BOOMING HON. MR. FIELDING TO LIBERAL LEADERSHIP

**Former Minister of Finance Has Strong Claims—Is Looked
Upon as a Safe Man in Tariff Matters—Has Been an In-
dependent Supporter of Union Government — National
Convention Committee is Meeting at Ottawa Today.**

 (Montreal Star)
Ottawa, July 29.—A large-sized
boom for Hon. W. S. Fielding to lead
the Liberal party is under way. The
arrival of the provincial premiers this
week and of the regular delegates to
the national convention next week
may work a change and entirely very
the situation, but so far as Ottawa can
size it up, Mr. Fielding is the present
favorite. The view obtains widely that
many of those whose names will be
entered in the leadership race will not
be the last analysis, toe the scratch.
They are expected to back the gen-
tlemen who bring forward their names
but ask respectfully, to withdraw. The
contest may thus be reduced and sim-
plified.

 The advisory committee meeting
towards the end of the week will out-
line the procedure. Most favor the
platform first and the leader after-
wards, but the view is heard that the
party head should be selected at the
outset, to the end that he may have a
particularly prominent part in build-
ing the platform upon which he will
be the most conspicuous personage.

Mr. Fielding's Fitness

 The boom for Fielding as leader is
predicted not only because of his ab-
ility but his long Parliamentary ex-
perience. What operates as some-
what of a drawback is his age. The
former Finance Minister is over sev-
enty.

 It is freely asserted by Ministers of
the present Government that no gen-
eral election is contemplated before
1921 or 1922 and Mr. Fielding will be
much older and perhaps not in a po-
sition to campaign strenuously. This
may be an influence towards a young-
er man.

 On the other hand it may tempo-
rarily curb certain ambitions of men
who will be prepared to wait.
The member for Queens-Shelburne
was a conscientious man who gave an
independent support to the Union gov-
ernment. He was nominated however,
by a straight Liberal convention. His
Conservative opponent retired at the
instance of Sir Robert Borden and he
was elected by acclamation. The argu-
ment is advanced that he is a "safe"
man. That, while favoring a low tar-
iff, he is unlikely to be extreme in his
Radicalism.

East and West Problem

 Some difficulty is foreseen in agree-
ing upon a platform the eternal ques-
tion of east and west is bound to ar-
ise. In the eastern wing of the party
are not a few who are protectionists
at least to a considerable degree. The
westerners would utterly eliminate
the protective factor in the tariff, and
it may be difficult to find common
ground. Likewise, the west is for na-
tional ownership on broad lines, while
the eastern party has always been
against it.

 On other matters the two sections
are apart. What may prove to be a
solidifying influence is the apparently
general desire to take a "crack" at the
Union Government.

 It is stated today on good authority
that while Premier Martin, of Sas-
katchewan will be put in nomination
for the party leadership he will not
allow his name to go to a vote at the
convention.

 The Liberal advisory committee
will meet on Thursday to draft an
agenda for the convention, and it will
be submitted to the caucus of Liberal
senators and members on Monday.
There may be joint chairmen.

 Anyone who had a suggestion to
make on the subject of a party plat-
form was invited to do so up to Sat-
urday last. These proposals along
with others will go to a resolutions
committee which will draft the plat-
form. They cover a very wide range
and if all is embodied the platform
will be lengthy and somewhat elastic
Varied Program

 There are various demands in re-
gard to the tariff and other systems
of revenue and taxation, reciprocity,
the Imperial preference, the War
Time Elections Act, the franchise,
against legislative orders-in-council,
on immigration, in favor of freedom
of speech, freedom of the press, free-
dom of association, against the de-
portation of British subjects, propor-
tional representation, national own-
ership, prohibition and other questions.

 The national Liberal convention
committee, with power to add to their
number which meets Thursday, is
composed of D. D. McKenzie, M.P.
chairman; Senator Hewitt Bostock,

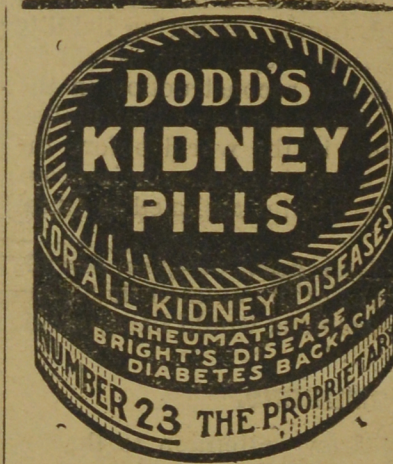
