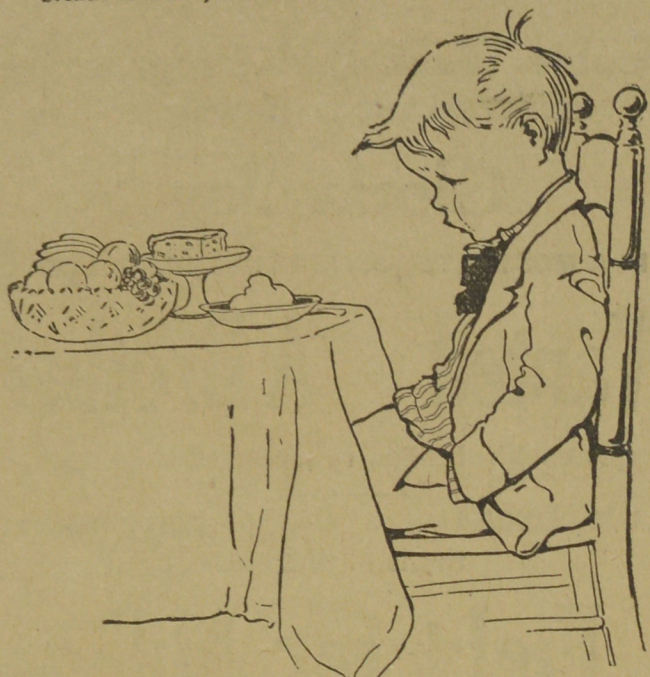

THE INDUSTRIAL PARLIAMENT BEGAN ITS SESSION AT WESTMINSTER

Eight Hundred Delegates Present, Representing More Than Ten Million Workers—Premier Lloyd George Among Speakers at the Opening—The Object of the Gathering.

London, Feb. 27—The industrial parliament, composed of representatives of employers and employed and government officials, assembled in central Hall, Westminster this morning at 10.30 o'clock.

The parliament was opened by Sir Robert Horne, the Minister of Labor, who was supported by Premier Lloyd George, Sir Albert Stanley, president of the Board of Trade; George H. Roberts the Food Controller; Thomas James MacNamara, parliamentary secretary in the Cabinet, and Sir D. J. Shackleton, permanent secretary of the Ministry of Labor. The Minister of Labor announced that premier was anxious to hear the views of the meeting and invited the delegates to address the conference.

The object of holding the parliament was to give the government an opportunity to meet representatives of British industry and learn their views on the general situation, and it was hoped by both sides that really valuable suggestions would be received and the ground work laid for future useful activities.

The delegates to the parliament number 800. It is estimated that more than ten million workers are represented.

GOVERNMENT SUPPORTERS HELD CAUCUS

Ottawa, Feb. 27—There was considerable interest taken in the first government caucus of the session held this morning with a large attendance of Unionist members and senators. The purpose of the caucus was to discuss the government's sessional program, to hear ministerial explanations in regard thereto and to give the individual members an opportunity to express their views.

J. E. Armstrong, East Lambton, presided at the caucus and Sir Thomas White, the acting premier, addressed it at some length.

W. S. Middlebrooks, the chief government whip, stated to the Canadian press at the conclusion of the caucus that the discussion had been most harmonious.

"The spirit displayed was for the permanent unity of the party", he said. "It was the best and most encouraging expression of opinion regarding the solidity of the government party that I have ever heard in a caucus".

SAVINGS BANK DEPOSITS ON THE INCREASE

Ottawa, Feb. 27—Unemployment has not so far made any serious drain on savings deposits in Canadian banks. They continue to increase. September 1918, before the last war loan was placed on the market, savings deposits reached the high-water level of \$1,039,500,000. Payment of war loans subscriptions brought the total down, but it is now again climbing towards the billion dollars mark. During January, there was an increase in savings deposits of \$31,500,000 dollars bringing the total at the end of the month to \$990,000,000. During the whole war period, from August 1914 to January 1919—in spite of heavy investments in domestic war issues—savings deposits increased about fifty per cent.

Bank returns for January also show a decrease in demand deposits; a decrease outside Canada and a decrease in Call loans both in and outside Canada.

Montreal, Feb. 27—Robert Harris, C. M. G., one of Canada's best known artists, died at his home here this morning. He was born in Wales in 1848 but spent his youth in Charlottetown, where he will be buried. Mr. Harris was president of the Royal Canadian Academy in 1898 and held the office until 1905. He was probably best known as a portrait painter.

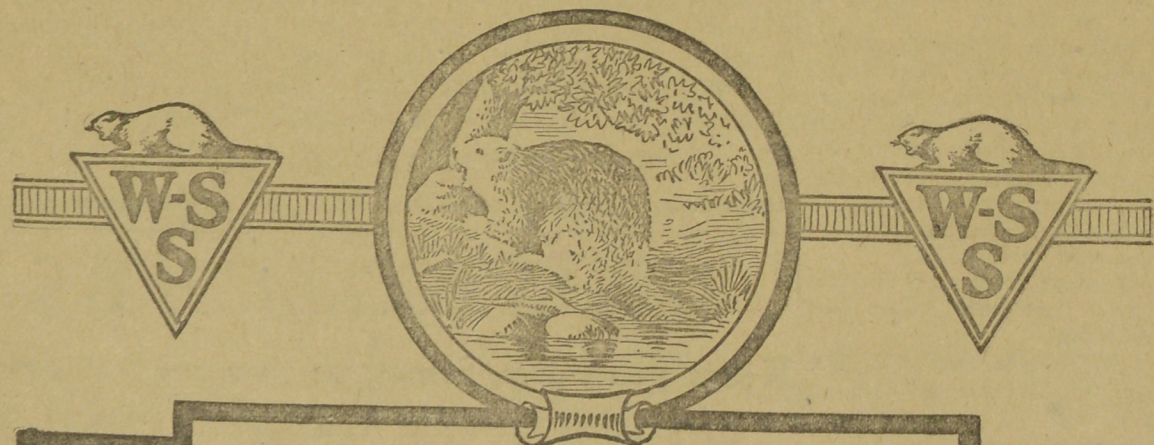
