

NEARLY THREE HUNDRED THOUSAND MEN DEMOBILIZED

Statement Made in the House of Commons by Major General Mewburn—Nearly Fifty Thousand Canadians Still in England—Powers and Jurisdiction of Paper Controller to be Extended—Discussion on Cost of Newsprint.

Ottawa, July 4.—Major General Mewburn announced in the House this morning that from the armistice up to the end of June, 289,627 men had been demobilized. There was still in England, at a close estimate 43,565 men included in which were some 5,353 hospital cases. That number of 43,565 would have been reduced at least 10,000 had it not been for the shipping strikes which took place on the other side. The strikes were now over and transportation was proceeding rapidly. It was expected that demobilization would be completed early in August.

Mr. Lapointe asked, if any action would be taken on the report of the industrial commission.

Sir Robert Borden: "An announcement will be made in due course and within a very short time."

The House went into committee on a resolution which provides for the extension of the powers and jurisdiction of the commissioner and controller of paper after the declaration of peace. It also provides for an extension of the authority of the paper control tribunal. Sir Thomas White explained that the object of the resolution was to enable the commissioner and the paper control tribunal to complete all matters undertaken and determine all questions which had arisen prior to the declaration of peace. There was no intention of continuing the powers of the commissioner or tribunal after this work had been cleared up. He explained that the commissioner had been appointed under the war measures act, and the tribunal constituted under the same bill. Therefore, unless parliament made provision, their powers would cease with the declaration of peace.

Why He Was Appointed

Hon. Jacques Bureau asked why the commissioner was appointed and at whose request. Sir Thomas replied that he had been appointed by the government to insure a supply of newsprint to the papers at a fair price during the war. The appointment had been made on the representation of certain Canadian Newspapers that they might have to suspend publication if the price of newsprint continued high. He explained that the war had resulted in forcing up the price of newsprint, due partly to the shutting off of exports of sulphite from northern Europe. During the war he said, the press performed a most important function. Not only did it disseminate the news but it rendered a high service in encouraging the people and maintaining that spirit so necessary to the successful prosecution of the war, therefore it was essential that the press should be assisted in getting newsprint at a fair rate. That was the reason for the appointment of a paper commissioner and a tribunal. No one had been hurt by the governments action. He had looked over the books of the manufacturers and they appeared to have done well during the war. He was glad that they had done well.

Mr. I. E. Pedlow, said that the government appeared to have been anxious to protect the newspaper but not the other commercial interests using paper. There had been no controller for wrapping or other papers used in commercial lines.

Mr. A. R. McMaster, protested against the governments action in assisting the papers. It was an unsound principle he said.

He thought the manufacturers should be allowed to charge their own prices, as if they made excessive profits, the government could take it out of them on business and income taxes.

Papers Have Suffered

Mr. Hoken declared that if any industries had suffered during the war it was the newspapers. Several papers in Ontario he said had been forced out of the business during the war.

If the government was going to start limiting profits the newsprint manufacturers were good people to start on.

Mr. McCrae charged that practically without any hearing on the part of the manufacturers the minister of Finance had first fixed the price of newsprint at \$50 a ton.

The manufacturers asked for an investigation and Mr. Pringle found that the average cost of production was \$50.70 and the manufacturers were forced to sell at \$59.

The manufacturers had asked that the profits of publishers should like-

wise be investigated. Many publishers were able to pay a good deal larger dividends than before the war, but nothing was heard about them. Mr. McCrae claimed furthermore that the President of the Privy Council had written to Mr. Pringle telling him not to investigate the publishers.

Sir Thomas White challenged the statement that the price of \$50 was fixed without giving the manufacturers opportunity to state their case.
