## SAVINGS BANK

Ottawa, Feb. 27-Unemployment has not so far made any serious drain on savings deposits in Canadian banks. They continue to increase. September 1918, before the last war loan was placed on the market, savings deposits reached the high-water level of \$1,-039,500,000. Payment of war loans subscriptions brought the total down, but it is now again climbing towards the billion dollars mark. During January, there was an increase in savings deposits of \$31,500,000 dollars bringing the toal at the end of the month to \$990,000,000. During the whole war period, from August 1914 to January 1919—in spite of heavy investments in domestic war issues—savings deposits increased about fifty per cent.

Bank returns for January also show a decrease in demand deposits; a decrease outside Canada and a decrease in Call loans both in and outside Canada.

Montreal, Feb. 27-Robert Harris, C. M. G., one of Canada's best known artists, died at his home here this morning. He was born in Wales in 1848 but spend his youth in Charlottetown, where he will be barred. Mr. Harris was president of the Royal Canadian Academy in 1898 and held the office until 1905. He was probably best known as a portrait painter.
