OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

THE LIVABLE VERANDA.

The veranda is the most important part of the house in summer and it ought to be treated like the most important part of the house. In some houses it is ignored—worse than ignored. It is positively insulted. Any furniture that is too old for use indoors is transferred to the place that ought to be the centre of the summer life of the family.

It is not at all necessary to buy expensive furniture for the veranda in order to make it livable, comfortable, inexpensive furniture can be had in designs that are pleasing and quality that is durable.

Wicker furniture is the best for outdoor use, and it can be picked up, in good style and quality, for remarkably low prices if you take advantage of sales and bargains. A straw or grass rug of some sort can be used on the floor, or a rag rug made from odds and ends of rags dyed in tan or dull green can be used.

There should always be comfortable chairs. If any member of the family has an addiction for rocking chairs, a comfortable one, in wicker or wood, should be provided, with cushions to make it attractive. Then there should be a table of some sort. A plain kitchen table, with the legs shortened a little and stained green or brown, or a cutting table nicely stained, will answer the purpose. Or an ironing table—the sort that turns into a bench or settee when it is not a table—can be bought for a small price for the veranda.

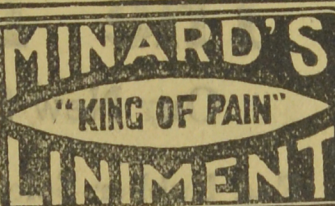
A padlocked box, like a shirtwaist box, only one stained instead of covered with cretonne is most convenient for the storing of books and magazines, needlework, and the many odds and ends that go to furnish the veranda.

These odds and ends are important in themselves. There should be a jardiniere or large bowl for wild flowers—nothing is more appropriate for out-of-door bouquets than daisies or gold-rod or Queen Anne's lace. There may be smaller flower holders for a few roses or nasturtiums or some other prize of the garden. Then there should be cushions to put in the chairs, and the hammock—if there is one—and to put on the floor to sit on. These can be covered with burlap or with heavy cretonne. A foot stool, a low stand for books and magazines, and a garden basket in which flowers can be gathered, are also convenient.

BANANA BETTY.

A simple and delicious dessert quickly made in case of emergency and well meriting the approval of those studying food conservation calls for bananas (one to each person) cornflakes, a little nut butter and lemon juice and very small amount of sugar.

Cut the bananas crosswise into very small rounds less than an inch thick. Butter lightly a small baking dish—agate or earthenware. Sprinkle first a layer of cornflakes, then make a close set layer of the cut bananas. Squeeze over these a little lemon juice, sprinkle with a couple of teaspoonfuls of sugar (brown will do), then cover with a layer of cornflakes. Do this generously with the nut butter. Then put in another layer of bananas, lemon juice and sugar, and a top cover of cornflakes with butter dotted over.

ASQUITH AND CHAMBERLAIN

(Westminster Gazette.)

Memories of one of the most interesting campaigns in political history will be recalled by Mr. Asquith's generous references to Mr. Joseph Chamberlain on Saturday. Probably Mr. Asquith was the only statesman whom Chamberlain really feared. It has been said that Mr. Lloyd George first emerged from the ruck by attacking Mr. Chamberlain, but that does not mean that Chamberlain feared him. Randolph Churchill did the same thing with Gladstone, but it was Randolph who was really in awe. But Mr. Asquith's relentless campaign at the beginning of the century, when he followed Chamberlain from place to place dispassionately reviewing and cutting up the tariff reform programme, was one of the historic campaigns of politics, not less great because each man knew and respected the powers of his adversary. It was a campaign at once destructive as well as constructive. It smashed one party; it restored another to life.

This will bake in a moderate oven in from ten to fifteen minutes. The bananas should be tender when tested with a fork. The baking dish should be covered for the first ten minutes, as otherwise the cornflakes will brown before the fruit is cooked through.

Banana Betty is best when served warm, though it is good either hot or cold. Neither cream nor sauce will be found necessary to accompany it. To repeat—a very little sugar is enough, if sugar be used, though honey or maple syrup may be substituted.
