**MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE
TO COME BEFORE BOARD**

Minister Expected to be Present—Appointments to Vacancies in Forest Rangers Expected.

A meeting of the Forestry Advisory Board will be held on Thursday afternoon at the Crown Land Office. Dr. E. A. Smith, Minister of Lands and Mines will be present at the meeting. Some very important business it is expected will arise for the attention of the Board.

Business Before Meeting

Col. T. G. Luggie announced this morning that more routine work will be run through and that the appointments to vacancies in the Forest Ranger staff will be made. In connection with these appointments some six applicants last week stood the examinations for Forest Rangers. They were G. T. Gosnell, Sherman Mills, David G. Stewart, Gratton, P. O., S. M. Ritchie, Temple, H. A. Murchie, St. Stephen, Peter McLagan, Nashwaak Bridge, and J. Edward Fraser, of Chipman. The results of their examinations will probably be heard tomorrow or Thursday.

A report from the look-outs and telephone lines will also be heard and it is expected that an investigation will be held in the interests of the Martineau Lumber Company from Bathurst.

Parish of Bright

Parish of Canterbury

In Canterbury Coun. Hugh Smith has resigned and Clarence A. Grant and John Flemming were elected by acclamation. Coun. Flemming is a new man.

Parish of Douglas

In the parish of Douglas Alexander Brewer and Fred Seymour have been nominated.

Not Heard From Yet

A number of Parishes have not yet been heard from included among them being Dumfries, Kingsclear, Manners-Sutton, New Maryland, North Lake, Prince William and Stanley. In Dumfries a three cornered fight is being waged between Councillors Manuel and Brewer and Bert Simmons a new candidate. In Kingsclear Tabor C. Everett and Brunswick W. Fox were declared elected by acclamation. In Manners-Sutton two candidates are in the field Dr. Dougan and Frank Coburn. **FINES FOR CONVICTIONS
IN RESTIGOUCHE CO.**

Inspectors Make Good Haul of Barley Beer—Liquor Analyzed Fourteen Per Cent.

Liquor Sub-Inspector Fraser D. Saunders returned from Restigouche County recently where he had been investigating alleged liquor abundances. He secured a number of convictions there before Magistrate F. F. Matheson and is returning to Dalhousie in a few days where he has a number of other cases coming up. The fines imposed aggregated \$250.

Convictions Secured

At Campbellton Alex. Matthias was convicted of selling liquor and was fined \$100 by Magistrate Matheson. Agnes McLean and Arthur Savoie of selling liquor. Peter Founier was fined \$50 each for violations of the Intoxicating Liquor Act of 1916. The former was convicted for selling liquor and the latter who holds a beer license was convicted of unlawfully selling liquor. Peter Founier was fined \$50 for having liquor in his possession. While in Athol and Dalhousie, several searches were made by the liquor inspector with gratifying results. At Athol some one hundred and fifty bottles of barley beer were seized and destroyed. At Dalhousie several seizures were made and when an analysis was made of the whiskey seized it was found to average about fourteen per cent alcohol.
