BRITISH PRINCE WHO SAW N. Y. IN OLD DAYS

(Continued from page three.)

the Jersey shore, and to do their job between sunset and sunrise. Ogden reckoned on being in the city by 9.30. He gathered all the information possible from those skilled in the tides. He located the boats and oarsmen that could be safely collected. All this had to be done with every precaution against rousing suspicion or even undue interest. The place of landing he chose was to be at Countess Market, between the two sergeants' guards (above mentioned), at the head of the Old Slip, and opposite the Coffee House. A wet and stormy night was needed and the soldiers employed had to be drilled in the exact method of embarkation and disembarkation. The following from a memorandum in Ogden's own handwriting, shows how carefully he thought out the details of the adventure. In debarking first "two men with a guide seconded by two others, for the purpose of seizing the sentinels: these men to be armed with naked bayonets and dressed in sailors' habits; they are not to wait for anything, but immediately to execute their orders.

"Second—Eight men, including guides with myself preceded by two men, with each a crowbar, and two

with each an axe—these for the purpose of forcing the doors should they be fast—and followed by four men, entering the house, and seizing the young Prince, the Admiral the young noblemen, aids, etc.

"Third—A captain and eighteen to follow briskly from and defend the house, until the business is finished, and retreat a half gunshot in our rear.

"Fourth—A subaltern and fourteen, with half of the remaining boat's crew, to form on the right and left of the boat, and defend them until we return; the remainder of the crew to hold the boats in the best possible position for embarking.

"Necessary—Two crowbars two axes four dark lanterns and four large oil-cloths."

"The attempt was never made. It is not quite clear just why it petered out, but most likely it was because some inkling of it had reached the British commanders. Almost immediately after writing the letter to Ogden above quoted, Washington wrote him again. This letter stated that a secret despatch from New York had just come in. It showed that the British were taking great precautions to guard the Prince and the Admiral, and that the sentries were being doubled every night at 8 o'clock.

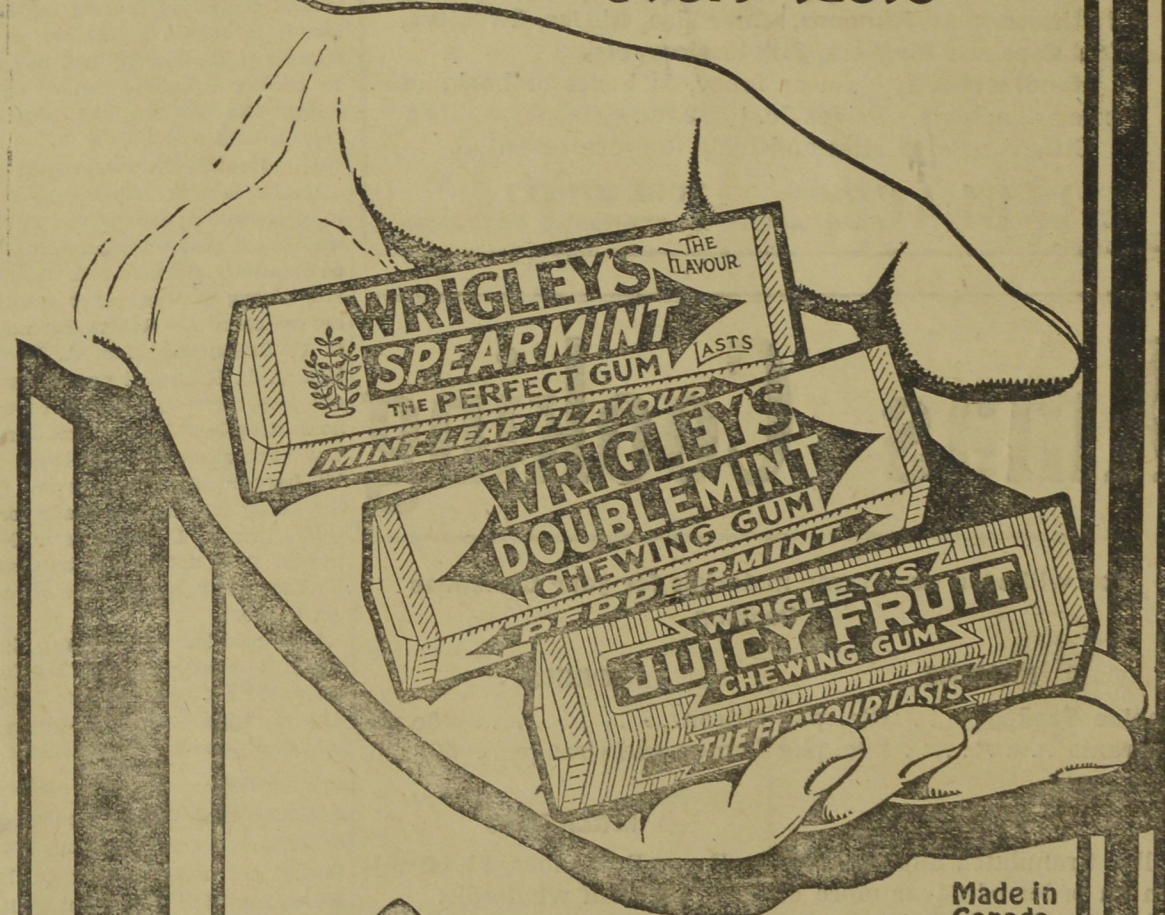
