BOLTERS ON TARIFF NOT TO BE EX-COMMUNICATED

The Latch String is Still Out for Liberal-Unionists at the Capital—Much Talk About Cabinet Reorganization Heard in the Lobbies—Sir George Foster and Hon. J. C. Doherty are Expected to Quit Soon—Aspirants for Cabinet Berths.

Ottawa, June 19—Will the independent members who bolted on the budget division be read out of the Unionist caucus. That would ordinarily be the result of the action taken yesterday by the twelve westerners and others, but there is so much sympathy among even Conservative western Unionists with the attitude of those who bolted, as shown by those who voted against the government in the detailed consideration of the budget today, that it is being considered whether or not it would be a wise policy to avoid excommunication.

To offset "the light in the window" of the opposition, Liberal-Unionists are being canvassed to see if they would favor a policy of saying "the latch string is out." The bolters will have a conference as well, to decide whether they will attend the caucus as though nothing had occurred, in the event of their not being read out. Opinions secured tonight were that it would not do, as the westerners wish to keep their new found independence of action on all questions.

Cabinet Reorganization

With the budget disposed of cabinet reconstruction and the possibilities involved in such reorganization become the questions of the hour. Whether there shall be a reorganization on a scale only second to that which preceded the formation of the Union government, or whether the changes that are to be made will proceed by gradual stage to as great an ultimate shuffling of positions, uncertainty, and that uncertainty both in the cabinet and outside it, exists, because neither those in the cabinet nor outside it knows for certain when Hon. Frank Carvell will leave the government. If he leaves before the Liberal convention in August next, then Hon. A. J. Calder, minister of immigration and colonization is expected to take his place and naturally he would be adverse to having a reorganization of the cabinet until he knows if the position will be open or not.

The acting minister of justice, Hon. Arthur Meighen, has created a policy for that department and as it is also the policy of the government it will have to keep him there to carry on if not carry out the policy. Judge Doherty and Hon. George E. Foster are expected to complete long public careers by the honor of signing the historic document which ends the war.

Another acting minister Hon. A. K. Maclean, by active work in the department of trade and commerce has made himself the inevitable choice of the premier to succeed Sir George Foster when the latter is billeted in some post overseas or elsewhere. If Hon. Frank Carvell does not leave the government—and everybody expects that some time he will—the talk is that the departments of the interior and of immigration and colonization will be once more united and that Hon. Mr. Calder will try to re-establish himself in the west by taking a prominent part in handing over the natural resources of the prairie provinces, although that would take away the main part of the work of the interior department. It is stated that he may occupy this post in any case, in order to complete the policy.

There have been many suggestions that Hon. J. D. Reid, minister of railways and canals, would disappear from the cabinet when the prorogation came, but Dr. Reid has worked hard, is personally popular with the premier and his colleagues, and may be expected to stick. Sir Edward Kemp's job as minister of the overseas military forces from Canada in the United Kingdom has practically disappeared already. It is expected that he will be kept in the government by being made minister without portfolio, while Hon. Frank Cochrane may go to the senate. Some expect Hon. Martin Burritt to retire on account of ill-health, and Senator Blondin, now postmaster general to take his place. The duties of postmaster-general have of late become so arduous and so exacting because of the organization of postal employees that a man of exceptional calibre is wanted for the position.

Crerar's Successor

Dr. S. F. Tolmie, member for Victoria city, is the favorite among betters as successor to Hon. T. A. Crerar as minister of agriculture. Donald Sutherland is a close second, and R. C. Henders has been mentioned because he has made an active chairman of the agricultural committee. Among

the western members who have remained with the government there does not seem material to fill the expected cabinet positions either because the men have connections of affairs which would prevent them accepting or because they are not yet well enough known. If Hon. Frank Carvell leaves the cabinet H. B. Morphy member for North Perth will be an aspirant for cabinet rank. Other names mentioned are Brigadier-General Griesbach from Alberta, Senator Willoughby from Saskatchewan, and Messrs. Green, Stacey and Stevens, from British Columbia.

Sifton to Bench

Hon. A. L. Sifton, minister of customs and inland revenue will go to the supreme court if forecasts made here prove correct. While these changes occur it is expected that the portfolios of finance, marine and fisheries and of militia will remain untouched as well as that of president of the privy council. It is stated that Brig-General Mewburn would like to get back to his business but that he will probably stay under entreaty. Senator Loughheed will remain as chairman of the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment as long as it is felt the soldiers are not established.

When all is said and done, the premier's main difficulty will be in getting westerners of outstanding prominence and influence to take charge of the departments of the interior of immigration and colonization. He will have to go outside his government supporters for the least one of them.

The great fear of the government is that the west will become, like Quebec, a part of the country which would defeat any minister who went back for election. The premier wishes to make his cabinet representative, his start in appointing Senator G. D. Robertson as minister of labor, showing his intentions, but realization is more difficult. None of his ministers really represent French Canada, and every effort will be made to prevent the same thing becoming the condition of western representatives as well.
