WILL CLAIM INDEMNITY FROM THE CENTRAL POWERS

Sir Thomas White Tells Parliament That They Will be Made to Pay as Much Indemnity as Possible—Should be a Cold Economic Proposition—Mr. D. D. Mackenzie Concurs in View of the Finance Minister.

Ottawa, March 24—That Germany Austria and Turkey should be made pay as much indemnity as possible was the opinion expressed by Sir Thomas White acting prime minister in the commons tonight, in discussing a resolution moved by J. H. Durembay, to the effect that Sir Robert Borden should be instructed to claim an indemnity from Germany corresponding to the amount the war had cost Canada.

"It should," said Sir Thomas, "be a cold, economic proposition and should be based not only upon what the enemy countries may be able to pay at present but on their future prospect."

With this view, D. D. McKenzie, the opposition leader, agreed.

"If Germany could pay an indemnity he said, even within the next two hundred years matters should be arranged so that she should pay."

The acting prime minister assured the mover of the resolution and the house that Canada's claims would be pressed, and that Sir Robert Borden had already been supplied with a statement as to Canada's war expenditures and financial losses.

Mr. Durembay in presenting his resolution expressed the conviction that Canada would receive an indemnity and the hope that the rights of the dominion would not be bartered, "for some mess of pottage such as titles, or positions by those who had the matter in charge."

It was a field day in the house for private members. Many resolutions fathered by them were discussed and the majority withdrawn after statements indicating government policy had been made by ministers of the crown.

Alien Enemy Question

Ottawa, March 24—H. S. Clements of Como, Alberta, moved this afternoon that it was expedient that the policy of the government in relation to the internment of alien enemies, deportation of undesirable persons and the treatment of soldiers be clearly learned. He said this house should make itself heard with no uncertain sound in regard to the alien enemy questions. He said every interned alien was just as much an enemy today as he was during the war, and he should be deported at the earliest opportunity.

The authorities should not wait for palatial ships to take them away from Canada; cattle ships were good enough.

Mr. Clements said there were aliens in Canada who had been naturalized for their own personal purposes and they were not true Canadian citizens. From the time the Liberals came in power until 1911, he said, it seemed to be their desire to populate this country not matter who come. The riff-raff of Europe which was brought into Canada and our great trouble today was not with the true Canadian citizen, but with the alien who because a citizen for a purpose such as the I. W. W. or Bolshevistic type, which was causing strife and trouble in British Columbia.

Mr. Clements said he desired to censure the immigration department. The bars had been put up against la-

bor coming into British Columbia, ninety-nine per cent of the men available for service went to the front, labor became scarce and an urgent call went out for men. The bars were let down and there came into British Columbia a big influx of undesirable.

The Government Policy

Mr. Clements closed with an appeal for unity throughout Canada and as a step in this direction advocated a system of nation-wide non-sectarian schools.

Hon. Arthur Meighen, in reply, said the policy of the government was to deport all alien enemies who had shown themselves dangerous, undesirable, with as little delay as possible. He observed however that they were under certain difficulties. The British government could not admit at present, in any considerable numbers, enemies for repatriation in Austria and Germany. The question of payment of costs of transportation was also under consideration and was now before the peace conference.

Mr. Meighen said that the policy of the government with regard to internment dated back to the beginning of the war. All that time alien enemies were interned not only because of showing evidence of hostility but also because they were out of work and in that state they were a menace to the community. As the years progressed the unemployed situation was mitigated, and it went to the other extreme. The need grew for a larger source of labor supply than the country afforded.

VETERANS AND THE RED CROSS

Quebec, March 25—Disapproving the action of the Red Cross society requiring payment from prisoners of war for parcels sent the Quebec branch of the great war veterans passed a resolution last night. The resolution says that the Red Cross asks the prisoners of war to sign ten shillings per month to cover shipment of extra parcels to them. The Veterans state that the prisoners receiving only \$1.10 per day, and assigning about \$20 per month to the families cannot afford to sign the amount asked for by the Red Cross.

QUEBEC MAN FATALLY SHOT

Quebec, March 25—Redolph Pruneau, single, of 21 Pere Arnaud St., was fatally shot yesterday evening while target shooting with his two brothers along the C. P. R. track. Deceased was shot by his brother, a returned soldier, who was at the time showing him how to manipulate a firearm. He was removed to the hotel Dieu Hospital where he died about six o'clock. An inquest will be held this afternoon.

S.S. OLYMPIC NOT YET DOCKED

Halifax, N. S., March 25—After an unsuccessful attempt to dock the St. Olympic in the teeth of a twenty-three knot northwest blow this morning, the giant liner returned to her anchorage in the stream and prepared to disembark the civilian passengers by tender. An attempt is now being made to dock the Royal George.

Biffed on the Jaw

A returned soldier while walking up Queen Street last evening received some uncomplimentary remarks from other soldiers who were loitering on the corner of York and Queen Streets. He answered back and the argument led to blows between him and two one-armed soldiers. The Chief of Police seeing the row started across the street to interfere. He grabbed one of the returned men by the sleeve but was much surprised by receiving a stiff jolt on the chin from the returned man's good arm. The pair of one-armed men were led to the station and locked up. They came before the Police Magistrate this morning and were remanded until 2.15 o'clock this afternoon.
