

LATE BLIGHT ON POTATOES IS NOW REPORTED

NO CHANGE REPORTED IN LIVE STOCK CONDITIONS

Expect Light Grain Crop in Carleton County—Northern Counties Expect a "Good Yield."

The weekly report of agricultural conditions in New Brunswick as reported by the District Representatives of the Department of Agriculture has been handed to the press for publication as follows:

Grain harvesting is becoming quite general in many sections of the province. The crop varies greatly throughout the province. In sections of Carleton where drought injured the crops to quite an extent, the crop is inclined to be light. Taking the province as a whole, the grain crop will be up to a fair average. It is somewhat thin on the ground but is well headed and well filled. Some northern counties report extra good crops of grain.

Late Blight Reported

Reports of late blight on potatoes are beginning to come in from the potato inspectors. This has been much later than usual in showing up and the potatoes are nearer maturity. The cloudy weather, with little sunshine seems to have favored the development of the disease. Just how far the blight will develop on the later varieties can not be estimated at present.

Cobblers are being put on the market now. The average price received by the growers being around \$3.00 per barrel.

Little Change in Livestock

Under livestock reports, there is little change from last week. The northern counties report farmers being offered \$5.00 each for lambs but few sales being made. Lambs are in good condition generally and growing well. Pastures are getting shorter all the time. Recent rains will freshen them up somewhat. Cows are reported to be in good demand, with prices remaining high. Beef cattle are slightly lower in price, due to the larger number coming on the market.

Rev. S. A. Bayley, a well known Methodist clergyman passed away yesterday at the St. John Infirmary. He had been in the West for some years and only recently returned to his native province. Mr. Robert Bayley deputy provincial treasurer, is a brother of the deceased.

Labor Day, September 1st, will be observed at the Post Office as formerly. There will be no delivery by letter carrier; street letter boxes will be cleared at 10 a. m. and 10 p. m.; incoming mail will be sorted and outgoing mail despatched up to 12 noon; general delivery wickets, registry office and stamp office will be open from 10 a. m. to 12 noon.

Some Big Trout

There is being mounted by Geo. A. Davis Taxidermist of this place with other specimens a square tailed brook trout, caught by Mr. P. E. Mermelstorf of Phillipsburg, Centre Co., Pennsylvania in Cain's River in July of this year that measures close to 22 inches in length, and weighed 5 lb and 12 ounces. It is one of the very largest of its species caught in these waters for many years and has rarely been exceeded.

Cadet Corps Organized

Mr. J. E. Page, Instructor of the High School Cadet Corps has already organized the new pupils of the High School into the "B" Company with a total attendance of about thirty or thirty-five cadets. The "A" Company Corps will consist of between twenty-five and thirty cadets. Drill started with the new cadets yesterday and they are very enthusiastic over the idea. A prize of two dollars will be awarded at the close of the year on inspection to every cadet who has been on parade eighty per cent of the drill days.

Young Woman's Death

Miss Agnes M. Burns, a daughter of the late Mr. Isaac Burns, a former member of the R. C. R. died at her home, 276 King Street, this morning. Her death was caused by tuberculosis which developed from an attack of influenza. The deceased was twenty-three years of age and besides a widowed mother leaves two sisters, Mrs. Albert Bright and Miss Queenie Burns and one brother, Arthur, at home. The funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock with services by Rev. G. M. Young. Interment will be made at the Pickard Burying Ground.

TOURIST TRADE TO CITY NEEDS ENCOURAGING

IMPROVEMENTS NEEDED BEFORE INFLUX COMES

Complaints Made Concerning the River Service—Board of Trade is Moving in the Matter.

The tourist trade is becoming quite heavy in this city with conditions again becoming settled after nearly five years of war. The Secretary of the Board of Trade stated today that large numbers of tourists had interviewed him during the past season concerning the roads and navigable waterways of the Province. The majority of the requirements of these are road maps for motorists and other details of the various routes fit for motor cars in the Province. Many improvements are necessary before Fredericton can hope to have a larger influx of tourists than have been accustomed to seek this city as a starting point for the various parts of the province.

Ask for Sign Boards

The majority of the tourists who come to this city arrive by cars and they express great surprise on arriving in this city via Calais that in all the ninety-two miles of roadway to this city there is only one sign board to direct cars. This is situated at the Forks where the road branches to Calais and St. Stephen. One Woodstock man driving to this city by car one day last week reported that he had seen no less than sixteen foreign cars pass him on the way to Woodstock from this city. Cars are continually coming from the States and have a chance to show what they can do on the New Brunswick roads. During the last week alone cars from Pennsylvania, Illinois, New York, New Hampshire, New Jersey and some of the Western States have been at the various hotels in this city.

Improvements Demanded

Tourists also come up the river from St. John by boat to view the St. John river in all its glory. The river service however will have to be greatly improved before many tourists will continue their trips by that route. One old lady noticing the condition of affairs stated that were she but twenty years younger she could make a good looking boat of it. The Board of Trade have already written to the D. J. Purdy owners requesting a better service and should nothing result from their request the matter will be submitted to the local government from whom it is understood the steam ship company is receiving a subsidy.

UNIVERSITY TO OPEN FOR EXAMS. SEPTEMBER 18

ATTENDANCE MAY DOUBLE THAT OF LAST YEAR

Number of Returned Soldiers Will Attend—About Fifty New Students Now Expected.

Dr. C. C. Jones, Chancellor of the University of New Brunswick announced this morning that upwards of 50 new pupils were expected at the University this fall. A total attendance of about 150 or 160 students is expected included among them will be a large number of returned soldiers who had broken off their courses for enlistment and other new students returned soldiers, who will begin courses when the University opens on September 18th for supplementary examinations. The attendance last year was only about 70 students but this year it is expected that the attendance will amount to over twice that number. The university will open for lectures on September 22nd. A large number of the returned men are being attracted by an abbreviated course in forestry which has been arranged for their benefit.

New Members of Faculty

When the University opens three new members of the faculty will be present. The first new member is Lieut. E. L. Harvey who has been appointed to the chair of English. Lieut. Harvey enlisted in 1915 as a rifleman in the King's Royal Rifle Corps, while attending Oxford University and saw much service which later won him a commission in the East Kent Regiment (Buff's) with which he served for some time in India. Earl O. Turner has been appointed to the position of Engineering Instructor which was vacant and Albert Pulling was appointed to the position of Forestry Instructor which was also vacant.

Big Market Today

One of the old time country markets was assembled at Phoenix Square this morning the teams extending down Queen Street for some distance. Produce was abundant as were buyers and prices did not differ much from last Saturday's list. Potatoes were down as far as \$2.75 a barrel while eggs and butter at one time sold for 50 cents.
