ST. JOHN GLOBE'S COMMENT  
ON OPPOSITION CONVENTION

Seven Members of the House Said to Have Voted Against  
Leader Murray's Reinstatement—Opposition Leader and  
Mr. Baxter Approved of Resolution of Censure Adopted by  
the Parly at Last Session of the Legislature.

(St. John Globe)  
St. John, Nov. 7.—Today's report  
that at least seven opposition mem-  
bers of the Legislature—three from  
St. John, two from Albert and one  
from York—voted against the selec-  
tion of Hon. James A. Murray as lead-  
er, and that resignation was threaten-  
ed if an attempt was made to make  
the convention choice unanimous, cre-  
ates an entirely new political situa-  
tion. Those seven members can hardly  
continue allegiance to the party lead-  
er. It is by no means improbable that  
the best elements in the party will  
rally around them as the nucleus for  
the regeneration which the convention  
story presents as absolutely necessary  
before the party can command public  
confidence.

At the last session of the legisla-  
ture the opposition led by Hon. James  
Murray, placed itself on record with  
reference to the Belgian potato gift.  
Their opinion of that transaction and  
of their leader's connection with it  
was expressed in a resolution, moved  
by Dr. J. Roy Campbell and endorsed  
by every member in attendance when  
the vote was taken. Is it unfair to  
assume that, in the preparation of his  
motion, Dr. Campbell had the advice  
and support of others active in the  
party councils. Is it unfair to assume  
that, before submitting it to the Leg-  
islature and the country, Dr. Camp-  
bell had the consent of Hon. Mr. Mur-  
ray himself and of Hon. Dr. Baxter  
and the other members of the govern-  
ment? That would be the natural

course in such circumstances and rum-  
or says Dr. Campbell plainly told the  
convention that both Murray and Bax-  
ter saw and approved the resolution  
before it was submitted to the Legis-  
lature. Dr. Campbell's resolution,  
which, unless there is explicit and pos-  
itive evidence to the contrary, it must  
be assumed Messrs Murray and Bax-  
ter approved, endorsed and consent-  
ed, to if they did not actually aid in  
preparing, declared the purchase and  
disposal of the potatoes was attended  
with neglect of duty or incapacity on  
the part of the Minister of the Depart-  
ment of Agriculture, and that improper  
returns were furnished by that de-  
partment to the Auditor-General. The  
Minister of Agriculture condemned by  
his own colleagues of neglect of duty  
or incompetency was Hon. James A.  
Murray, then and now leader of the  
opposition. The resolution offered by  
Dr. Campbell, and supported on divi-  
sion by Messrs. Young, Tilley, Camp-  
bell, Potts, Peck, Lewis Smith, Crock-  
et, Pinder, Sutton, Grimmer, H. W.  
Smith, Carson, Dickson and Hunter,  
expressed regret that greater care was  
not exercised in the purchase of the  
potatoes, and deprecated (condemned)  
the effort made to suppress the facts  
and circumstances instead of making  
a full and candid confession. This  
scathing condemnation came not from  
bitter political opponents, but was the  
carefully considered and publicly re-  
corded judgment of the political  
friends, the party associates of the  
Minister, with, if report be correct, the  
consent and approval of the Minister  
himself. Regarded in its true light, the  
resolution can have one and only one  
meaning. The importance of this  
should be borne in mind in view of  
the convention vote of Thursday, re-  
appointing Hon. Mr. Murray to the  
leadership. The party convention did  
not censure its Legislative members  
for recording this verdict of official  
neglect or official incapacity and official  
misstatements. The convention did  
not by word or action indicate  
opposition to the whole or any part  
of that damning resolution. Without  
condemning it, without condemning  
those who recorded it, the convention  
re-elected Hon. Mr. Murray leader,  
leaving Messrs Campbell and Tilley  
and Potts and their associates to de-  
cide their future course in a situation  
which gives them the choice of aban-  
doning the party or following the lead-  
er they have declared neglectful or  
incapable and guilty of placing on the  
records false returns of a public  
transaction, with the deliberate pur-  
pose of deceiving the Auditor-General  
and the people of New Brunswick. It  
is not a comfortable position in which  
these politicians find themselves, but  
neither is the position of the opposi-  
tion party a comfortable one in seek-  
ing to win public confidence with a  
leader condemned, with his own con-  
sent, by his own following, and com-  
pelled in his own defence to plead  
guilty to the very things they have  
charged against him. A public that  
could extend confidence under the cir-  
cumstances would have to be most in-  
different to its own best interests.

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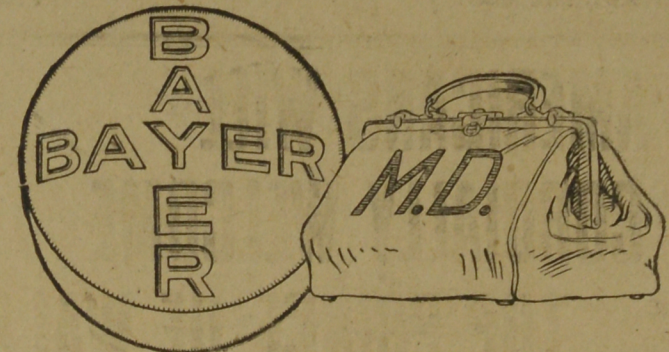

U. S. SENATE'S  
REPORT ON  
STEEL STRIKE

Washington, Nov. 8.—Characteriz-  
ing all strikes as "industrial barbar-  
ism" and declaring that "there is no  
place in this country either for indus-  
trial despotism or labor despotism,"  
the Senate committee authorized to  
investigate to steel strike presented a  
report today covering its hearings both  
in Washington and in Pittsburg, and

criticizing both the workers' and the  
employers in the controversy, which  
resulted in at least partial disruption  
of the steel industry.  
The committee's main conclusion,  
concurred in by all members, was ex-  
pressed in the statement that "the  
public has a right to demand that cap-  
ital shall not arrogate to itself the right  
to determine in its own way those in-  
dustrial questions, and it is the same  
as to labor, and the duty is upon Con-  
gress to provide one way of adjust-  
ing these difficulties."

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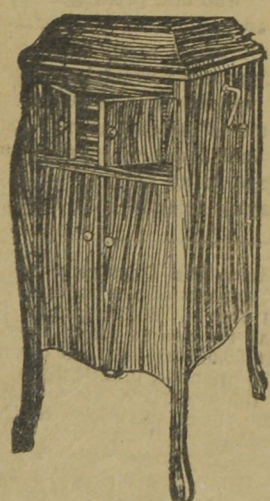
