LIVELY SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL LAST NIGHT

**Dr. W. C. Kierstead, C. W. Burnett and H. V. Gunter Appointed
Valuators in Spite of Opposition—Notice of Reconsidera-
tion Given—Mayor Hanson Says There is Appearance of
Lobbying in This Matter—Peace Celebration and Street
Paving Program.**

The City Council held its regular
June session last night and it was
lively in spots. The item of business
which caused the greatest difference
in opinion was the appointment of a
Board of Valuers to revalue property
in the city for purposes of assessment.
Dr. W. C. Kierstead, ex-Ald. C. W. Bur-
nett and Herbert V. Gunter were ap-
pointed valuers at a salary to be
fixed later by the Council. The ap-
pointment was made in the face of de-
termined opposition by a minority and
it was claimed that two members of
the Council were absent and that their
absence affected the vote. The ab-
sentees were Ald. McKay and Ald. Bur-
pee. Notice of motion was given that
the motion would be reconsidered.

His Worship the Mayor was particu-
larly outspoken concerning the ap-
pointment of the Board of Valuers,
counselling delay and stating that the
action at that and a recent meeting
had the appearance of lobbying among
the aldermen. He criticized Dr. Kier-
stead's appointment on the ground
that the appointee, although an excel-
lent man in theory, was not practical.
Other members of the council took the
same ground. His Worship's remarks
regarding lobbying brought prompt
denials.

The street paving program also pro-
duced a difference of opinion. The
recommendation of City Engineer Mc-
Dowell to pave a belt line composed of
Queen, Charlotte and Smythe streets
and University avenue, was adopted,
and tenders will be called for, although
it is recognized that all the belt line
cannot be paved in one year. There
was opposition to this, some of the
aldermen taking the ground that
Brunswick and George streets should
be placed in better condition and Char-
lotte and Smythe streets left for the
present. The majority decided to ad-
here to the original program.

The increasing of the membership
of aldermen on the Playgrounds Com-
mittee also provoked discussion and
opposition, but finally was carried out.
Difference of opinion arose also in re-
gard to the peace celebration, and the
civic grant was reduced from the pro-
posed amount of \$1,000 to \$600.

Municipal Home.

Ald. Barker reported that expendi-
tures for the month in the Municipal
Home department had totalled \$365.50.
On his motion a cheque for \$150 was
ordered to issue in favor of Commis-
sioner Niles.

Street Matters.

The recommendations of City En-
gineer McDowell concerning perman-
ent paving and other street work were
adopted.

Ald. Young said he would like to
see George and Brunswick streets re-
ceive attention, instead of Charlotte
street being tarviated from University
avenue to Smythe street.

Mayor Hanson said it would be fea-
sible to do that, as it was not expect-
ed to complete Charlotte and Smythe
streets this year.

Ald. Cooper also made a plea for
George and Brunswick streets.

Ald. Young said that he understood
Brunswick street would need to have
considerable expenditure on sewerage
and water mains, particularly sewer-
age, before paving could be attempted.

Ald. Wilkinson said the City En-
gineer should not be interfered with.
He had adopted the plan outlined by
Prof. J. A. Stiles and it should be
followed.

Ald. Davidson advocated expenditure
on Brunswick street. A report had
been brought in by the street commit-
tee for the repairing of the streets
with gravel and cinders. Gravel al-
ready was placed on Smythe street.
It should not be torn up.

Mayor Hanson replied that no pro-
per report to that effect ever had
been brought in by the street commit-
tee. He also could say that City En-
gineer McDowell had condemned the

gravel bought last winter at a cost of
\$4,000.

Ald. Davidson said gravel was there
and should be used.

Ald. Cooper moved in amendment
that permanent pavement be laid on
University avenue from Queen street
to Charlotte street, on Charlotte street
from University avenue to Regent
street, on Queen street from Westmor-
land street to Smythe street.

Ald. Young seconded the amend-
ment.

Mayor Hanson said he would have
to rule the amendment out of order.

The original motion was carried.

On the section with regard to the
purchase of a motor car for the City
Engineer, Ald. Wilkinson asked for
an explanation, which was given by
the Mayor.

The section was adopted.

Peace Celebration

Ald. Wilkinson reported for the
special committee on Peace Celebra-
tion. He moved seconded by Ald.
Cooper that a grant of \$1,000 be voted
to the committee.

Ald. Reid remarked that the amount
named appeared excessive.

Mayor Hanson said the city would
eventually pay all bills but possibly
the amount was excessive.

