U. S. MARKET TAKING TURNIPS AND POTATOES

Three Dollars per Barrel Ordinary Price for Potatoes —Stock Now Clear of Rot.

There is a fairly steady movement of turnips out of New Brunswick to the United States market with prices fifty-five and sixty cents per barrel. This is a fair price compared with other seasons, the crop being large and the demand not heavy. All the turnips required are coming forward to supply the market. W. W. Boyce of this city reports fifteen carloads on track, Boston, this morning.

Potato Market Easy

In the potato market things are quiet at the present time with prices unchanged. Three dollars per barrel is the price being paid by the shippers.

BUSINESS MEN'S MEETING TONIGHT RE VICTORY LOAN

LARGE BUSINESS MEN NOT ENOUGH INTERESTED

York County Has Subscribed \$403,600 to Date—Some Parishes Have Done Very Well.

The fact that Fredericton City and the County of York is away behind in the subscriptions to the Victory Loan Campaign has not as yet caused any increase in the amounts of the subscriptions handed in by the canvassers and to the local office, York County which has always been to the front in war work seems lagging in patriotism and the united effort of the people of both the City and County are very necessary to insure York County passing its objective.

Large Business Men Needed

The small business man seems to have been doing most of the subscribing while the large business man seems to have dropped out of sight. Small subscriptions are coming in plentifully but these alone will not bring the County up to its objective as the large subscriptions have to come in before any hope of reaching the quota can ever be held before the citizens. A meeting of the business men of the City will be held this evening at the Board of Trade rooms, Queen Street, and it is hoped that good results will be obtained. J. M. Robinson District Organizer and R. H. McLellan will address the meeting.

Small Districts to Front

The smaller districts of the County are well to the fore-front in their work and many of them have reached and surpassed their various quotas. The fact that they have done this in no way releases this City and County from its obligations but rather adds to it as it sets them an example which they are bound to follow. Lack of interest has caused much trouble but in previous campaigns the people of York County have always realized their duty and done their utmost to carry it out.

More Than Eight Hundred

Cork County up-to-date has received about 806 applications totalling in all about \$409,600 but it must be remembered that it is now travelling on to the end of the campaign and that only five more days remain in which the canvassers and others will receive subscriptions.

TRANSFER OF MILITARY HOSP. TOMORROW

MAJOR LUTON, M. C., TO BE SUPERINTENDENT

Major F. Eason to be Assistant Director — Few Changes will be Noticeable at Once.

Tomorrow November 11th, Major Caldwell representative of the D.S.C.R. will take over the Military Hospital wing of the military quarters in Woodstock Road. Major R. M. Luton M. C. and Major Frank Eason have accepted transfers to the D.S.C.R., the former as Superintendent and the latter as Assistant Director. There will be little difference occasioned by the change with the exception that there will be about fifty patients still in the hospital including some of the cases which are too serious for immediate removal. The same nursing staff will be stationed at the hospital as usual and the change for some time will not be noticeable except for the fact that the officers attached will be in a civil capacity.

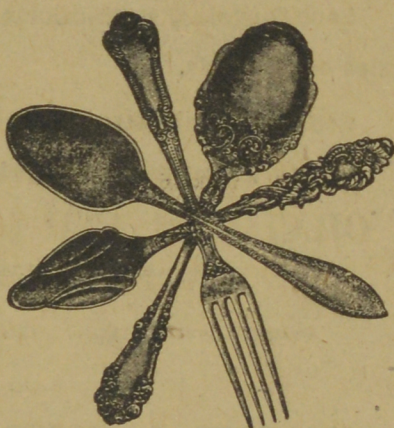
Rumors Re Building

It is stated that plans are being made to have the hospital wing turned into an Engineering school for the training of the returned soldiers but authorities have not as yet confirmed this. Another rumor is that it will be occupied by the permanent force on being stationed in this city.

Jury Wants License Revoked.

St. Stephen Courier: It developed at the coroner's investigation into the death of the lad Robin Jones, who was killed by falling under the wheels of an auto truck at Milltown, that the truck was in charge of Harry Hall, of St. Stephen, that the boy had been in the habit of jumping on this and other cars and teams, that the driver did not notice him fall, and when he later found his school books in the car he concluded that the boy had jumped off. It was told that young Hall had always been a careful driver, but it developed that another person riding with Hall had called his attention to the fact that the boy was lying in the road after the car had passed, and because he failed to stop and make enquiry the jury recommended that his license be revoked and it was so reported to the Attorney General.
