

G. W. V. A. ASKS RE-APPOINTMENT OF J. H. MCCOLLOM

RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE EXECUTIVE

Removal of C. W. Burnett from Board of Valuers Requested—McCormick Willing to Return.

The executive committee of the Fredericton Branch G. W. V. A. met last night and passed resolutions with regard to matters directly connected with civic government and administration of the law in Fredericton.

For ex-Ald. Burnett's Removal
One resolution requested of the City Council the removal of ex-Ald. C. W. Burnett from the Board of Valuers appointed last week for the purpose of revaluing property in Fredericton for purposes of assessment, on the ground that he opposed the Military Service Act actively by speeches and political work.

For McCormick's Reappointment
Another resolution was to the effect that the executive should wait upon the Police Commission of Fredericton and request the appointment of John H. McCormick on the police force as it is understood that he is willing to act again.

Mr. McCormick is a returned soldier and a member of the G. W. V. A. He was chief of the Fredericton police force for several years resigning his appointment after an investigation of charges preferred by other members of the force. After resigning he enlisted and went overseas.

Put Out Bonfire

The police last evening interrupted a charcoal bonfire on King Street which was being given in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Bright, recently married, who returned home last evening. A bonfire was lit but was put out by the police.

New Director Here

Mr. A. C. Gorman of Sussex, recently appointed Director of Elementary Agricultural Education, in succession to Mr. R. P. Steeves, arrived here today and is in consultation with Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture and his deputy, Mr. E. P. Bratt.

Arrested Last Evening

A man who arrived here last evening from St. Stephen was arrested on a warrant as he stepped from the train. He was charged with stealing jewelry at St. Stephen, including a gold watch and chain and several rings. He will be taken to St. Stephen this evening to face the charge of theft.

Weekly Roll Off

About twenty bowlers took part in the weekly roll-off at the Palace Alley last night. "Rock" Paynter led with a total of 291, followed by J. Searies with 279. Al Ring came third with 276. A number of postponed games are to be played this week in order to clean up the league as soon as possible.

Held Meeting Yesterday

The meeting of the Returned Soldiers' Aid yesterday afternoon at the City Council chamber was fairly well attended. The routine business, consisting of the month's reports was carried out and the usual preparations were made for future work. No new features of the work in connection with the society came up.

Will Take Summer Course

Mr. Carl Heckbert, a returned soldier who has been taking the Manual Training Course at the Provincial Normal School leaves today for Peoria, Illinois, where he will take a finishing summer course. Mr. Heckbert has put in an application for the position of Manual Training Instructor for Fredericton schools.

Leaving for Ontario

Mr. M. A. Tweeddale manager of the McFarlane-Neill Manufacturing Company's plant in Devon left yesterday for Pembroke, Ont. where are located the headquarters of the Thomas Pink Company which last autumn acquired control of the Neill-McFarlane plant. Mr. Albert Boone accompanied Mr. Tweeddale and they will be gone some time.

Crop Conditions

The following telegram on crop conditions has been received at Ottawa by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics from the superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Farm: New Brunswick, Fredericton—May cold and generally dry, facilitating seeding. Grain all seeded and potatoes mostly planted in Upper St. John Valley. More precipitation in eastern section of province preventing seeding. Grass looks well and fall rye at Experimental Farm is three feet high and heading. Fall wheat also looking well. Live stock all on pasture at end of month.

Formerly of Marysville

Mr. A. G. Tapley of St. John has received a telegram informing him of the death of his mother, Mrs. E. A. Tapley, at Toronto, on June 8, after a lingering illness. She is survived by her husband, three sons, a daughter, a brother and a sister, Alexander G. of St. John; H. Mark, of New York City; John H. and Miss Florence, of Toronto; a brother, H. U. Mallory, of St. Paul, Minn., and a sister, Mrs. A. H. Raitt, of Boston, Mass. Besides her relatives she leaves a large circle of friends, both in the east and west. The late Mrs. Tapley formerly resided at Marysville. The funeral will take place at Toronto today.

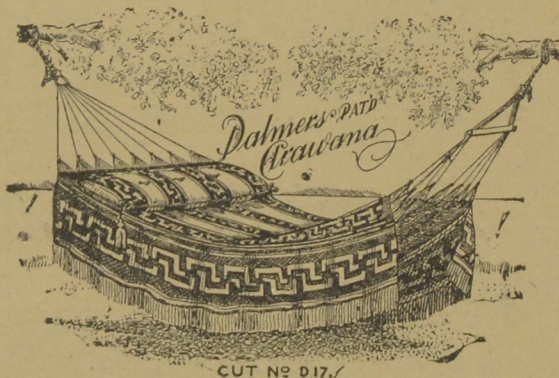

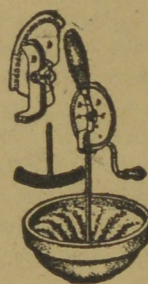
