EXEMPTION OF TAXATION OF RETURNED MEN ADOPTED

Practically One Year's Exemption—Pressed Brick to be Used
For Outside of City Hall Chimney—Tax Collections Have
Fallen Off — Ald. Reid Says it is Due to Arrears Being
Cleaned Up.

The City Council last night held a brief session the business being transacted in short order. The full text of the report of the Assessment Appeals and Contingencies Committee on the request for tax exemption for returned soldiers was adopted being in the main as forecasted by The Mail, exemption for one year. There was discussion concerning the rebuilding of the City Hall chimney and it finally was decided to rebuild with pressed brick for the outside. The report on tax collections showed that there has been a marked falling off in September of this year as compared with that of 1918. Ald. Reid explained it by stating that collections of arrears for past years had been pressed with the result that there was a smaller total from which to collect.

Ald. Burpee was the only absentee and Mayor Hanson was in the chair.

Municipal Home

Ald. Barker for the Municipal Home Committee reported that expenditures at the home had been \$142.18; outside relief \$58.11. On his motion a cheque for \$250 was ordered to issue in favor of Commissioner Niles.

Tax Collections

Ald. Reid presented the following comparative statement of tax collections: September, 1919, \$1,987.66; September, 1918, \$3,189.80.

In response to the comment of His Worship that there had been a marked falling off in collections Ald. Reid explained that arrears for past years were getting pretty well cleared up and there was not as much to collect.

City Hall Chimney

For the City Hall Committee Ald. Baxter reported that the committee had awarded a contract for a new chimney for the City Hall to Newton Jarvis contract figure \$625.

Ald. Wilkinson suggested that the Council consider the use of pressed brick instead of reinforced brick as the latter would not add to the appearance of the City Hall.

City Engineer McDowell stated that the difference in cost would be about \$85 for material but the bricklayers would not do the work for the same price.

After discussion the report on the motion Ald. Barker was referred back to the City Hall Committee with instructions to use pressed brick on the outside.

New Scales Ordered

Ald. Cooper for the City Hall and Market Committee reported that scales for the market had been purchased and an order given for new outside weigh scales. The action of the committee was confirmed.

Tax Exemption for Soldiers

For the Assessment Appeals Committee Ald. Wilkinson reported that the committee had decided that income and poll taxes on returned soldiers be remitted for a period of one year.

The full text of the report is:

Report of the Assessment Appeals and Contingencies Committee held this day to consider the Memorial of the Great War Veterans' Association regarding taxation.

Upon consideration being had of the Memorial of the Great War Veteran's Association by your Committee to which was referred the said Memorial Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:

1. That all soldiers discharged be-

tween September 1, 1917, and September 1, 1918, and who have not been rehabilitated in civil life, be relieved from Income and Poll Tax during the period of absence and for the year 1918.

2. That all soldiers discharged between September 1, 1918 and September 1, 1919, and who have not been rehabilitated in civil life, be relieved from Income and Poll Tax during the period of absence and for the year 1919.

3. That the Assessors be recommended for the year 1920, not to assess any soldier for Income or Poll tax who has been discharged subsequent to September 1, 1919, and who has not been rehabilitated in civil life.

4. That the City Treasurer be authorized to remit taxes on Income and Poll taxes on any soldiers assessed contrary to paragraph one and two of this report upon production of official discharge papers to the Principal Assessor.

5. That the production of official discharge papers to the Principal Assessor be a condition precedent to the remission of any such taxes, also that all claims must be made before December 31st, 1919.

F'ton, Oct. 3, 1919.

Mayor Hanson said he had communicated with the mayor of St. John and had been informed that exemption of all income tax of \$1,600 was being allowed this year only.

Lighting Matters

Ald. Baxter reported that he had been informed that the lights on the fence of the military properties Queen Street could not be wired for the city's current.

Ald. Cooper suggested that the Militia Department be asked to put the wiring in proper condition.

A cheque for \$300 was ordered to issue as a grant to the Children's Aid Society.

Alex. Burnett and William McFadgen Elected in Parish of Burton.

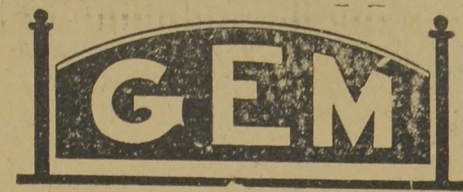
The biennial municipal elections took place in Sunbury county Tuesday with contests in but two of the seven parishes—Burton and Northfield.
