

ROYAL ROAD GIRL KILLED IN MONTREAL

MISS ANNIE SHORTILL
WAS STRUCK BY TRAIN

Details Lacking — Had Been
There But a Few Weeks—
Daughter of Mr. and Mrs.
Owen Shortill.

Mr. and Mrs. Owen Shortill of Royal Road this morning received the sad tidings from Montreal that their daughter Miss Annie Shortill was killed today in Montreal by a train. Details of the accident are entirely lacking. The young lady went to Montreal about six weeks ago with the family of Mr. H. M. Porteous of this city.

The deceased was aged eighteen years and had a large circle of friends who will hear of her untimely death with sorrow. Besides the parents two sisters Alice and Martha and two brothers survive. Funeral arrangements are not yet known.

A cable received here this week from Capt. Vernon Coffyn, of the British Army Medical Corps, announced that he was sailing for home on the steamer Cedric, now bound for Halifax. Capt. Coffyn went overseas early in the war and saw active service in Mesopotamia, Palestine and other theatres of war. He was one of the first to enter the city of Bagdad after its capture from the Turks. Capt. Coffyn is a son-in-law of Mr. George F. Burden, ex-M. P. P., of Poklok.

Death of Seth Jones

Mr. Seth Jones, Mayor, of Sussex passed away suddenly yesterday at the General Public Hospital St. John. He had been a sufferer from stomach trouble and was in hospital to undergo an operation. The deceased was 56 years of age and is survived by his widow one son and two daughters. Mr. Geo. B. Jones, M. P. P. for Kings is a brother. The late Mr. Jones for some years occupied the position of poultry inspector and as such acted as judge at poultry shows and exhibitions in Fredericton and elsewhere. He was elected Mayor of Sussex in January last.

SEEDING HAS BEGUN ALL OVER THE PROVINCE

POTATO ACREAGE WILL
BE ABOUT THE AVERAGE

Early Sown Grain is Up—Prospects for Small Fruits are
Excellent—Hay Crop
Promises Well.

The Department of Agriculture has received very encouraging reports on crop and stock conditions during the past week.

The week of May 25th was very wet and cold, this delayed seeding operations to a considerable extent. It was reported at the end of that week that many farmers had not been able to start seeding. Conditions have been ideal during the week of June 2nd, seeding and planting operations have been going ahead very rapidly. Pastures and meadows are looking exceptionally well and at present the hay crop gives promise of being good.

Average Potato Acreage

Early sown grain is well up and covering the ground. Potatoes are being planted generally, with indications of about an average acreage. Northumberland reports a shortage of seed potatoes. The apple and small fruit crop looks exceptionally promising and with favorable weather conditions for a few more days while the trees are in bloom, a large crop seems assured.

Live Stock

The Live Stock reports state that cattle are gaining in flesh since going on pasture. They came out of winter quarters, on the average, in this condition. Young pigs do not seem to be in as good demand as last year. Six dollars each is the prevailing price.

Horses are selling at from \$150.00 to \$250.00 according to soundness, weight, age, etc. A number of car loads have been brought in from Ontario for sale.

Wool Situation

Wool is in considerable demand. Local buyers are offering 45 cents per pound. The majority of sheep owners are now selling their wool through the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers Association. This Association has not sold its wool yet but owing to quantities received is in a position to sell to good advantage and top prices are assured.
