## MUCH WORK CUT OUT FOR THE LIBERAL CONVENTION

Resolutions and Suggestions Have Been Sent in From All Points of the Compass—Convention Committee Meeting Today at Ottawa—Problem of Dealing With Returned Soldiers to Have Careful Consideration.

Ottawa, July 30—When the national Liberal Committee meets tomorrow in the office of D. D. McKenzie, opposition leader, it will be confronted with a mass of material bearing on the tariff, reestablishment of the soldier in civilian life, a fair and equitable franchise, transportation, industry and other matters demanding immediate and intelligent and courageous attention. Resolutions, letters and suggestions have been sent in from all points of the compass, and men especially interested in the various problems have been giving their best and closest attention to them. The committee as a whole could not hope to deal with all these varied questions in time for the convention and, therefore, it is proposed that after convening tomorrow the committee shall form various sub-committees to take up the material gathered with assiduous care from all sources with regard to each topic to be considered.

### Studying Many Subjects

The first duty of each sub-committee will be to get familiar with all the information gathered on each subject so that later meetings of the committee and the convention members can give authoritative information to those desiring it. Resolutions passed by former conventions as well as those sent in for consideration at next week's convention have been printed so that the committee first and delegates later can know the whole history of Liberal opinion on the subjects considered.

Most interesting and timely is the printed material collected for use by the committee in considering the vast mass of information prepared to show what has been done in various countries and in the past for returned soldiers to indicate the nature of all the problems connected with getting the soldiers back into civilian life in positions that offer hope for the future and that are remunerative now as well as in caring for those who are suffering from disabilities caused by the war.

How best to care for the dependents of soldiers killed or disabled in the war will be given special consideration.

Among those invited to attend the meetings of this soldier committee and the convention committee to be formed later are Hon. H. S. Beland, M. P., chairman; D. C. Ross, M. P.; C. G. Power, M. P.; Hon. Duncan Marshall; Eric Reid; Capt. C. B. Reilly; Major Mack Lang; Major E. L. Streight; Captain D. C. Lockhead; Lieutenant-Colonel C. M. Edwards; Lieutenant-Colonel Gordon Stewart; Lieutenant-Colonel A. E. Bywater; Lieutenant-Colonel Dube; Lieutenant-Colonel Bart Robeson; Colonel E. D. O'Flynn; Major J. C. Tolmie, M. P.; Lieutenant-Colonel McKenzie; Major (Dr.) Arthur; Major W. Ross; Capt. (Dr.) F. W. McKinnon; Major F. H. Honeywell; Major J. Sills; Lieutenant-Colonel J. L. Ralston; S. D. Dudley; Lieutenant-Colonel Lafleche; Major George Vanier; Major A. F. Grothe and Captain L. Plante. The last four being officers of the famous 22nd Battalion.

Other sub-committee will deal with party organization, resolutions passed by many district conventions asking for reform of the tariff downwards and with various other subjects of outstanding national importance on which it is essential Liberals declare themselves. It is certain that one small sub-committee will have for its duty the drafting of an appropriate resolution expressing the party's appreciation of the matchless services to Canada of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the deep regret of every Liberal that death had deprived the country of his services. In the convention eloquent reference is bound to be made to the movement now progressing under the

guidance of Hon. Sydney Fisher for a national monument or memorial to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. A warm reception to the idea is assured.

As soon as sub-committees have finished their work it is likely that the committee will decide on the order of business and the daily programme of the convention on August 5, 6 and 7. In all these matters it is probable that the procedure worked out for the historic convention of 1893 will be closely followed or adopted to present conditions. On that occasion the chairman of the local arrangements introduced Sir Wilfrid Laurier, leader of the opposition, who moved that Sir William Mullock should be chairman and so it got started. Probably D. D. McKenzie, temporary opposition leader, will make the same motion, naming whatever man the committee thinks would be most suitable for the great event. It will have to be decided whether there be a joint chairmanship of only one chairman.

The first man, however, that Edwards attempted to collect from at the other end of the viaduct, connected with Edwards' jaw. The other "collector" fled.


### SOME PIG


