what she wanted for a tan living room, and the piece made two large chair covers, a window seat and curtain and valances for two pair of triple windows. A seamstress made them at \$4 a day, and the cretonne had been reduced from \$2.79 a yard to 40 cents. It was soiled at one end and on the edges, but the whole piece was carefully washed and ironed before being made up.

There were still other things in the room that had to be dressed to go with yellow covers. Careful search through the shops at last yielded a green china silk with pin stripes running lengthwise in it. It had not sold well and fifteen yards of it were reduced and put on the remnant counter. This silk made portieres and pillows with black cords for the window seat. It harmonized perfectly with the yellow.

RANDOM REMINDERS.

A hot iron covered with a wet cloth and applied to velvet while damp will raise the pile.

Blankets should always be pulled well down at the foot of the bed and tucked under the mattress.

Clean gold with a rag moistened with a mixture of one teaspoonful of ammonia to a cup of water.

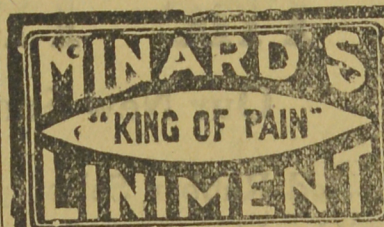
Newspapers soaked in water for 24 hours make an excellent pulp with which to fill cracks.

Suet or fat from roasts and steaks should be tried out before it becomes rancid and clarified if necessary.

WASHING OF CHIFFON.

It is always best to have chiffons dry cleaned, but if this is not possible good results may be obtained by washing in the following manner: Dissolve some of the soap flakes that come for the purpose and make a good lather. Squeeze the chiffon in this and dip it up and down until it is clean. Rinse in warm water in which a little sugar has been dissolved. This will give it just the desired degree of firmness after it is ironed. Press with warm iron after the chiffon is dry.

BRIEF BUT USEFUL RECIPES.

Restore Glit Frames.—Rub with a sponge moistened with turpentine.
Drive Away Aches.—A little quick lime placed in the infested places.

Remove Tar from Cloth.—Rub it well with turpentine till every trace is removed.

Make Leather Waterproof.—Saturate it with castor oil; to stop shoes squeaking, drive a peg into the middle of the sole.

Clean the Hair.—Wash well with a mixture of soft water, 1 pint; sal soda 1 ounce; cream tartar ¼ ounce.

Egg Stains on Spoons.—Rub with common salt.

Clean Gloves.—Pour a little benzine into a basin and wash the gloves in it, rubbing and squeezing them until clean. If much soiled, they must be washed again through clean benzine and rinsed in a fresh supply. Hang in the air to dry.

Clean Hair Brushes.—Dissolve a little soda in warm water and pour in a small amount of ammonia. Hold the brushes with the bristles downward and avoid wetting the back as far as possible; shake until the grease is removed; then rinse in cold water and put in the air to dry.

Remove Mildew from Cloth.—Put a teaspoonful of chloride of lime into a quart of water, strain it twice, then dip the mildewed places in this weak solution and lay in the sun. If not effective the first time repeat.

How to Remove a Rusty Screw.—Apply a red hot iron to the head for a short time, the screw-driver being applied immediately while the screw is hot.

Cure Mosquito Bites.—Put ten drops of refined carbolic acid into an ounce of rose water; shake well and apply. (If you hold your breath while a mosquito has its bill in you it cannot withdraw it until you breathe again).

HONOR ROLL UNVEILED

As a tribute to the eighty-one C. P. R. apprentices who enlisted for overseas service during the war, an honor roll was unveiled this week at the Angus shops in the presence of Mr. Burns, works manager, Mr. Muir, assistant works manager, and a representative gathering of foremen and apprentices.

Mr. C. Kyle, supervisor of apprentices occupied the chair. Mr. Burns paid a fitting tribute to the boys who had paid the supreme sacrifice and asked the apprentices to be worthy of the sacrifice made by their comrades while fighting to make this a better world for other people to live in. He commended the progress being made in school and shop and referred especially to the good work done at the evening classes, and to the prize given by the Montreal Council of Arts and Manufacturers. The C. P. R. itself gives five scholarships for proficiency in mathematics and mechanical drawing, while 380 apprentices get two hours instruction each week.

URGES FAIR PLAY FOR THE FARMERS

Montreal, May 22.—Some observations on the reasons for the high prices of farm produce in Montreal, made by Adelard Fortier, chairman of the Agricultural Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, caused a discussion by the members of the Chamber at a meeting yesterday.

Mr. Fortier said that in view of certain newspaper articles and statements made on the subject of farm produce prices, it was time that the public informed itself better on the subject, and that there be a stop put to the creation of discord which, if persisted in, might lead to results not desired.

The farmers must be paid for their produce, and if the prices were not paid it would quickly mean that the issue would not be one of prices, but of getting the produce.

Mr. Fortier said he agreed that the working man should obtain proper wages, but in return must pay for what they bought from the farmer, who also had to be compensated for his labor and his capital invested, and everything had risen in price for him as well as the cost of produce to the city dweller.

THE CARMANIA AT HALIFAX

Halifax, N. S. May 22.—The transport Carmania, which arrived here last night from England with the 18th, 19th, 20th and 21st Battalions, Fourth Brigade, Second Division, on board, docked this morning shortly after seven o'clock and disembarkation of the troops was at once commenced.

The troops were in command of Brigadier General Robert Rennie, C. B., C. M. G., D. S. O., M. V. C., who headed the brigade practically all the time it was in France.
