SECOND DAY OF THE GREAT STEEL STRIKE

New York, Sept. 24.—A press review of the steel strike situation today is as follows:

The second day of the great struggle between the labor unions and the United States Steel Corporation opened with the question as to the extent to which the industry has been affected by the strike still uncertain, confused as it is by the conflicting claims of the claders on either side. That the industry has been gravely gripped in the great centers of Pittsburgh, Chicago and Youngstown was certain and early reports today recorded several gains for the strikers.

In the Pittsburgh district several of the Carnegie Steel Company's plants were closed and the Braddock and Rankin plants of the American Steel and Wire Company, both of which attempted to continue operations yesterday, shut down today. These two concerns employ about approximately 10,000 men.

In the Chicago district similar conditions prevailed. Nearly all the plants in that region, including Gary and Hammond either were closed down today or operating at greatly reduced capacity. The strike leaders claimed that seventy-five per cent of the 90,000 workers were out and that in the Gary the percentage was 95. Steel company officials refused to concede a higher percentage than twenty.

In the Mahoning Valley district, of which Youngstown is the heart, all reports agreed that the strikers had achieved their most marked success. The strike leaders claimed that 55,000 men had quit work and their claims were supported by the fact that many large plants were closed, three, in particular, which employs alone 16,500 men. Plants which were still operating had admittedly greatly reduced forces.

The possibility of the spread of the strike to as yet unaffected plants was more threatening today. At the Bethlehem works of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation where 36,000 men are employed, the union leaders announced that no reply had been received to their request for a conference with the company officials and that preparations were being completed for calling out the workers.

PROHIBITION WAS DISCUSSED

Ottawa, Sept. 23.—General regret was voiced at a Unionist caucus today at the inability of Sir Robert Borden to be present because of continued indisposition and the hope was expressed by many that he would soon be well again. The business of the session, more particularly the proposal to again introduce prohibition legislation continuing in force for a period of one year the Dominion order-in-council were discussed. It is understood that a number of the government supporters inclined to the view that, the war over, the matter of prohibition should be left to the provinces.

SACKVILLE MAN WON A PRIZE

Toronto, Sept. 23.—Rev. John Galt, Peterboro, Ont., was the winner of the first prize of \$125 for the best manuscript on "The Twentieth Century Minister," offered by the Forward Movement Committee of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. This announcement was made yesterday. The second prize of \$75 was awarded to Rev. Herbert E. Thomas, Sackville, N. B.

ENCOURAGING THE SHEEP INDUSTRY

INDUCEMENT TO USE A PURE BRED RAM AT THE HEAD OF YOUR FLOCK OF SHEEP.

THE NEW BRUNSWICK DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE are co-operating with the Dominion Live Stock Branch in encouraging the use of Pure Bred Rams.

Persons Eligible.

Any sheep raiser who purchases a pure bred registered ram and who has not before at any time used a pure bred ram in his own flock, shall be entitled to a premium of ten dollars the first year, five of which will be paid by the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture and five by the Dominion Live Stock Branch, and an additional premium of five dollars the second year, payable by the Live Stock Branch. Applications for premiums to be sent in to Live Stock Division, Department of Agriculture, Fredericton, not later than December 1st.

Co-operative Purchasing of Pure-Bred Stock.

The Dominion Live Stock Branch will pay the travelling expenses to any point east of Fort William, Ontario, of any accredited man appointed by a Society, group of Societies or group of farmers who have orders to purchase at least twenty-five pure bred rams for farmers never having used a pure bred before. This same person has the privilege of making purchases of other live stock or rams for any farmer while on the trip, so long as the minimum of twenty-five rams are purchased as outlined above.

Grading of Pure Bred Rams in New Brunswick.

The services of Professor Sackville, of Ontario Agricultural College, have been secured to visit each pure bred breeder in the province and classify the rams offered for sale into three grades, superior, average and common. By purchasing your rams in the province, farmers can write any breeder of pure bred sheep and be sure of getting the class of ram he applies for. New Brunswick is the first province to adopt this classification system. Breeders and purchasers stand to gain by it. The number of rams for sale, together with the price and grade, will be listed with the local Live Stock Division.

Boys' and Girls' Sheep Clubs.

In order to create a deeper interest among our farm boys and girls in the business of sheep raising, arrangements have been completed to organize Sheep Clubs in the province. Members must be between the ages of ten to eighteen years. Ten members will constitute a Club. Two grade Shearling ewes will be the number allotted to each. Members can get credit from any bank for purchase price of sheep for one year at 6 per cent interest. The Department will loan a pure-bred ram to any Club with twenty ewes.
