## ALL NEW BRUNSWICK LEAGUE IS FORMED AT ST. JOHN

New Organization to Boost Province is Launched Under Favorable Auspices — Representative Gathering in Attendance — Mr. F. B. Edgcombe of This City is Elected President and Mr. J. J. McCaffrey Vice-President for York.

St. John, June 4—The All New Brunswick Tourist, Game and Resources League got away to a flying start yesterday. This new organization has been created to meet the need for some central body representative of the whole province which could undertake the work of making known the advantages which New Brunswick has to offer. Efforts along this line in the past have been limited by their local nature and it has been felt that what was needed was an united effort, enlisting the co-operation of the entire province. The promoters of the idea seemed to have struck a popular note and the response was even more hearty and general than had been anticipated. All parts of the province were represented at the first annual gathering which opened yesterday and the men who attended were of the class who can be depended on to make a success of any movement to which they lend their support.

Enthusiasm regarding the resources and attractions of the province and optimism regarding the future prospects for greater developments were the keynotes of the gathering. When organization was completed the newly created league settled down to work and the resolutions passed showed the wide field which is open for their efforts and their intention to grapple with the most pressing problems without waste of time.

There can be no doubt of the value to New Brunswick of the new organization nor of the success which may be expected to crown their efforts.

The morning session devoted to explanations, welcome and organization the afternoon session when New Brunswick scenes were seen and important resolutions passed and the banquet in the evening with the speeches that marked it all were well attended and highly successful.

This morning will be devoted to sightseeing around the city; luncheon will be served at the Power Boat Club and in the afternoon the delegates will enjoy a sail on the river.

### Morning Session

When the convention opened at 10 o'clock at the Imperial, the chairman E. A. Schofield explained the inception of the organization and gave credit to Guide Harry Allen of Penniac, York county, for planting the germ that started the movement to put New Brunswick on the map after the war, at least as far as tourist and sportsman traffic was concerned. It was thought by many leading spirits that New Brunswickers should get together and forward the varied interests of the province. We go to other parts of the continent and appreciate what we see and hear, he said, but right here in our own province we have everything, almost, that other places have and a good deal more. Since this was a fact had not the late war activities demonstrated to all classes, factions and localities, how easily these feature can be put before the world and driven into the forefront by hearty and persistent co-operation. So, after discussing the matter of organizing the present convention, the local government was approached in the matter and it was with its hearty consent and promise of assistance that the work was undertaken. Besides the tourist end of the plan and the hunting and fishing there will doubtless be more serious matters of provincial interest to take up, such as soldier settlements and reconstruction.

Short addresses were delivered by Premier Foster and Mayor Hayes, after which the meeting proceeded to organization work. A constitution and bye-laws for the organization was adopted and officers were elected as follows:

### The Constitution

The committee on constitution and by-laws submitted their report and the constitution was adopted as follows:

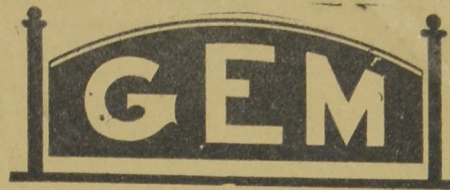
This organization shall be known as the "All New Brunswick Tourist, Game and Resources Association." Its objects shall be to foster a broad community spirit and create more optimism among our citizens. To encourage the development of our natural resources and a greater publicity of the advantages and attractions of New Brunswick.

Any person who is in sympathy with the objects of the association and in good standing in the community, shall be eligible for membership.

There shall be elected at the meeting for organization and thereafter at each annual meeting for the year ensuing, the following officers. A president for two years in succession, one vice-president from each county of the province and a secretary-treasurer. These officers and five other members to be elected by the association shall constitute the executive. Five members of the executive shall constitute a quorum. The executive may appoint such committees of the association and on such subjects as it may deem proper and fix the quorum thereof.

All the members of the conference adopting the constitution and all persons eligible and who are nominated by a member shall become members of the association upon payment of the
