

OPERATION BY C.N.R. TO FOLLOW NEW TIMETABLE

A FINAL INSPECTION
MADE SATURDAY

A Satisfactory Train Service
Expected When the Winter
Schedule is Announced
About Oct. 1st.

It is reported that the delay in the operations of the St. John & Quebec Railway between Gagetown and St. John by the Canadian National Railways is connected quite closely with the fact that a winter timetable will go into effect on or about October 1st. It is believed that when the new time table is made public a satisfactory train service for the entire St. John & Quebec Railway will be provided. Had a service been put into effect before, a change would have been necessary when the new arrangement would be made and the C. N. R. authorities evidently have avoided such change.

Inspected on Saturday

Mr. E. S. Carter, secretary of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company is in the city today. He stated this morning that the engineers who inspected the railway from Gagetown to Westfield on Saturday last pronounced it in proper condition. The inspection was made by J. J. Taylor of the Department of Railways and Canals, Mr. Tapley of the Canadian National Railways and C. O. Foss of the St. John & Quebec Railway. Mr. Carter said that the result of the inspection was telegraphed to D. B. Hanna, president of the C. N. R. and to the Department of Railways and Canals. Operation of the line by the C. N. R. is expected at an early date.

Alma Supply Co., Limited

Harry Hall Reid of Sussex, Fred Perley Keirstead of Alma and Edward Elmore Lewis of Waterside, Albert County, have been incorporated as Alma Supply Co., Limited, with authority to take over and acquire as a going concern the mercantile business now carried on by Charles T. White & Son at Alma, also to engage in lumbering, milling and other lines of business. The capital stock is sixty-eight thousand dollars and head office is at Alma.

EXTENSION OF JOHN PALMER CO. FACTORY BEGINS

SITE BEING CLEARED AND
EXCAVATION TO FOLLOW

Work on the addition which is to be built by The John Palmer Company, Limited, to its factory in Argyle street began this morning. The clearing of the site of the addition was begun and will be followed by excavation. The estimated cost is about \$25,000 and it is hoped that the building will be in use by December. John C. Smith who has erected a number of buildings this season is the contractor.

Will Continue Front

The addition will continue the existing front of the building carrying it sixty feet along Argyle Street. The same style will be adopted, with large arched double windows on the ground floor. It will be used for the warehouse and shipping-room which are in the present building. Changes are made necessary by the expansion of the business which is the largest "oil-tan" business in the Dominion.

New Line of Footwear

One reason for the building of the addition is the decision of The John Palmer Company to manufacture a new line of footwear. What the line will be is not yet announced. The greatly increased demand for the Farm and Plough Shoes made by this company also has made more room necessary.

Details of Construction

Mill-construction will be employed in building the addition as it was in the present building. The new part will be of brick construction three stories and a basement. Gravel for the concrete is now on the ground. The dimensions will be sixty feet by fifty and some fifteen thousand square feet of floor space will be provided by it. A bicycle-room for the storage of bicycles used by employees in going to and from work will be an important feature of the addition. The temporary wooden structure used as bicycle-room and garage was moved this morning to clear the site of the new building.

Ultimate Intention

The ultimate intention of The John Palmer Co. is to extend its plant until it will form three sides of an oblong with the tank of the sprinkler-system in the centre.
