

## DIVORCE COURT WILL SIT HERE ON MONDAY

### POSTPONEMENT EXPECTED IN FITZ RANDOLPH CASE

Commissions Returned in the Cases of Lawton vs. Lawton and Moore vs. Moore.

The Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes of the Province of New Brunswick will meet here on Monday to continue an adjourned sitting. No new cases will be heard but a number of cases which were on the docket will come up.

The case of Charles FitzRandolph vs. Elizabeth FitzRandolph a Fredericton case which attracted much attention when first tried and which is to be retried with a jury, is not expected to be heard on account of delay in securing some witnesses and evidence by commission. It is probable that the case will go over until July.

In two cases commissions issued for the taking of evidence outside New Brunswick, have been returned. These are the cases of Lawton vs. Lawton and Moore vs. Moore.

The case of Burton vs. Burton, which was stood over for the securing of additional evidence, will be finished according to expectation.

### UNITED DAIRYMEN OF NEW BRUNSWICK

Meeting Yesterday at Sussex —E. P. Bradt, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, in Attendance.

The United Dairymen of New Brunswick is the name of an organization formed at Sussex on Friday. Mr. E. P. Bradt, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, was present as were also Mr. Harvey Mitchell and Mr. George H. Barr of Ottawa, both of the Dominion Dairy Branch. The objects of the association are to have the dairying interests of New Brunswick represented on the Canadian Dairy Council to co-operate in the purchase of factory supplies and to work together for the improvement of the quality of product.

All branches of milk, butter and cheese production are represented in the association. An annual convention of members of the association has been proposed.
