THE LIBERAL LEADERSHIP.

Mr. H. F. Gadsby, a well informed parliamentary correspondent, makes the prediction that the Liberal leader to be chosen at the National Convention, will be an Eastern man, and he hears that the choice may fall upon Hon. W. S. Fielding. In writing on the subject he says:

"I am inclined to believe that the choice of the convention will be an old parliamentary hand with a long Ottawa experience, and a sound record on the tariff and that the stand he took on conscription will make little difference, one way or another. He will probably be a member of the Old Guard and the older he is the better, for that will mean that he will drop out after a decent interval and give the Young Brigade their chance."

The above description seems to fit the Hon. W. S. Fielding to a nicety. He is a veteran parliamentarian with an absolutely clean record, and he is thoroughly sound on tariff matters. As Mr. Gadsby well puts it:

"More and more opinion here turns to W. S. Fielding, who has all the marks that lead the seekers to him. He is from the east, he has a national reputation; he has done notable things for free trade—wide reciprocity and the British preference; he is author of the German surtax, which should be a feather in his cap just now; he is one of the best finance ministers Canada ever had, and heaven knows a financial expert is what this country now needs; and he is old enough not to stand too long in the way of that aspiring youth which wants to have its fling now that the Liberal party has got over its unreasonable opposition to young men in office."

Referring to the material available for leadership in the younger element of the Liberal party, Mr. Gadsby says:

"The Liberal party has a very promising young brigade—young, that is to say, as politicians go—and among those present are Mackenzie King, Premier Martin of Saskatchewan, ex-Attorney General Hudson of Manitoba, Hartley Dewart and Fred Pardee. When the Old Guard retires there is a fine bunch of brigadiers any one of whom might well become commander-in-chief. And the others who do not become commander-in-chief, will make brilliant lieutenants. In short, the Liberal party has not only a leader, but a capable headquarters staff to draw from."

While people of all shades of politics are praising the work being done on the roads of the province, the St. John Standard has made the startling discovery that "the main highways between St. John and Fredericton, and between St. John and St. Stephen, are in such a wretched condition that visitors to this province from New England points ship their cars back by boat rather than undertake the experience of a return trip." It is dollars, to doughnuts that the Rip Van Winkle who penned the above lines for the organ of the patriotic potato boodlers has not set foot outside of St. John this season, and probably if put to the test would not know a highway road from a towpath. The only road of which he can speak with authority is the broad one which leadeth to political destruction.

The York County Council have in the past dozen years wasted enough time discussing the poor farm question which if computed on a cash basis would easily defray the cost of establishing such an institution. Last session a bill was put through the Legislature granting the necessary authority to establish a Municipal Home, and it was thought that the matter would have been settled at the July session of the Council. A majority of the members, however, with a considerable regard for the wishes of the people voted to allow the matter to go over until January next. It rather looks as if the matter was permanently shelved.

It seems to be the general consensus of opinion that New Brunswick now has the best highway roads in its history. The present administration,


