## ROUSH MAKING A BID FOR BATTING CHAMPIONSHIP

Official Averages Just Released Show Him to be Tied With Jim

Thorpe of Boston for Second Place—His Average is 326—

Ty Cobb Still the Champion of the American League—Sensational Slugging by Ruth and Eddie Collins.

Chicago, Aug. 30—Ed. Roush, one of the batting stars in Cincinnati's pennant drive, is making a strong bid for the batting championship of the National League. Unofficial averages released today show him tied with Jim Thorpe, of Boston, for second place with an average of .326, while Cravath, manager of the Philadelphia club, tops the league hitters with .340. Cravath is still in possession of home run hitting honors with eleven. Cuthbert of Pittsburgh, continues to show the way to the base stealers with thirty-one, with Bigbee, a team-mate and Jack Smith, of St. Louis, tied for second with 26.

Other leading National League hitters follow: Mesnel, Philadelphia, .317; Groh, Cincinnati, .313; Stock, St. Louis, .306.

With the close of the season a month away Ty Cobb is in no appar-

ent danger of being dethroned as the champion batter of the American League. The Detroit star is safely in the lead with an average of .380. Veach, Cobb's team-mate, is in second place, with .356.

### Sensational Slugger

Ruth, the sensational slugger with Boston, who is striving to break the major league home run record of 25 established by Freeman, of the Washington National League in 1908, has shattered the American League record with 23, bagging four in his last six games. Ruth has also scored a total of eighty runs in 106 games.

Eddie Collins, the Chicago second baseman is pressing George Sisler, of St. Louis for honors in base stealing. Sisler, with 26 having a margin of two. Other leading American batters include Jackson, Chicago, .347; Sisler, St. Louis, .347; Jacobson, St. Louis, .340.

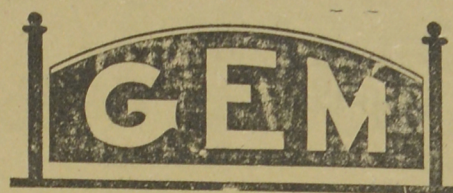
