THE NOVITIATE ENQUIRY.

The Toronto Saturday Night, an independent newspaper, in discussing the report of the Commission on the Guelph Novitiate enquiry, makes the following comment:

The last chapter on the subject of the raid at the Jesuit Novitiate at Guelph in June, 1918, has, it is hoped, been written. Hon. S. C. Mewburn and Hon. Charles Doherty have been exonerated of the charge that in behaving like gentlemen they were guilty of impropriety; the "discrimination" charged in connection with the Novitiate is shown to have consisted in the fact that this was the only theological institution subjected to the indignity of a raid; the action of the chief censor in endeavoring to so far as possible put the lid on the bad feeling that the publication of such an incident would certainly cause, is rightly commended. In short, those who forced the appointment of a government commission to ventilate this unfortunate affair are hoist with their own petard. And now let us for a moment reckon what the desire of two or three professional Protestants to advertise themselves has cost the country. It has wasted a good many thousand dollars at a time when the need of economy is imperative; but this is a small consideration in comparison with the ill-feeling that has been generated by the whole affair. The ordinary religionist who is always looking for a place in the limelight through agitation, is at all times a menace to public order and neighborly feeling; but the professional Protestant is probably the worst enemy of our civilization. He has been properly put where he belongs by Mr. Justice Middleton, and it is to be hoped that he and others like him will profit by the lesson.

FELL ON DEAF EARS.

The Chatham Commercial, commenting on the Opposition convention and the observations made at the same by a Chatham delegate to the effect that "the Conservative party is as dead as Julius Caesar and was killed from the inside," has this to say:

It is possible, however, that Mr. Mersereau, when he made the remarks ascribed to him, had not so much in mind the Conservative party generally as those who claim to be exponents of that party's policies in the Provincial arena, and whose doings have been so much in the limelight in recent times. If he had, his advice appears to have fallen upon deaf ears. The outcome of the convention proceedings appears to be that the provincial party intends to adhere steadfastly to the old ideas and conceptions and refuses to change either its leaders or its policies. It apparently does not matter that the conduct of their leader had been "deprecatory" by their own colleagues and supporters in the House, or that whatever their explanations of it may be, the public, rightly or wrongly, regards it with a certain amount of suspicion.

BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE.

The patriotism of Canadians is so clearly demonstrated to have been all wool and a yard wide that it has been unnecessary to dwell upon it in connection with the Victory Loan campaign. It was certain from the outset that the people would subscribe enough money to enable Canada to meet her obligations to the returned soldier and carry out her pledges. The effort has lain rather in the direction of building up over-subscriptions which would furnish Canada with a working capital that would enable her to build for the future. There are enormous trade possibilities awaiting us in Europe that have only been partially

developed; and the extent of the over-subscription will fix the amount that Canada is able to devote to seizing this trade, which must for the present be upon credit.

Members of the Opposition in the House of Commons who were opposed to the passing of the "Conditional Prohibition" law, declare that the Act will be attacked in the courts the first time it is invoked. These point out that the Act was passed on Sunday, and declare that the Lord's Day Act, until that statute is repealed, is binding on Parliament, as on other elements of the community. They point to the rules of the House to show that Sunday sittings are irregular, and further, falling back on precedent, claim that such a course was never followed before by the Canadian Parliament. Even during the famous naval debate, a Sabbath truce was called. The bill in question was put through the House of Commons shortly before 1 o'clock last Sunday morning.

Owing to the serious illness of ex-Premier Flemming, the government counsel in the suit pending against him for the return of moneys paid him by Mr. A. R. Gould and the Prudential Trust Company, have been instructed to allow the case to stand for the present. Should the ex-Premier's health show signs of improvement the case will be proceeded with.

The St. John Standard is trying hard to make it appear that there are no "traitors and hypocrites" among Leader Murray's legislative following. The Globe takes the opposite view and cites one J. B. M. Baxter, ex-Attorney General, as its authority.

A Newfoundland Visitor

Mr. N. J. Sinnott second steward of the S. S. Kyle, of the Reid-Newfoundland Company, plying between North Sydney and Port au Basque, is in the city the guest of Mr. J. N. Ferguson. He has three brothers and two sisters living in this vicinity and may remain here the greater part of the winter. Mr. Sinnott reports business very brisk in Newfoundland and says that the colony has developed an immense tourist travel. The high price of fish in recent years has put most of the fishermen on easy street. He says that Scotch cured herring sell for \$18.50 a barrel, while the best brand of codfish bring \$15 per quintal. The island is rich in lumber lands and minerals and great development work is now going on.
