I do not pretend that al the trunk roads of the province are first class or have been made first class under my administration, but do say without any fear of contradiction that my department has done excellent work on nearly all the grea roads. It must not be forgotten that only began looking after the roads ab out the middle of July 1917. I had to completely reorganize the outside work of the department, and we were only able to work during the months of July, August and September-only two and a half months the first year. We began in May, 1918, and wound up in October-about five months This year we began about May 20, and up to the present time, making only about two months so far this months working on the roads.