Ald. Cooper stated the committee
had outlined its plans and had made
an estimate. The money principally
was to go for prizes, for floats, etc., in
four parades. The committee however
could reduce prizes.

Ald. Young suggested that the day
might be devoted to the unveiling of a
memorial. A parade of school chil-
ren and returned soldiers could be
held.

Mayor Hanson replied that St. An-
drew's Society already had made a
start toward a memorial but that
would be a matter to consider some
time in the future.

Ald. Davidson believed that the pa-
triotism of the people would provide a
successful celebration without heavy
expenditure.

Ald. Camp said he was a member of
the committee and when plans were
discussed he believed the estimate
was too great. A good celebration
could be organized for a smaller am-
ount.

Ald. Baxter believed one thousand
dollars would be excessive.

Ald. Cooper said the committee
could reduce the proposed expenditure.
A parade of returned soldiers was out
of the question as the soldiers did not
want to don the uniform again. They
would prepare floats however.

Ald. Young said he merely had made
suggestions. He was not opposed to
spending money and believed six hun-
dred dollars should be expended.

Ald. Wilkinson said the committee
was not wedded to the sum of one

thousand dollars. In amendment he
moved that six hundred dollars be
voted. This was carried.

Playgrounds Committee

To the motion to increase the mem-
bership on the Playgrounds Committee
by the addition of three members Ald.
Reid objected that a mistake was be-
ing made the plans already having
been made.

Ald. Wilkinson said he could not
see the necessity of adding to the
membership. The work was being car-
ried on smoothly. The only trouble
seemed to be between Ald. McKay and
some members of the Citizen's Com-
mittee.

Ald. Wilkinson said he was willing
to withdraw his motion.

Ald. Camp refused to withdraw as
a seconder.

Ald. Davidson said his views had
been changed and he could not see the
necessity of adding to the member-
ship.

Not Sidestepping

Ald. Young was similarly minded.
Mayor Hanson made a remark to City
Clerk Perkins and Ald. Young object-
ed. His Worship apologized and fol-
lowed up his apology with a statement
to the effect that he had remarked to
the City Clerk that Ald. Young like
the others was sidestepping.

Ald. Young—"I'm not sidestepping
I'll stick by the motion."

Ald. Barker—"I want it understood
that I am not sidestepping either."

The motion was carried on the fol-
lowing vote:

Yea—Cooper, Barker, Baxter, Camp,
Young.

Nay—Davidson, Reid, Wilkinson.

Question of Valuers

Ald. Camp moved that Dr. W. C.
Kierstead, Herbert V. Gunter and C.
W. Burnett be appointed valuers.

Ald. Reid objected that nothing was
known concerning the recompense
which would be wanted by them. He
believed that after the statement of
the Chief Assessor with regard to un-
settled real estate values the council
should postpone action. In amendment
he moved to that effect.

Ald. Camp said Dr. Kierstead would
give a decided answer Thursday night.

Appearance of Lobbying

Mayor Hanson said he hoped the
amendment would be passed. Delay
should not take place. As a matter of
fact there was every appearance of
lobbying for the appointment of two of
the men. He was a personal friend of
Dr. Kierstead but he would say that
that gentleman was not a practical

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

that no Provincial grants shall be paid on account of real estate,
insurance, materials and supplies.

(b) School Boards that have paid claims for tuition
in Vocational or Pre-vocational Schools, shall be paid Pro-
vincial grants to the extent of one-half the sums expended
in payment of such tuition claims.

(c) Local or joint Vocational Committees maintain-
ing Vocational and Pre-vocational Schools, under this Act,
in communities of less than 5,000 people, shall receive
Provincial grants to the extent only of one-half of the
salaries paid by the Director and Instructors.

(d) All moneys payable under the provisions of this
Act shall be paid on requisition of the Chairman or Vice-
Chairman of the Vocational Board upon the Provincial
Secretary-Treasurer, provided always that the sum total of
the amounts paid under the Act shall in no year exceed
\$50,000.

16. (a) Estimates shall be presented by the Vocational
Education Board to the Governor-in-Council before each Ses-
sion of the Legislature, for the School year beginning the first
day of July next following.

(b) Estimates shall be presented by Vocational Com-
mittees to the Vocational Education Board, on or before
the first day of January of the School year for which the
estimate is made.

17. The provisions of this Act shall not apply to any city,
town or district unless compulsory school attendance therein
shall have been adopted.

18. The Vocational Education Board shall have power to
make regulations for the carrying out of the provisions of this
Act.
