Hon. Jacques Bureau asked why the commissioner was appointed and at whose request. Sir Thomas replied that he had been appointed by the government to insure a supply of newsprint to the papers at a fair price during the war. He explained that the war had resulted in forcing up the price of newsprint, due partly to the shutting off of exports of sulphite from north-MERCHANT ern Europe. During the war he said, function. 

Papers Have Suffered

Mr. Hoken declared that if any in dustries had suffered during the war it was the newspapers. Several papers in Ontario he said had been forced out of the business during the war. If the government was going to start limiting profits the newsprint

manufacturers were good people to start on.

Mr. McCrae charged that practically without any hearing on the part of the manufacturers the minister of Finance had first fixed the price of newsprint at \$50 a ton.

The manufacturers asked for an investigation and Mr. Pringle found that the average cost of production was \$50.70 and the manufacturers were forced to sell at \$59.
